Annie: Oh, yeah. Your like location radius?

Santa Claus: Oh, yeah, it was huge.

Annie: Global.

Santa Claus: Anywhere other than Baltimore.

Annie: Tell me more.

Santa Claus: No, I can't. It's legally bound.

Annie: Okay.

Santa Claus: Yeah, I can't.

Annie: Just you never wanted to date a woman from Baltimore.

Santa Claus: No, I did. Whoa, whoa,

I'm probably getting sued for that one.

Annie: Okay. You and Mrs. Claus met on Winter in Miami, relocated to the North Pole?

Santa Claus: Hmm, true. Sorry, I giggle because it's a funny story.

Annie: It's a good memory.

Santa Claus: It's a bad memory but now it's a good memory.

Annie: Sure. What's one piece of marriage advice you and Mrs. Claus would give?

Santa Claus: Just to keep the main thing the main thing.

Annie: Which is candy?

Santa Claus: Well, it changes. That's why this is tricky advice because it's always changing. The main thing is always changing, isn't it? But you know, I think it's when you're running a conglomerate like I do, it's hard to remember like this is person I need to invest in as much as I am. You know, the New Game Boys, you know, Nintendo's, Nerf bats. Just whatever... fill in the blank. We do a lot of trips together. We'll go

snowmen and sloman. They don't go anywhere. That's the nature of the... anyway.

Annie: Grace wants to know what's your favorite meal that Mrs. Claus makes you and

why?

Santa Claus: She is not a great cook.

Annie: Oh-oh.

Santa Claus: Oh-oh. She doesn't listen to this, sorry, so I can say that.

Annie: I know. She is not listening.

Santa Claus: She burns a lot of things in the oven. So I have to fake "Oh, this is delicious." And guess what I'm eating? You can't tell by looking at it. That's never a good sign. But I will say she does a good... She does a pizza. And it's edible at times.

Annie: Okay. She does a pizza. Let's jump to the elves for a little bit. We got a collection of

questions about the elves.

Santa Claus: Here we go.

Annie: And the hot topic as you can imagine-

Santa Claus: Restroom. I knew it. I knew it.

Annie: There was a follow-up question from a few years ago about whether you've gotten

the elves appropriately sized toilets.

Santa Claus: We did and it took a while. We had to change some things.

Annie: Sure.

Santa Claus: But yes, we did.

Annie: Sorted.

Santa Claus: Sorted out. Yes. Finally.

Annie: Elf on the Shelf. We got some questions about those guys. Do you decide which

ones become the elves on the shelves?

Santa Claus: So here's the funny story. That started in the... it was a statue actually. There was an elf who had one... he was probably the most well-known elf in the North Pole. Belphanticus was his name. We just called him a Little Belly, which it was ironic
