Okay, today on the show, you guys, I get to talk to some of my very favorite people, Madison, Taylor, and Logan. The trio of siblings that make up the band Cain.

I love these people so much. I can't, like I can't, I love them so much. Not only can they sing they're fun, and genuine, and joyful, and absolutely love Jesus. Their debut album Rise Up is incredible. They're winning all the awards right now. I cannot wait for you to fall in love with them and their music like I have. I am the fourth sibling in the Cain family. So here's my conversation with my Cain siblings; Madison, Taylor, and Logan of the band Cain.

- Annie: You guys, thanks for letting me to be part of the band today. I'm very grateful. I'm dressed like it. I'm ready to go. You guys, how is-
- Madison: You look amazing, you look so great.
- Annie: You're very kind. You really put me in an outfit that matters and I'm going to over-wear this t-shirt that is your warning. I'm going to be wearing this too much.
- Madison: What band member do you want to be?
- Annie: Oh, I am a great second alto. So I kind of-
- Madison: She is a singer.
- Annie: ...of like come in at the bottom. But not by myself, in a crew I'm great at that and drummer, sure. But you have a drummer, right?
- Taylor: Well, not today we don't. It looks like you-

Logan: We have a new one now.

Taylor:	Could you imagine if we brought you on tour and I just put you in a base, and we sit next to each other singing the same part. Like not even a different thing, but you and I just doing everything together, synchronized movement?
Annie:	It would be great for me and terrible for you. It would be such a letdown for the audience.
Logan:	People ask us all the time if there's a fourth sibling and we always say no. But I think maybe we've just been waiting for the right one.
Annie:	Oh, my gosh, for the right one to be adopted in.
Logan:	We just been waiting for the right one.
Annie:	Wouldn't He do it, won't the Lord provide-
Logan:	We need to have a family gathering.
Annie:	Yes, we need. This is what we're going to do this whole time?
Logan:	Yes.
Annie:	Y'all, aren't very good at not talking over each other? Do y'all practice that or is that just how this has to go?
Taylor:	I think what I've been noticing is I'll see whoever does a big breath for a shrug and then-
Annie:	Oh, and then you let them go.
Taylor:	Yeah. It's like playing chicken. You're like running after each other and then you're like, "Oh."
Logan:	Sometimes you anticipate the gap too soon and then you're just holding your breath, that's awkward,
Annie:	Will, y'all go and say your names just for our friends listening, since it's two females and there's a male, no offense to you. But I think they know the Logan from the Logan, I think that's true. So will y'all say your name so that people can know?
Taylor:	I'm really trying to match Taylor's voice to make this right.
Logan:	No.

Annie:	Okay.
Taylor:	Okay, hey, this is Taylor. Hey, this is Taylor
Annie:	Wow that was pretty good.
Logan:	That was well done. All right, for the That Sounds Fun fam, let's do the official-
Annie:	Oh, y'all do like a theme?
Madison:	Oh, yeah.
Logan:	Let's take it-
Annie:	Oh, I can't wait. I can't wait.
Taylor:	Great, are you ready?
Logan:	Yeah.
Taylor:	Hey, this is Taylor.
Madison:	Madison.
Logan:	And Logan.
Cain:	And we are Cain.
Annie:	Oh my gosh. That's really good. That's very good I'm so excited, I'll give you a double thumbs up for that. Well done. I mean, the first time y'all had to do that, tell me about the day y'all created that.
Taylor:	Where did that start?
Logan:	So the very first, I think, any sort of media related we did what is called a secondary market terrestrial radio tour and this was in like 2014, 13, 14?
Annie:	Terrestrial like aliens?
Logan:	Yes.

Taylor:	Yes. Yes.
Logan:	Yeah. No, no, no.
Madison:	That is what it feels like.
Logan:	Meaning non-reporting, sometimes run out of people's houses.
Annie:	Okay, so it's smaller studio?
Madison:	Yes
Logan:	So a little bit smaller. And I remember the very first on-air thing we did, we were supposed to play our then single.
Annie:	Mh-hmm.
Logan:	And we played half of it on accident. We did like the first verse, the chorus, and then the outro.
Taylor:	So it was a total, they were like, "And here is Cain." And then it was like 30 seconds of the song. And I was like-
Logan:	And we were like, "We should not do this, for the record, we should quit."
Taylor:	We should quit.
Logan:	But yeah, I mean that-
Annie:	And then y'all are like, "We've got to come up with a way to say our names?"
Logan:	We definitely need a way to say our names.
Taylor:	Well, what's crazy too is like we always assume that people know that that's our family name, like we're brothers and sisters.
Annie:	Right.
Taylor:	But every night out on the road, they come to us like a little tense and they're like, "Why the name Cain?" They think-

Annie: They think Cain and Abel,

- Taylor:...it's the beginning of an intervention. And so could you imagine if someone is, let's say
their band name is Michelle, because that's what Cain is to us.
- Annie: Right.
- Taylor: Oh, we've always been Cain.
- Annie: Right.
- Taylor: And so it was just sort of like, "I hate that name." We're like, "Well, it is my name."
- Annie: It's actually literally my name.
- Taylor: So now at the top of the show, we're like, "Hey, I'm Taylor, I'm Madison, I'm Logan."
- Cain: "And we're the Cain family."
- Taylor:And you can see them rest.
- Annie: Yes.
- **Logan:** An ease rolls over the crowd.
- Taylor: Yes.
- Madison: Wow.
- **Logan:** It's like, you can see people are like okay, check, question one. Okay so they pull out their notepad. Okay, good.
- **Taylor:**But could you imagine the personality type for the person that is like, they're non-judgmental
enough to be like, they think that we love murder but they're still there, it's different.
- Annie: It's technically murder, that is so true.
- **Logan:** That's a very specific code by which that person is living. Where they're like, "I don't support this name choice, but I do like the music enough to come watch."

- **Taylor:** I'm going to come find out for myself.
- Annie: Oh, my gosh!
- Madison: So I appreciate that.
- Annie: Also, I appreciate how humble y'all are being that you would get on a stage and everyone doesn't know who you are.
- Madison: No one knows.
- Annie: That's the interesting part.
- **Taylor:** Everyone knows who you are, girl.
- Madison: What? No way.
- Annie: No, everyone I know knows who you are.
- **Logan:** That's really kind.
- Madison: And that means what?
- Annie: Really?
- **Logan:** That's really kind.
- **Taylor:**Oh, man!
- Annie: I mean, are y'all still doing shows where the crowd is new for you?
- Logan: Well, I think so. This is something that, I don't know if you run into this, in the Christian market across the board it does seem that, and this isn't a bad thing. But it seems that a lot of times people want to know a song.
- Annie: Mh-hmm.
- Logan: And then it takes them a good bit longer to associate the song with the artist who sings it. And so a lot of times, early on, we would play an entire set and then we would play "Rise Up" is like our biggest song.

Annie:	So far.
Logan:	As referenced by the shirt that we made, that you're wearing.
Annie:	Thanks everybody. They made me a gift.
Logan:	But we would go into that song and again, sort of we joked about that ease, but you could see people that, a woman would grab her husband's arm or something, "Oh, okay." And so I think that that's happening less frequently. But there is still a little bit of that connectivity happening where you can see people are sort of like the little synapse like the last little pzzz, got it.
Annie:	Oh, that's what they are?
Logan:	Okay, and, so, that's nice. Because once people make that connection, then it does seem to be just overwhelming and people are so kind and so supportive. And, so, it's funny that people have so much love and personal experience with a song and they don't really necessarily need to know who sings it.
Annie:	Mh-mmm.
Logan:	So maybe there's a good lesson in that as well, I think. Some of that humility it's kind of nice that, we've said it before, but the beginning of music for us in our lives, all I could've ever hoped for is that somebody said, "Hey, you sounded great. You looked great." I needed that. I wanted somebody to approve of what we were doing and now all the glory and all the praise goes to God. Even past the song people are just like they may not even fully know the lyrics, but they know what happened to them when they heard it. And that's not something I can take credit for.
Madison:	Yeah.
Taylor:	It's true.
Annie:	Right, their experience. Taylor, will you tell the story, well, I really liked the story of y'all country to this.
Taylor:	Oh, yeah.
Annie:	Can you kind of tell that? Because I'm sure you've had it out like 86 times in interviews, I'm sorry, but will you kind of-

Taylor:	Oh, yes. I've got it condensed.
Annie:	I know, I'm sorry. But I think it's such a God story because so many people think they're going to do this thing and then God's like, "You're so close, but I just want you to do this thing." So that's why I love that story.
Madison:	Yes.
Taylor:	Okay. So Madison and I moved to town 2013.
Annie:	Okay.
Taylor:	And I was working in publishing a couple of jobs. Madison had a big girl marketing job and-
Madison:	I wore a skirt.
Annie:	Every day?
Madison:	I wore a skirt.
Taylor:	Mh-mm, pretty much, yeah.
Annie:	Wow.
Taylor:	It was pretty-
Madison:	Business.
Taylor:	But I knew that, I studied music, I knew we wanted to do that. In college, Logan, we all went to college together and so our grandfather stepped into our lives, and was like, "Hey, I want to help you guys." And this is where I grew up in Muscle Shoals, Nashville, this is what I did. So, to us, I mean, really, it was like, "What an open door?" Like let's go for it, it sounds great. And long story short he hadn't really been a part of my mom's life growing up.
Annie:	Oh, wow.
Taylor:	So they had this big come-to-Jesus forgiveness, and this awesome reconciliation, and so, he's wanting to spend time with us. It's like, "Let's go, let's do this." This is like a really cool thing.

- Logan: And that's the part of the story where I usually interject. We grew up with bands like Switchfoot and people that it was not uncommon for me to think like, "Oh, this is a faith-based band who's trying to be that way in a different market space." So it wasn't that it was like, "Oh great, we love country music, that's the dream." It was like, "We can still sing the songs that we grew up with, but maybe it's..." You know what I mean? It felt like, "Okay, God, this could be a different door."
- Taylor:And meanwhile we grew up on Steven Curtis Chapman, Amy Grant, Michael W. Smith. So
at that moment like a crack in the plan and we're like, "We have to go deep dive on country
music."
- Annie: Oh, gosh!
- Taylor:We got to go... so like it was really fun because then we just all started listening to like
hippie radio. We just started listening to anything we could figure out. So like Fleetwood
Mac, The Eagles we were late in life but we're getting like this exciting, "Oh my gosh,
harmony." And, so, it's kind of cool how all of our references, like we were influenced by
Christian radio, but also by these new, not new country songs.

So anyways, we're up here and we, I would say for five solid years, we are just taking anything we can get. We're trying to work jobs, trying to learn how to write a song. We had never even... We'd always sang, but we grew up on the stage with our dad at church. So you're just a Christian cover band.

We're renting hotel rooms to make it seem like we're got this cool motel look, and I bought some gels off of Amazon, we're putting them in lamps to make our own photo shoot. So it really is like all the while it feels like you're just hustling but it's teaching you a lot of how to make your own photo shoots, and how do your own video shoots.

- Madison: Because we're still doing that today.
- Logan: And so a perfect segue again, I won't disclose where we're sitting, where we recorded this. But I'm looking out the window-

Annie: My office.

Logan: ...and across the street from this office is our first booking agent. It's really surreal to look and see.

Annie: Is that weird.

Logan:	Yeah, and I haven't been here really since and, so, fast-forward to we're hustling, we're figuring out, we're being developed as artists. And it was a lot of lumps, taking a lot of hard lessons, and one in particular, which ultimately was the last lesson was in 2015, probably our busiest music year. Before this one we were traveling a lot, playing a lot, but it wasn't turning into anything and that was really where I felt like nobody cares about this. Like if we got into this in hopes to tell people about the gospel or to influence people. No one's watching no one's following us. It's sort of like, "What are we doing?"
Taylor:	We had driven 30 hours round-trip to lose about \$300.
Annie:	Oh, gosh!
Taylor:	And then all that we did was three hours of bars and the hardest part too is that, meanwhile, you're pursuing this career that you think that God, He would open small doors and we'd just keep saying, "Yes." But then we were in church, every Sunday we're like traveling. So then all of a sudden you look around and you're like, "I am now struggling with depression and my life is like falling apart. What has happened and how did we get here?"
Annie:	Yeah.
Taylor:	Probably anybody can relate when you just make small choices that kind of, not even like you're doing anything bad. It's just when you're not fighting to seek after the Lord, you just feel lost, just like that.
Annie:	Were y'all married at this point? Because y'all three are married, Were y'all?
Taylor:	You were engaged.
Madison:	I was married.
Logan:	Married.
Taylor:	Engaged at that point.
Annie:	Okay.
Madison:	I would say that I was going through a mental health crisis at this point. Not to the point where it was like I needed to be hospitalized, but I just didn't want to get out of bed. I felt like at this point. Taylor is starting to fly to New York to spend time with her

like, at this point, Taylor is starting to fly to New York to spend time with her boyfriend/fiancé. And I just see like Logan's falling in love, he's like doing long distance.

And I felt like if we keep doing the band, then I don't have to be alone and I don't have to feel purposeless and like, it just really felt-

- Annie: Even though you were already married?
- **Madison:** I was already married, but Jared, he had his full-time job and I'm like, "Wow, I'm a grown person in a garage band."
- Annie: Wow.
- Madison: And I need to be realistic with myself that this isn't going to work out.
- Logan: Yeah, we tell the story-
- Annie: Wow, Madison.
- Logan: ...and we tell it in such a cute way now. But I remember like that trip where we drove to Delaware, it was like 16 hours or something-
- Annie: No cats in Delaware, though, great place.
- Logan: We love Delaware, shout out to [Crosstalk 00:16:28] good job, doing great.
- Annie: It's not like next door to Nashville.
- Logan: I took us a minute to get there-
- Annie: Yeah it's a little travel.
- Logan: And I got a call halfway there that that contract that said we had hotel rooms provided we didn't. So that ultimately ended up being another big part of like the money that we lost. So, anyway-
- Madison: It's so crazy at the time, when you have no money, everything is a huge deal.
- Logan: Everything is a huge deal. So anyway, we pull up to this venue and then on the marquee it said The Chainsaws like that was what they said that our band name was going to be. So it's like hilarious but at the same time we're talking about, literally, having an identity crisis and then you pull up and it's like, "Okay, all this work, at least, it's like turning into something." And it's like, "Oh no, no, it is certainly not."

Yes. Annie: And, so we called our agents and said, "No love lost, but we have to step away from this, this Logan: isn't good." Annie: After you got home or on the drive home? Logan: On the drive home. We're like, "Thanks for your work, but we're going to step away from music." And then from that turns into the extra short part of this story which is we signed a pretty classic Nashville deal. Which was like, "Okay, it's either this, which is not great, or quit." So we sort of signed away our likeness, everything shy of the Disney sign and blood or whatever, and it was sort of like-Annie: Still in the country world? In the country world. Logan: Okay. Annie: Logan: And it was like either this will work and then it's okay to give away whatever 15% forever, or own... I grew up watching Shark Tank and owning a 100% of zero is still zero. So I was like, "Well, I better figure something out. And, so, we walked through that season and that was very hard, more lessons learned. And then that leads us, I guess, to really being ready to walk away altogether. Madison: Yeah, I think we were like, "We have to quit doing this." Because you can't just pretend that you're like coming soon. **Taylor:** [Crosstalk 00:18:23] filled with coming soon. Like "I've got big, big news, I can't tell you about." Logan: I can't tell you. Annie: It's so big. Don't leave because something else is coming. We don't know what but something is coming. Logan: I wish I can tell you but. Madison: And, so, we started going to a church. I really, I felt God calling me to say like, "Okay, nothing's going to happen later in your life if it's not happening now." Like I never imagined

even as a 26, 27-year-old. "Oh, wow. Okay, when you grow up, little Madison, you're going

to be out of church. You're going to be not working out, not taking care of yourself, no friends." Like, so, I just felt like, "Okay, I need to make, I need to do an overhaul." So Taylor and I go to the gym. We meet this lady, we go to a yoga class and the yoga instructor wasn't there. And so-

- Annie: You're like, "Could we have more class over right now."
- **Madison:** So I stood at the front of the class and I raised my hand and I said, "Do any of you guys know how to teach yoga?" And no one raised their hand. And I was like, "All right, well then I'm teaching the class."
- Annie: Uh-huh. Taylor, what does she mean like? She is bluffing.
- **Madison:** I was like, yay we are delighted like let's do this. So there was a lady in the class there and I was, we started talking and she was like, "Oh, I'm a pastor's wife." And so I was like church?
- Annie: Church?
- Logan: Church?
- Madison: And it was like yes?
- **Logan:** You go there now?
- Madison: So she told me the name of her church and so the next Sunday we all went and I-
- Annie: All of y'all went there?
- Madison: Yes.
- Taylor: Oh, yes.
- **Madison:** And, so, I'm like, I made a little prayer in the parking lot like, "Okay, God, unless this is just weird, this is where I'm going." Because at this point it doesn't matter so much about the church, but it just matters that I obey.
- Annie: Yeah, that's right.
- **Madison:** That's how it felt. We signed up, we went to their membership class the next Sunday. We joined a small group, like it was basically just like here we are.

Taylor:	Coffee team, nursery, what do you need from us? Logan, literally, was on the coffee team.
Logan:	Well, because the thing that we didn't want is we had spent anywhere from five to seven days a week in church, our entire lives until we moved to Nashville and then it went to zero. So we wanted to be plugged back in, but the last thing on earth I wanted to do was drag all my music dreams and problems into this new.
	If I'm trying to do an overhaul and maybe this is me hoping I'm speaking to me on the other side of the microphone saying like, "If you want something different don't drag everything into what you think is this new opportunity God is putting in front of you or you're just going to walk through an open door and then it's going to be a revolving door, and you're going to turn and walk right back into."
Annie:	Yeah, that's right.
Logan:	And so we just decided we're not going to say a word about music, not a thing. Because going back to church is not about reviving my music.
Annie:	You're like, "Don't tell them how good we sing." No, no, don't tell them how good we sing.
Logan:	Don't you dare. I'm serving coffee I'm like, "Would you like coffee?" And so-
Taylor:	I'm wearing like a flower shirt, like someone please ask me. I just want to do it again. I just want to do it again.
Annie:	Are you and Emily dating at this point?
Logan:	Yes.
Annie:	Okay. And is she going there with you too?
Logan:	When she's in town.
Annie:	Yeah, okay.
Logan:	So she's still living in Kentucky and actually, I guess, had just started being a travel nurse. She travels for work ever since 2017 and so that was a bit of kind of ships in the night.
Annie:	Yeah.

Logan:	Moving target, moving target. So, but anyway, she would come with us when we were in town. But for the first time, I guess, since we were really certainly in college, but I think since we were kids, it just felt like I have an anchor again. I have somewhere to be on Sunday and somebody cares whether or not I show up and that was like so much life in our souls.
Annie:	Yeah.
Logan:	And then the first week that I got asked to be a part of the worship team. I played drums my whole life, I actually prefer it, I like playing drums and they asked me to fill in on drums. But be it the Holy Spirit or nature of how we did things at home. I never played to like a metronome, like I click track and that's like industry standards-
Annie:	You just have the natural-
Logan:	I guess so.
Annie:	Oh, my gosh.
Logan:	And, so, when it was like, "Hey, would you fill in on drums on Sunday?" I was like, oh, delighted I can't wait. And then I started thinking like, "Oh man, I don't want my first Sunday to be me like messing this click track up or whatever." So they found somebody else to play drums and then they asked if I could just play guitar. And so my first Sunday back I just played guitar, I didn't sing. And I can't tell you, I can shut my eyes right now and remember that day.
Annie:	Yeah.
Logan:	Because it was like, oh, I felt like I had been playing Plinko with life and I had finally slotted down back into the space where it was like, "This is it."
Annie:	Wow.
Madison:	It felt good.
Logan:	I am again in the flow of what God is doing and we're singing about. This doesn't have anything to do with, I think we were The Cains at the time, didn't have anything to do with The Cains, the band, the stress, that I'm standing on a stage singing worship music. And I mean, it was like a gong in my head.
Taylor:	And we're telling the story so slow.

Logan:	I hope this sounds fun.
Taylor:	So, I think I can tell this in like three sentences. But what we did at that point, so they met with us, "They're like, would you guys be interested in leading worship?" We said, "Yes." We're kind of on rotation, we're leading worship. And then there's a guy out in the crowd who's our now manager,
Annie:	Whoops, as is. That's how it goes.
Taylor:	He met with us lot, long story short, during this time we were like, "Let's get music, let's do it one more time."
Annie:	Yeah.
Taylor:	And, so, we spent a ton of our own money, like making one more country EP.
Annie:	Oh, wow.
Taylor:	We're getting ready to release it and Ron says, "Okay, before you do that, I see you on stage and you're so joyful-"
Logan:	"On Sundays."
Taylor:	"On Sundays. And then whenever I see you out playing this music, it's so contrived and it just doesn't have the same. Have you thought about doing Christian music?" And at the time, in my brain, I just seen how long it's taken to get to this point.
Annie:	Right, you're like, "Please don't make us start over."
Madison:	Yeah here we go.
Logan:	Oh, my gosh.
Annie:	Dude, that will preach girl.
Taylor:	And also we just spent all this money and then you just want to I mean, literally I would just have to throw it away and then there's no guarantee that if we did Christian music that we'd be any good.
Madison:	That's the thing too is like, that is not an easy switch, that's not a shoo-in.

Annie:	Right.
Madison:	This is like, "If I fail at my favorite genre of music, it's officially over."
Taylor:	It's officially, it's almost like you're just, it's really over.
Annie:	Wow, that's really interesting.
Logan:	And what's crazy is to sit and look at it now and say like, in the moment we talk a lot as Christian people about what God's asking you to lay things down, what sacrifice looks like. And then when it really has a dollar amount in front of it or a year amount, oh, it is so much harder than the sort of ethereal I'll lay it down.
Taylor:	Madison called me, she had walked out of church. She was like, "Hey," I was listening and she was out of breath. And she was like, "I had to walk outside of church because" she's like doing laps.
Madison:	I was curious.
Taylor:	Pastor John was saying that like, "I just feel like somebody needs to lay something down." And she was like, "Surely-"
Logan:	I rebuke you.
Annie:	Yeah, yeah, God doesn't mean me, right?
Madison:	Yeah it's not me.
Taylor:	Yeah, "It's not me, it couldn't be me. I think I'm just having a lot of anxiety." Because you just feel like, "God, you are not going to let this happen?"
Annie:	Man, I know that feeling so hard. I know that feeling so hard of like, "I know that word is for me." And I'm pissed. I know that feeling and it's awful.
Madison:	Ultimately in my heart I felt like God was not going to let us do music. It didn't feel like, "Give this to me and we'll do it a new way." It was like, "You, this is not for you."
Taylor:	This is over.
Madison:	And I'm like, "God, I really, really like it and I don't like anything else as much."

Annie:	Yes.
Madison:	So we agreed just to get together and try to write a Christian song. But we need to not even with anyone else. Let's just see, "Can we even do this?"
Annie:	Yeah.
Madison:	And I would say by the time we got to the first course, there was just an ease to it.
Annie:	Really?
Madison:	We'd all cry, because we were just like, the song is called, "Hey Jesus" it's the first Christian song we ever wrote.
Annie:	I my gosh, I love it. I know it
Madison:	No way?

Logan:	And before that 30 days was up, not only was that contract torn up that company was dissolved. So before-
Annie:	Huh! The Lord!
Logan:	So before that three-week turnaround where we got this, we wrote this song and we cried and God performed a miracle. He released us into a new season completely scot-free.
Taylor:	It's crazy.
Madison:	I know.
Logan:	Isn't that crazy?

My number one goal is you're healthier when we get home than when we left. So whatever you need for me to be healthier spiritually, emotionally, and physically, you just tell me. Because if we get home and you are unhealthy because of me hiring you, then I'm accountable to that with God."

- **Logan:** And then when the curtains are drawn you see what's back here and if it's different, that is a really hard to deal with.

Annie: I almost cried when I'm reading my Bible on the tour.

Logan:	Sure.
Annie:	Only because I'm like, "I don't want people to see me during my cries." So I like go to the very back of the bus, right in the back, but nobody knows where I am.
Logan:	I'm quite a slow reader, I don't want to get caught. They're like, "You still in chapter six, huh? Okay."
Annie:	Annie, anything wrong? Versus like sitting in the middle of catering and being like, "Right, everyone, you're moving heavy boxes, I'm reading my Bible." So here carry-
Logan:	Indeed. I'm doing a lot of spiritual lifting today so.
Annie:	Right, that's right. But it is that balanced because then at night we do have to work, and we have to be on, and we have to do the spiritual lifting then.
Logan:	Yeah.
Annie:	And if you don't check-in in the morning with the Lord, I can't do a show at night if I haven't checked in, in the morning. I don't feel right about it.
Taylor:	That's good.
Annie:	Okay. Christmas is here and y'all have a Christmas album.
Madison:	Can you believe it?
Annie:	I can't, Madison, I can't believe it. It's called "Wonderful".
Madison:	It's called "Wonderful". I can't believe it.
Annie:	I mean how long did it take you to talk them into doing a Christmas album?
Madison:	Oh, instantly. I felt like all of us are in that-
Logan:	It was like our initial label meeting.
Annie:	Right.
Madison:	So I felt a part of like first meetings were like, "Here, we're Cain, this is what we want to sound like. This is what we want to say and Christmas is a big part of our-"

Logan:	It's a core value.
Taylor:	It's a core value.
Madison:	Christmas is a core value.
Annie:	Christmas is a core value.
Madison:	And then I also had to learn a lot about the industry. Because we first came in and I was like, "All right, so I want to record 35 songs." And they were like, "No, that will never happen."
Logan:	That's not it.
Madison:	So let's
Annie:	You're like, "We'd like to do a triple EP, a triple LP.
Madison:	Yeah, but I think we started last year collecting a list. I had like running notes in my phone of like, "If I ever get to do a Christmas album here are some songs are important." Christmas, it's a little bit difficult.
Logan:	It's trick.
Madison:	Like how do you out-Bing Crosby, the Bing?
Taylor:	How do you out-Amy, the Grant.
Annie:	Right.
Madison:	You can't.
Logan:	And you essentially have like four weeks and change before this stuff like the shelf life on Christmas music is pretty rapid.
Annie:	Not for Madison.
Logan:	But not for Madison.
Madison:	Yeah, it's true.

Logan:	But in that instance, it's like, "How can I make something meaningful that can translate quickly?"
Annie:	Yeah.
Logan:	So it is a little tricky kind of science of it. But this is the moment where we shout out our team and say like Provident Label Group and everybody that like we're new and new artists don't get chances taken on them. Because they're new for that reason and so we got, we did one Christmas song last year and we fought kind of tooth and nail for a very non-traditional, we did a cover song-
Madison:	Called "Celebrate Me Home".
Logan:	called "Celebrate Me Home" which is a Kenny Loggins' song. And there's, in our lives it's Christmas, but it not necessarily is Christmas to everybody and not on Christian radio, anyway.
Annie:	Yeah.
Logan:	And, so, then based off of that, our team kind of then took another big swing for us and said like, "Well, then let's go ahead and let's get you a project." And then-
Taylor:	I think they came back and said, "This year, all right, let's do two." And we're just like, "How about six?"
Madison:	I know we always do that.
Annie:	I respect that.
Taylor:	Can I tell you behind the scenes about the packaging?
Annie:	Yes.
Taylor:	So when you get the CD, the album, like when you look at it. We shot this ourselves at our house-
Annie:	No, you didn't?
Taylor:	At my house-
Logan:	Yes, we did.

Annie:	Of course you did.
Taylor:	and we had-
Logan:	Look at the shirt you're wearing.
Taylor:	a big stairwell.
Annie:	Yeah, I am wearing the merchandise.
Taylor:	We rolled paper down, it's red trying to find a good time [Crosstalk 00:54:51] all day. We rolled it down and the three of us are in just silver, shiny as much as we, it's like disco Christmas.
Logan:	Terrestrial Christmas.
Annie:	Yeah, that's right.
Logan:	Terrestrial Christmas.
Taylor:	But gosh, when you look up the disco balls they're hanging from my mom and Steven, and they're like-
Logan:	It's like fishing wire
Taylor:	fishing lines and brooms and they're just like balancing all of these. And we're like, "Did you get the shot?" They got the shot.
Logan:	A little tense little Christmas tree.
Taylor:	I'm really thankful it worked out.
Annie:	Oh, my gosh.
Taylor:	It was pretty cool.
Logan:	And we've mentioned names already, but on that drive-in tour we got to sit down and we wrote a song with Mac Powell it's on there, he sang on it. We wrote the title track with Steven Curtis, he was kind of enough to kind of walk through that with us. And, so, <i>Wonderful</i> is the name of the album, but it is the single. It's, I don't know, I mean, to hear him

tell the story, it's obviously much more compelling, sorry to everybody you can maybe go look for him telling it. But we came to him with this title idea based out of Isaiah that he will be called wonderful counselor. Madison, you can say.

- Madison: Oh, that's it.
- **Logan:** Well, no, I just of all the things that were foretold, it was important enough to Isaiah that the first thing he would be called is wonderful.
- Annie: Listen, I don't play when the things are listed in Scripture, they're listed in the order for everyone to learn from. "Love is patient." I mean, that's true for us, I love it
- Logan: And so he is our wonderful counselor and then Steven Curtis goes on to tell us a story, I mean, it's like pass the tissue box around. But the first year that they lost their daughter, Maria, and he said, "This is supposed to be the most wonderful time of the year." And this is the first time I realized that it just isn't inherently that way. Somebody has to come along and make it wonderful and it's not just wonderful for everybody all the time. And, so, it's cool to-
- Taylor:And this Christmas, it could feel like that too. It's weird when you get older, you start
looking at empty spots on the table.
- Annie: Yeah.
- Taylor:It's weird. We're not used to that but people start to disappear they're not there anymore. And,
so, it sometimes Christmas is like we're always joyful and we're just decorating and baking
but it is just interesting how nostalgic you get the older that you get. When it's like, "Oh
man, we got to cherish." Each year you almost take assessment of how are things going?
- Logan: Like, we'd never thought that the wonderful nature of Christmas around the world, sort of, highlights how not wonderful it is for some people. And so we wanted to write a song that's sort of like, "Hey, we hear you, we see you and somebody is wonderful for you."
- Annie: Wow. Man, that cover there everybody can see, y'all, in this silver I can't.
- **Logan:** Are we cute or what? For everybody listening at home, we're super cute, in case you are wondering. Looking picture-perfect.
- Madison: We're looking at a red CD with silver cover, y'all.
- Annie: I mean, and that is just at your house?

Taylor:	Yes.
Annie:	That's rolled that red paper or cloth paper?
Taylor:	That was paper, that's definitely paper.
Annie:	Y'all are incredible. That's awesome.
Madison:	This is pretty, so Taylor, I mean, one more word for this, but Taylor handmade this hat to make it sparkly.
Annie:	Oh my gosh!
Taylor:	It looks pretty bad up-close in person.
Madison:	Don't assume anything.
Logan:	So did we. That has a metaphor for me.
Annie:	Okay, are any of course "Celebrate Me Home" and "Here Too" And "Oh, Come Yea Faithful" yay.
Logan:	Yeah, so, "Oh, Come" is cool because we-
Madison:	We wrote a little chorus.
Logan:	Quite inspired by the wonderful Phil Wickham. We thought that there are a lot of traditional Christmas songs that us being worship leaders, those four Sundays in December it's a little bit hard to sort of come on, get up to your feet.
Madison:	Jingle bells, jingle bells, to God Jingle God, jingle God.
Taylor:	Baby, please come home you're singing it to Jesus and you're saying that.
Logan:	Baby Jesus please come home. It's like, here is the rupture, is he a baby when he comes back? And so we wrote a kind of a worshipful chorus for "Oh, Come Yea Faithful" so that kind of gives you a place to go back to in kind of corporate sense, so that's fun. And then we did Baby Please Come Home and that was just sort of a fun little nod to I don't think there's ever been a Christian music version of whatever, it's been sort of Mariah and Michael Bublé whatever. So that's on there and then the "Christmas is Coming" is what we wrote with Mac Powell it's a fun one.

Taylor:	Grown-up Christmas List.
Logan:	Grown-up Christmas List.
Annie:	Grown-up Christmas List. That's a tear jerker.
Taylor:	Do you think that people like when people write Christmas songs? Do you think they're interested in hearing?
Annie:	I think they like both. I think they like, no, I like albums like this.
Logan:	Okay.
Annie:	Where some of them are new and you get to like run it while you're making dinner, decorating or whatever and then some of them you just always know.
Logan:	Sure.
Annie:	But I think a full album of covers, you're kind of like, "Don't do that."
Logan:	You got that. You're just wishing you're listening to your favorite one.
Annie:	Right. Y'all remember Michael Bublé and Mariah?
Logan:	Yeah, exactly. I mean was there, so we had a Red CD that it was like, whatever the first (humming) like this little, every time that came on it was just like, it's Christmas. I would just think, is there a staple kind of Christmas album you go to every year or?
Annie:	Mh-hmm, that's a very good question. What is the Christmas album I go to every year? Do you know what, it's a Mac it's actually a super old "Glory Revealed", Glory Revealed-
Logan:	Come on Glory Revealed.
Annie:	Glory Revealed was one of the albums and the Christmas one it is, I'm just going to go, hold on, yeah.
Logan:	I'm also interested. I'm interested to hear what the That Sounds Fun fam what is their favorite kind of go-to Christmas album.

Annie:	Well, it's funny you would ask that. Because what they are just realizing is that for the entirety of the year, we've asked every single guest about their favorite Christmas song. So what they are hearing starting today, starting this month and for the rest of the year, in December, is they're hearing every guests they've heard all year tell a Christmas song or a story.
Cain:	Oh.
Annie:	I know we have got it together-
Madison:	Oh, my gosh! I'm so happy.
Taylor:	I kind of played a rapid fire game with myself preparing for this moment. So in the car I would play like, just do a random shuffle and I would think of a memory for each Christmas that would come by.
Annie:	Okay, so which one are you going to pick? What's your favorite Christmas album?
Taylor:	Well, I didn't get that far so-
Annie:	Oh, wow, wow, so the game was-
Logan:	So it was not so rapid, not quite rapid fire.
Taylor:	The game is like you know what-
Logan:	I just got nostalgic and then started thinking about the one thing. It is if, are we doing that? Are we doing favorite Christmas song?
Annie:	Yeah, do that. Do that, tell me your favorite Christmas song?
Logan:	Well-
Madison:	Can we do categories.
Logan:	I know, does it have to be Christian music?
Annie:	No, it doesn't have to be Christian. We can't do categories it has to just be the one.
Logan:	Well, so I'm going to make a risky pick here.

Annie:	Okay.
Logan:	But I have so much fondness for the song "Same Old Lang Syne". You know that song?
Annie:	Yeah.
Madison:	Dan Fogelberg.
Logan:	Dan Fogelberg
Madison:	It's so good.
Annie:	Why?
Logan:	It just, I think that was probably the first time, when I was a kid, I was a little grinchy maybe a little bit. It was like, Madison was so much Christmas, I needed my own thing. And, so, everybody like-
Annie:	Oh, this is lifelong Madison? This Christmas thing?
Logan:	Oh, yeah.
Taylor:	Yes.
Madison:	I used to burn CDs for the family and we'd all sit and listen in silence.
Logan:	She was like the Christmas, yes, the queen. And it was like-
Madison:	I was like the Christmas police it was so unsettling.
Logan:	But also it was a known thing that the Saturday after Thanksgiving, we as a family, got our Christmas tree. We always had, we honor Thanksgiving.
Annie:	Uh-huh.
Logan:	It was over, it's Christmas time now.
Annie:	Move on, it happened, now we're gone.
Logan:	And it was like we had a schedule and we made cookies. And, so, anyway, "Same Old Lang Syne" they'd be like, "Hey, you guys want to get in the car and go drive and look at

Christmas lights?" I'm like, "No, I hate doing that it's boring." You know, I'm like a little kid, just like a little punk.

But I remember probably the first time where it was like my affections turned to Christmas and "Same Old Lang Syne" was on. And it was the first time that I had heard a Christmas song that felt like a regular song to me. Everything was so "Feliz Navidad" or whatever and I was a kid and it was like, "Ah, this is lame." And that was such a beautiful story and it was just kind of run into-

- Taylor:We had a weird rule. We were in like pre-teens, but it would be like, "Silence in the car." So
anytime that song would come on we'd all have to be like sit and listen in silence. It was just
so weird.
- Logan: But it was cool, it was such-
- Annie: Not weird at all, I love it.
- Logan: It was such a journey that it takes you on versus it just being like have a "Holly Jolly Christmas" if that's your favorite. But-
- Annie: Don't cut other ones. You got to be like, Aaah!
- **Logan:** I mean, it's not like it's "Wonderful" by Cain.
- Madison: What a loser.
- Annie: It's all secondary to that. Sure. Taylor, what's your favorite Christmas song? And then Madison, you're going to have to-
- **Taylor:**Yeah, I'm struggling to pick one.
- Madison: Do you have one favorite one?
- Annie: Yeah, but I don't know that y'all know it, but I want you to know it.
- Logan: Ha, ha, she is about to say Holly Jolly Christmas-
- Annie: No I was not. All year and nobody, except one guest, has known the song and it is my favorite Christmas song.

Logan: "Grandma Got Run Over by A Reindeer".

Annie:	You wish it is "Thistlehair The Christmas Bear" by Alabama.
Logan:	"Thistlehair The Christmas Bear"
Annie:	Nobody knows to do that.
Logan:	I should have known.
Annie:	Not even you, not even you, Christmas girl, you don't know. Okay. You girls got to give us your answers.
Taylor:	Okay.
Logan:	Give me some.
Madison:	Can I look up something to remind me-
Taylor:	I'm struggling. You know when you want-
Annie:	I didn't know what I was asking?
Taylor:	You want to be so cool.
Madison:	That was the only thing that I knew coming in is like, we were going to talk about this. And I was just like, "Do you want to hear the most obscure Christmas song. The one we love or the one with the best memory
Logan:	I played a rapid fire game with myself and it never started.
Annie:	Okay, so do you need me to categorize for you, Madison? Would that help if I asked you?
Madison:	Yeah.
Annie:	Okay.
Madison:	Yeah help me. I'm like getting upset because this is something, this is general-
Logan:	You got it, you got it.
Annie:	What is your favorite Christmas song that has a memory tied to it?

Madison: This can't be, we're not doing favorite, because there's no favorite.

Annie: It's just like one of all the favorites is the one that comes to your mind right now.

Madison: The first thing that came to mind was the "Christmas Farts". Is that like-

Annie: Yes, oh my gosh, I love it.

- **Madison:** I remember I used to have an old, my mom and dad had like a camcorder VCR and I set it up and I did a music video to it. And to me that just made me feel like I was so grown and I was just wishing everyone the best Christmas.
- **Logan:** Mh-hmm. Wait, so what's Christmas waltz?
- Annie: Hold on a minute.
- Madison:
 ↓ "Frosted window panes
 ↓ "Candles gleaming inside"
- Logan: Oh, lovely. Also all you people at home that never get to hear Madison lead a song. She is wonderful, she is so good. Madison, little shout out, sang as a surprise to Jared, her husband, sang a version of "Moon River" and walked down the aisle to it and he didn't know it was going to be her.

He thought it was just going to be the recorded version and so just to watch, Jared is my best friend, he's been my best friend forever. And, so, to kind of watch him, because I knew and I was watching him out and he melted into the ground, so yeah. But I think maybe that would be the thing that doesn't need a lot of music, but maybe we could coach you into doing a little Christmas.

Madison: I'll do it for Christmas.

Logan: We'd love that.

Taylor:So we had an Amy Grant's cassette tape.

Annie: Yes.

Taylor: And so we would play that in the car on all Christmas road trips.

Taylor: And the tape we played it so much that it broke. So my dad, I don't know what he used to repair-

- **Logan:** Dude, a soldering iron is what he did.
- Annie: No. He used-
- Taylor: He like melted it-
- Logan: He melted the tape back together and then-
- Taylor:And it was during Grown-up Christmas List. So there's a part now that we know where it
jumps time, because it wasn't melted together perfectly.
- Annie: By the time you thought that's the song?
- **Taylor:** I was like, "Jump it." Take it, Annie, there you go.
- **Logan:** That was the most impressive engineering feat I'd ever seen as a kid. Because we could have just got a new one, but dad said-
- Annie: Right, but no.
- Logan: That's just-
- Annie: He was like, "Let me just heat this up real quick."
- **Logan:** That's how Christmas ended up a core value for us. It's because it was one to him and he certainly, what a nostalgic, that kind of thing.

Annie: Yeah.

Logan: I'm going to save the one we use instead of getting another one. And that was like such a metaphor for like our whole childhood it was just that way. So shout out to dad.

Taylor: One thing that we would always do or we started doing later is it's called Christmas bucket.

Annie: Uh-huh, what a name?

- **Logan:** Songwriters we are huh?
- Taylor:And, so, we would take all the DVDs that we had and then they'd have a lot of activity, and
we'd wrap them. And then every day someone would unwrap the Christmas bucket and this
is a Christmas thing we're doing. So it wasn't like Christmas is a weekend it was as soon as
Thanksgiving's over every day of the week, we're doing something.
- Logan: If you reach into the bucket you pull out a Christmas story and then attached to that was going to be, we had like a BB gun shooting contest and the whole deal. So it was a very immersive-
- Annie: Full on Christmas.
- Logan: Yeah, full on Christmas.
- Annie: Really fun.
- Madison: A whole full on Christmas.
- **Logan:** A Christmas bucket.
- **Madison:** So I think in some ways, now as we're getting older, it's so hard to feel like, okay, "Well, we have to watch this movie at exactly midnight. "And it's just like it's okay to get a little bit older and to try some different stuff.
- **Taylor:**All of our spouses, I think, they're just like "You guys, this is crazy."
- Logan: No one behaves like this.
- **Taylor:** You don't have to do it this much.
- Madison: It's like, "Okay, so I'm off work on Tuesday, so we go ahead and go on Tuesday." And it's just like, this is something I already shared it to you about, but mom and dad just sold our childhood home and this'll be our first Christmas not there.
- Logan: Not there.
- Annie: It just happened to me when I was 37.
- **Logan:** Well, since we were kids.

Annie: It was awful. I cried and said, "I wasnt to go home."

Logan: Pain.

- **Taylor:** And then you just knock on the stranger's door.
- Annie: Right.
- **Taylor:** I need to come sit on the couch.
- Annie: Uh-huh, uh-huh.
- **Logan:** And that is a lifetime movie.
- Annie: It's terrible, right? It's terrible.
- Logan: It happens-
- **Taylor:** Oh my gosh, what are we doing?
- Logan: No home for Christmas, starring Taylor Cain. Lifetime cinematic adventure-
- Madison: I live in my hat.
- Annie: Yeah.
- **Logan:** I live in my heart and I knock on my door.
- Madison: So I'm excited we're doing Christmas bus this year. So I'm really excited-
- Annie: Oh, I love that.
- Madison: So we're part of someone else's-

Logan: We're on K-LOVE'S Christmas tour.

Madison: ...bus for the Christmas tour, but for one drive we're going to get our own bus-

Logan:	Our own bus.
Madison:	And then I'm going to decorate it, watch movies every night that way-
Logan:	Take the gang, it will be a lot of fun.
Madison:	Spend the night that way.
Annie:	Yeah, you're like, "We won't make everyone do this on K-LOVE, but one weekend we are going to get own bus.
Logan:	Sorry, Dante Bowe, I know you want to do Christmas with us, but we are going to-
Annie:	That's what's going to happen is everybody's going to come over and it'd only be the driver and the overnight driver or whatever.
Logan:	I'll open it to Mac, I feel like I've spent this entire podcast talking about Mac, but he's out there with us and everyone is just like, "Hey Mac, we're going to do Christmas bus." And then like, as I was offering to him, I was like, "Hey, bro, I just want to hang with you for this show." That's how Christmas happened. [Crosstalk 01:09:18] come on Mad, sing, sing for us.
Madison:	Get in our bus. Get in our bus.
Madison: Annie:	Get in our bus. Get in our bus. Oh my gosh, y'all.
Annie:	Oh my gosh, y'all.
Annie: Logan:	Oh my gosh, y'all. But I'm excited this will be my last Christmas without-
Annie: Logan: Annie:	Oh my gosh, y'all. But I'm excited this will be my last Christmas without- Without a kid.
Annie: Logan: Annie: Logan:	Oh my gosh, y'all. But I'm excited this will be my last Christmas without- Without a kid. Without a bebe.
Annie: Logan: Annie: Logan: Annie:	 Oh my gosh, y'all. But I'm excited this will be my last Christmas without- Without a kid. Without a bebe. That's right. I got a little bebe coming in the spring and just like you said, with everything that changes and grows, it's like I will miss being the kid. But now next year will be the first we got a

Annie: We have one in our family and it is unbelievably fun.

- Madison: Because it's all new.
- **Annie:** Everything is new.
- **Logan:** And it is magic again.
- Annie: And it's something for everybody to look at, it's awesome, I think, it's awesome.
- **Logan:** So I'll just wrap her.
- Annie: Yeah, here is the gift.
- **Logan:** That will be the gift, it's her. But I'm just excited.
- Annie: That's awesome. Will y'all please come back?
- **Logan:** Oh my gosh.
- Annie: I like, want to do this for another long time, but y'all need to live your lives.
- Madison: No thank you.
- Logan: No. You say, "Jump" and we say, "How high."
- Annie: This was so fun.

Madison: We need to have another really dramatic thing happens to us.

- Annie: Uh-huh.
- Madison: Before we come back.
- Taylor:And if it doesn't happen I'll create it. I'll create it.
- Annie: No I don't want that, no. Oh, my gosh! Listen I'll make it happen. Okay. Let me tell you the last question we always ask, because the show is called That Sounds Fun tell me what sounds fun to you?

Madison:	In categories, oh my gosh!
Annie:	No, no, what sounds fun to you today? It has to be today, we are going to stick to today. [Crosstalk 01:10:34]
Madison:	Okay, okay. That's nice. That's absolutely nice.
Taylor:	My parents are coming up.
Madison:	Mh-hmm.
Logan:	It's our mom's birthday.
Taylor:	And I'm baking my mom a cake and I'm also making chocolate chip cookies that have a secret recipe that I can't say.
Annie:	Okay, don't say.
Taylor:	But no one's asking which is just like I can't say.
Annie:	Nobody is asking but I will not tell.
Taylor:	I love to eat sweets and I could eat, I'm not lying to you, I could eat all the cookie dough and it doesn't affect me.
Annie:	Right.
Taylor:	It doesn't hurt my stomach.
Annie:	Mh-hmm.
Taylor:	And, so, I'm doing that today.
Annie:	Good. I respect it.
Taylor:	Thank you.
Annie:	I respect it.
Taylor:	Thank you very much.

Annie:	What sounds fun to you today, Madison?
Madison:	Today, oh, today's a great day already, this is my fun thing to do today.
Annie:	Thank you.
Madison:	I'm really excited. But after this, honestly, I think I'm going to start working Christmas music into the rotation now. It feels like it's late enough-
Annie:	You are ready, yeah, you are ready.
Madison:	I feel like it's time so I'm going to do some of that. And me and my husband put in an offer on a house so what I've been doing, I keep breaking my own heart, because what I'll do is I'll draw the floor plan on the software and I'll decorate it.
Annie:	Okay.
Madison:	So it's sort of like playing Sims, but maybe. Maybe it will happen.
Annie:	It's quite prophetic. You are like, "I believe this should be our house so I'll decorate it."
Madison:	Jared knows not to like stop me, he'll just say, "I really hope we get the house."
Logan:	Don't name it. So we're also in the process, Emily and I, are in the process of selling our house and, so, that doesn't sound as fun in terms of like ripping up carpet-
Annie:	Are y'all trying to do a new place before the baby?
Logan:	I'd like to. I think just because I don't want to do nursery and then move and, so, we've got a little bit of time and we didn't have that much left. So it's just sort of little house project did things, but I'm excited about headed to a new place. I think that sounds fun to me to. And today was the first time that our Rise Up royalty money came in, just came in today.
Annie:	Oh, uh-huh. Y'all got paid today?! Let's go! why are we still here.
Logan:	Emily and I have this, we started using the terminology called ticket day. Because one time we were given, her grandfather has like season tickets for Kentucky basketball from there. Kentucky got beat in that SEC tournament which happens in Nashville. So he left, gave us two championship game tickets.
