Today on the show, we have my friends Matt and Lauren Chandler. This month you've gotten to hear our That Sounds Fun Tour live conversations. If you weren't able to make it in person or if you're in a different city. And, so, that's been this whole month, go back and listen if you're just jumping in. But we did save some of the interview in each city, just for that live audience. But you're going to hear most of it here. I was so excited to have Matt and Laura join me in Dallas.

Matt is the lead pastor of the Village Church in the Dallas Fort Worth Area. He's the author of several books and Bible studies you may have heard of or read, including; *To Live is Christ to Die is Gain, The Mingling of Souls*, and *The Explicit Gospel.* His wife Lauren has also written books and Bible studies. Her most recent, *Being With Us in the Wilderness:* A Study on the Book of Numbers.

Y'all, these are two dear friends to me, and I've been dying to have them both on the show. I love this couple so much and I know you will too. So here's my conversation from our live stop in Dallas with Matt and Lauren Chandler.

Will you please welcome Matt and Lauren Chandler. Thank you, thank you, thank you.

- Matt: Will you edit, in case Lauren uses language that's [Inaudible 00:03:05].
- Annie: Yes. Matt's like, "If Lauren cusses, are you going to cut it?" Yes.
- Matt: It happens.
- Lauren: It's possible.
- Annie: It could go there.
- Matt: It depends on the subject.
- Annie: That's right, thank you for matching me, exactly, in you're a little--
- Matt: I knew it was the pink jacket or the black jacket. I rolled the dice, and here we are Annie, here we are.
- Annie: You did it, respect.
- Matt: Yeah. And I would just say, just out of the gate, I tell my daughters this, "Never trust a man who won't wear pink."
- Annie: Keep going.
- Matt: If you won't wear pink, walk on. Just where you got some... you got some stuff.
- Annie: There's something.
- Matt: Walk on.
- Annie: What is he got? What's the thing?
- Matt: I mean, there's all sorts of things that can rob a man from the joy of wearing pink.

Annie:	Wearing pink?
Matt:	Yeah. This is getting deeper sooner than I thought.
Annie:	Really? That's not our friendship.
Matt:	That isn't, so move on.
Annie:	Matt and Lauren had been here seven minutes, and I was crying, so it's good. We get deep pretty fast.
Matt:	But they were happy tears, clarify that they were happy.
Annie:	Totally. They didn't make me cry, just to be clear.
Matt:	I'm a pastor, they like think, "Oh, did he bring up sin?"
Annie: Yeah.	
Matt:	And I'm like, "No, I didn't I swear." But we can.
Annie:	Right here in front of everybody.
Matt: I	t's your show Annie.
Annie:	Let's do it. Listen, I don't know if y'all have listened along like I have. But Matt, you just finished teaching the whole book of Revelation.
Matt: Yeah.	
Annie:	So you like teach the easy stuff, mostly?
Matt:	Yeah.
Annie:	Yeah. You just go to the back of the book, you spoil the ending.
Matt:	Well, there was a little boy in our church that asked me what we were going to do now.
Annie:	Yeah.
Matt:	And I was like "It's great, we're just going to start over."

Annie: Right. And at the same time, Lauren, you just had a Bible study release, With Us In The Wilderness. about Numbers? Lauren: Yes. Annie: So you're working in the front of the Bible, and Matt is working in the back? Yes. Lauren: Annie: Why numbers? That's such a weird one. Lauren: I have no idea. No, I was reading through the Bible. And I'd read some parts of Numbers, but for the most part, I was like, "All these names and numbers I didn't understand." And then as I started reading through it, they're all these really interesting stories. And I was like, "I'm really fascinated." I'm a real curious person by nature, and so I started digging deep. And I thought there's some really good gems here that I want to share with other people. Annie: Yeah. And honestly, the more that I studied Numbers, the more I saw it later in the Bible Lauren: as I kept reading just different things, how it overlapped. And, ironically, this I wrote it in 2019. I started writing it in 2019, finished early 2020. And then I felt like we all were going through some kind of wilderness in 2020. So I felt like the Lord put it on my heart. And even personally, we were going through a wilderness just with our family, with the church, just different parts of our lives. And so it was just the Lord's timing to study this book that in Hebrew is called. In The Wilderness, Which I thought, "Hey, let's call it that instead of Numbers." Annie: I mean, really? Lauren: Because numbers, I like numbers, I'm kind of nerdy. Annie: Why did we switch that? Why did we switch it to Numbers from In The Wilderness? Lauren: The Bible people did. They decided that--Matt: Marketing. Annie: Marketing.

Matt:	Just terrible marketing.
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Annie: An intern did that. An intern did that.

- Matt: I do think one of the things that was fun for us, as Numbers and Revelation, is these books that are viewed as difficult and oftentimes avoidable. I mean, if you did a poll about how many people start reading the Bible in the year, and then give up at Numbers. And they just pop back to the Gospel of john, or Psalms, it's almost all of us. And, yet, I'm convinced that one of the ways the enemy has really robbed us of confidence, specifically, in the day and age we're in, is by taking these two books, in particular, away from us. One, how faithful God is, even when it looks like He's gone.
- Annie: Right.
- Matt: And two, there's not a book in the Bible, that disarms the enemy like the book of Revelation. It just continually lays in front of us as the people of God, that he loses, and we win, and things are not like they seen. And if we can make that weird, if the enemy can make that weird or confusing, or there's a prostitute or beasts, what?
- Annie: Right.
- Matt: And then if you get junky theology involved, and now there's guillotines, and the Apache helicopter, the locusts, and then things get really, really strange, and then nobody reads it. And then we're in this day and age, where if we could just get it, we would, as the book says, "Sing in the face of our enemy." But we can't do that, because we don't know the book because the book's so weird and scary, or numbers are so difficult to manage.

But those two books, no matter how hard things get, no matter what kind of loss there is, no matter how long it takes, you have not been abandoned. And then Revelation is the story of victory. It's, things are not as they seem, that's incredible.

- Annie: The weird thing about Revelation, all of it, is the weird thing about Revelation. But also, I feel like every seven years someone else tells me what all those things are in Revelation.
- Lauren: Yeah.
- Matt: Sure.

Annie:	And so, it's not that I feel like I can't trust it, I just feel like I can't trust how people Of course, we can trust the Bible, to be clear, of course we can.
Matt:	Yeah. I was going to ask some questions, follow up questions, I'm glad you said that. This is going to be awkward.
Annie:	I trust every bit of the Bible.
Matt:	Are there any other parts that you don't like?
Annie:	Yeah, we've talked about how I feel about Paul.
Matt:	Not in front of the people.
Annie:	Okay.
Matt:	Not in front of the people, Annie.
Annie:	He's really grown on me, I understand him better. The podcast did a series, I read into [Inaudible 00:08:28] book.
Matt:	Okay.
Annie:	You chastised me severely.
Matt:	It was friendly banter, friendly banter.
Annie:	But I want us to want to love Revelation, Like, I want to want to love it.
Matt:	Yeah, I get that.
Annie:	And not be scared of it.
Matt:	Sure.
Annie:	So what's that move? How do we not see what Twitter says about Revelation?
Matt:	I think you shouldn't see what Twitter says about a lot of stuff.
Annie:	Well, that will preach. That will preach.
Matt:	So I'll just move that rule, wherever that rule falls on your fun meter.

Annie:	Right.
Matt:	It just needs to be higher.
Annie:	Right.
Matt:	It just needs to be higher. So there were two things for me, that really made me go, "I've got to get in here." And the first is Revelation 12, which is the Christmas story. So the thing to think about when you think about Revelation, we think everything's linear. Like, okay, here's what happens next.
Annie:	Yeah.
Matt:	Well, Revelation isn't built that way. It's apocalyptic literature. It's what does John see next? It's four windows. What does he see next? So if you read Revelation, because you think it's this linear timeline, it's going to be super confusing, 12 unlocks it for us.
Annie:	Okay.
Matt:	And shows us that because it's the Christmas story, but it's the Christmas story, told in such a way that it does what apocalyptic literature does. Which is provoke our imagination in a way that it stirs up our hearts and minds.
Annie:	Yeah,
Matt:	So what we're used to on the Christmas story is, Mary, she's in this barn, it's a silent night, it's a holy night.
Annie:	Right. All is calm.
Matt:	All is calm, Annie.
Annie:	I've heard.
Matt:	But it's also-
Annie:	Bright.
Matt:	There, it is.
Annie:	It's very bright.

Matt:	And you're thinking that, and you're like, "Oh my gosh, that's so sweet." And there are songs like "Mary Did You Know?"
Annie:	Oh boy.
Matt: "That	your baby boy."
Annie:	I will weep right here if you keep singing that one.
Matt:	Yeah. The angel told her, she does.
Annie:	Yeah, Right, she actually did know.
Matt:	So, now, if you go to Revelation 12, though, it's this picture of a woman with 12 stars, the 12 tribes.
Annie:	Yeah.
Matt:	It's the whole purpose of God through human history, is what the crowns are. And she's, and here's a dragon waiting to devour the baby, now we've got cosmic warfare. Now we see that the child escapes the dragon. And you're seeing this thing that's like, as a man, I know I'm minority in the room. But I'm like, "Great a manger scene, but what? War against the dragon? I'm going to war against the dragon."
Annie:	Interested.
Matt:	It's also 60 years before John, even, has any clue of any of these things. So it's not linear, so twelve is the one. And then the other thing that just, men, I just get so pumped, just as a pastor, you're kind of a first responder. The amount of sorrow in the world and brokenness in the world. And you got the Four Horsemen of the Apocalypse. And it's just terrible, you don't read that and go "Yes."
Annie: Right.	
Matt:	But you get the four horsemen. And then after the fourth horseman, this is chapter four, maybe?
Annie:	Okay. We believe you.
Matt:	Well, I wanted to throw the "maybe" because I'm not sure.

Annie:	Okay.
Matt:	I'm not sure. So the angel sees the four horsemen. They're riding all over the world. By the way, that's not a future event, it's happening right now. That's not, "Oh, the four horsemen are coming." Here's the rule on Revelation, it cannot mean for us what it did not mean for them. Why would God do that to them? It's like, "Don't worry, 2,000 years from now that's who it's for." No, it was written to a specific people, it is a letter like Galatians.
	So when we read that the Four Horsemen of the Apocalypse are just wrecking shop all over the world, the angel in heaven says, "In light of these things, who can stand?" And the very next scene is the Church of Jesus Christ worshipping, singing. So the message to the believers in Rome, and the message to us is we can.
Annie:	Right.
Matt:	We can stand. In light of pestilence, in light of death, in light of persecution, in light of slander, no matter what comes, we can stand. And so you get this, I can feel myself getting excited, like we sing in the face of our enemy. What do we do at funerals? We sing, why? Because we won, that person won, right?
Annie:	Yeah.
Matt:	When your grandma's in the hospital with Alzheimer, what do you do? You sing and it brings her back for a second, right? What do we do, like, what defangs the enemy like singing in his face?
Annie:	Yeah.
Matt:	And so in light of these things, who can stand? We can stand, like I'll preach that, and we need to hear that. And that's what I think the enemy wants to take from us, by making this book confusing. Because of some '70s movies, and some junky, dispensational, pre-mill theology.
Annie:	And a very popular series of that.
Matt:	Absolutely, make a ton of cash.
Annie:	Right.
Matt:	A ton of cash, because it does sell, weird sells.

Annie:	Yeah, that's why my books do all right.
Matt:	That's right. I didn't say it, you said it.
Annie:	You didn't, I just did, I said it for myself. That's really interesting to me, Matt, because one of the things that I know is true in my own life is, if my brain is spinning out, or if I'm in a bad mood or something. If I will put worship music on it will change the atmosphere, it may not change the situation.
Lauren:	Yeah.
Annie:	And I always thought it was more of like a sphere, so atmosphere thing, which I think it is. But if you're telling me I'm singing in the face of my enemy, let's go.
Matt:	Well, it's also, and so again, I don't want to just talk Revelation, we've got
Annie:	We have a whole list, but we are fine. They are here.
Matt:	So the other thing that's happening in Revelation is you get the letters to the churches. And then right out you get this picture of heaven. You have all that exists flowing towards this throne.
Annie:	Yeah.
Matt:	Where Christ is enthroned. And the reality of worship is that it becomes convergence space, does that make sense?
Annie:	Mh-hmm.
Matt:	So it's not like, "Oh, we're going to be there one day." It's, "Oh, my gosh, I get to be in that right now." And I don't know, like one of the things, the guy that was sharing the gospel with me. I would go to church with him and we used to play football together, and we would just talk about girls, and Pearl Jam, and football, and then we would go to-
Annie:	1993?
Matt:	That's here, that's class of '93.
Annie:	Yeah.
Matt:	That's [Inaudible 00:14:28] What about you?

Matt:	'98.
Matt:	Okay.
Annie:	'98.
Lauren:	Yay!
Matt:	Don't do the math, it's fine.
Annie:	We're proud to be alive.
Matt:	It's fine, I'm here.
Annie:	We are proud to be alive.
Matt:	And it would be this good friend of mine that sharing the gospel with me, and, man, they would do the goofy songs. Because, like in '91, '92, they weren't kind of upbeat, good Christian songs, worship songs, like there are now. So it was like kitschy stuff like, "I got joy down in my heart. Deep, deep down in my heart." Spell it in the whole room, you would love it.
Annie:	Yeah probably.
Matt:	Spell joy with their body.
Annie:	Right.
Matt:	And they knew, but as a jaded 15-year-old, I'm like, "These people are weird."
Annie:	Right.
Matt:	And then they would switch to worship, and my friend would be gone. Like his eyes would be closed, and I would see him lift his head, it was was like, he went this place, I couldn't go. Like, I didn't know where he went. I wanted to go with him, I didn't I know how to get there.
Annie:	Yeah.
Matt:	I didn't even know that what he was trying to do is help me get there. And so not only when we're worshiping, which is so much bigger than singing, just to be sure.

Annie:	Right.
Matt:	But that one passage, in particular, shows the church singing in that moment.
Annie:	Right.
Matt:	But before that, after the letters to the churches, this convergence space where everything's moving towards the throne room. That when Christians gather and we worship, it becomes this kind of convergence space. Where we're joining in with that, again, not a future event, a reality right now that you and I are invited to participate into. So the thing that messes with people in Revelation is we're just being told everything in that books about the future. And there's a couple of chapters that are about the future.
Annie:	Yeah.
Matt:	The rest of it is the world we live in right now.
Annie:	Yeah.
Matt:	It's just a lot of apocalyptic literature, that's meant to provoke our imaginations, make us feel something. God didn't want to us just know something, He wants us to feel something.
Annie:	Right. We can listen to you teach it through the Village podcast?
Matt:	Yeah, sure, YouTube or wherever.
Annie:	Okay. So you finish that?
Matt:	Yep.
Annie:	And now vacation?
Matt:	Lost Valley Ranch, let's go.
Annie:	Lost Valley Ranch. Y'all have heard us talk about it before. Yes, people are clapping because we love the ranch and y'all go like, soon. How are you feeling?
Lauren:	Day after tomorrow.
Annie:	Day after tomorrow. Y'all know this, the real science is we moved the date of this show, because I wanted Matt and Lauren, and I knew they were going to the

ranch. So I was like we got to switch around Texas. Lauren when you think about your family packing up, what is vacation with your people mean to y'all?

- Lauren: I think just that uninterrupted time together, where I don't think we get it right no. My kids are 18, 15, and 12, our kids, I said, my kids, our kids we have them together. Sorry I just said my kids.
- Matt: It's fine. We were pregnant, I would say that all the time.
- Lauren: No.
- Matt: When we were pregnant.
- Lauren: We were not pregnant. I was pregnant, we were expecting. That was-
- Annie: That's true, there you go.
- Lauren: Anyway, just uninterrupted time together. And we try to put screens away as best we can, and that happens a little easier in Lost Valley because the service isn't great.
- Annie: The service.
- Lauren: And there's a lot of beautiful things to look at, and see, and be a part of, and so I love that part for our family. And to kind of pull them away, and where we get to be us as a unit, instead of everybody doing their own things. Because I actually like them, and I enjoy time with them. And they're at an age now where we're okay. That they don't mind hanging out with us, they don't mind spending time with us. And so I think that's what I like about vacation with the family and a trip. And we're actually at that age where there's a difference between vacation and a trip. Where your kids when they're a certain age it's a trip. Because you are preparing--
- Annie: Right, when they're like three, eight?
- Lauren: Yes. There's no vacationing happening for us, vacations are mom and dad thing together. But now I feel like we're getting to that age, where it does feel like a vacation we get to get away. Spend time together and just be removed from the rhythms of just home and the craziness, where we can really miss each other. Is there any way, I haven't mommed yet, but is there any way that a mom can go on vacation or go on a trip with her kids and get rest? Is there a way, like when your kids were little, were you ever able to find rest in those scenarios? Or is that just do you need to like put that away is like, "No."

Matt: Say what's true.

- Annie: Say what's true, I don't know, I can't...
- Lauren: Well, there was one time we had a girl come and help us, which was great. Now because he travels and preaches a lot. What we would do is his work trips, like if you went preached at a beach camp, we would come.

Annie: Yeah.

Lauren:	Because we couldn't necessarily afford a beach vacation and so that was our vacation. And so we would have a girl come help us there. I mean, I think it's hard to find rest when it's the whole family. And I think there are pockets of rest you can get. I would just lean on Matt like say, "Hey, just can you let me sleep in?"
Annie:	Yeah.
Lauren:	And he was great to do that. But I do think it's hard, I want to say like the pat answer of "Yeah, rest is like a mindset-"
Annie:	Oh gross, gross do not lie to us.
Lauren:	"And you can just get there." But it's hard. It just is hard, it's hard. I remember the most rested I felt one time and this is, I'm an introvert if you can't tell, but Matt was on a trip. All the kids were at youth camp somewhere, or some kind of summer camp, and I was home by myself.
Annie:	Yeah.
Lauren:	And I was going go visit a friend who moved to a town like two and a half hours away. And all of a sudden, I realized, "Wait, I like this." I don't want to leave these. I'm in my house by myself, I don't have to get anyone anything, I can sleep in, I can just be me in my house by myself, this is vacation.
Annie:	Yeah.
Lauren:	So I loved that, and that was one of the times that I got to actually rest. But I do think it's hard. I'm sure somebody has a great answer about how to rest on vacation with a family.
Annie:	Well I mean, when I talk about Sabbath, the group that chirps back at me the most are young moms.
Matt:	Sure.
Lauren:	Yes.
Annie:	And they're like, "You wish I could rest?"
Lauren:	Yes.

Annie:	So Matt, when you're pastoring, how are you telling young families to Sabbath and to rest? Like, what do we do to help young moms and dads, get rest that is actually for your soul?
Matt:	It's a great question.
Annie:	Thank you.
Matt:	I think, you're so good at this.
Annie:	Thank you. My dad loves when people say that. My dad's always like, call me and be like, "Did you hear Matt Chandler say that was a great question? Proud of you."
Matt:	"Proud of you, girl."
Annie:	"Proud of you Annie."
Matt:	"I knew it, Annie."
Annie:	"I knew you could ask questions for a job."
Matt:	So I think you've got to keep in mind what Jesus says, "The Sabbath was made for the man, not the man for the Sabbath." So you've always got to keep that in front of you. And you always have to keep in front of you-
Annie:	What does that mean?
Matt:	Well, it means that if you turn Sabbath into a kind of a legalistic tool, then it's going to betray you.
Annie:	Right, exactly.
Matt:	And so, although, I do think what we're after is a day set aside. I think there's a season in which you might not get the full day, but you can start to model the heart of God in it. Which is to say you, not you as a mom, not you as a dad, not you as someone who produces or creates, or fill in the blank, you matter because I made you in my image and I love you. And what Sabbath is, is arresting and rejoicing in that. And since we're not Orthodox Jews who have been, but that's a great community to learn from.
Annie:	Right.

Matt:	What I would encourage people to do is, you might not be able to do the whole day, but you can certainly find a block of that day in which to truly Sabbath. And build the day before towards it, and you talk about this all the time. It's the intentionality the day before that makes the Sabbath.
Annie:	Right.
Matt:	It's the I want to be yours and only yours today. And I want to do what makes me just delight in you, and rejoice in you, and so I think, take what you can. But be intentional, knowing that as often as you can invite them into that also, because part of it, it's not you're not just sitting around reading the Bible all day on Sabbath, right?
Annie:	Right.
Matt:	There are things that are fun, that are life-giving. Like I eat a kind of way on Sabbath, I don't usually eat the rest of the week.
Annie:	I eat a kind of way on Sabbath.
Matt:	Say it.
Annie:	I just did.
Matt:	Put it on a shirt, Annie.
Annie:	I'll put that on a shirt. "I eat a kind of way on Sabbath.
Matt:	I mean, I do. Like I eat a kind of way on Sabbath, that I'm not eating the rest of the week. I want to be mindful of what I'm really going to enjoy doing, with the mindset of, "God, you love me so much you give me sea salt, caramel, dark chocolate-covered candies, by the fistful.
Annie:	Wow, you only eat oh, the by the fistful is the Sabbath thought.
Matt:	Yeah, I'm throwing that in there.
Annie:	Okay, good.
Matt:	No, no, no.
Annie:	Because you can have those seven-days a week, and the Lord will meet you there.

Matt:	I know, Siz, but not in the volume.
Annie:	The fistful, I hear you.
Matt:	It's the volume that matters. It's a Sabbath delight, a treat.
Annie:	A thing that I quote you saying three times a week, I probably quote you saying this, "If you work with your mind, Sabbath with your hands. If you work with your hands, Sabbath with your mind."
Matt:	Yeah.
Annie:	Will you walk us through that a little bit. When we think about our profession, our jobs, how do we figure out what rest is like for us? And how'd y'all figure it out for y'all?
Matt:	So a couple of one that's not me, I appreciate that you always give that to me. I'm just-
