Intro: Today on the show I get to talk with my friend Tauren Wells. You know him. You've already heard him today. He sings that theme song of our podcast, and I'm so thankful for him. If you don't already know him from his hit singles all over Christian radio, his ten Grammy nominations, his six Dove Awards, his headlining tour, his hit podcast theme song for this very podcast, you can get to know him back on Episode 68 and on Episode 198 when he was with us before.

Tauren is one of the most magnetic performers I know, but he is the real deal offstage too y'all. We have been touring together since 2012. So I'm telling you he is the real deal. I'm so glad we get to catch up with him today and hear about his latest project called *Joy In The Morning*. Y'all, these songs are so good. They're so good. I cannot wait for you to hear more about them.

So here's my conversation with Tauren Wells.

Annie:	Oh, it's so dumb. I had like a little surgery on Friday to get a cyst removed. So here I'm coming, here I'm coming to K-Loves with this. Get out of here.
Tauren:	You gonna have to hold the trophy with the arm like that.
Annie:	Let's hope. Tauren Wells, let's talk about that trophy. People are gonna hear this episode after the K-Loves so they're going to know the truth. But you and I are going to talk about how you're hosting the K-Loves, I'm nominated for my third time. I'm "o-for" I'm "o-for".
Tauren:	Oh. Oh, I know that feeling. I'm offor. Yeah. You heard the new artist Blessing "O-for" that we were named that first.
Annie:	Yes.
Tauren:	I'm "o-for" on Grammys.
Annie:	I mean, but ten-
Tauren:	I don't even count K-Love Awards. It'd be too depressing.
Annie:	I said to my team, I was like, "I'm afraid I'm about to be the Susan Lucci of the K-Loves, the person who loses 19 times before they win one." So I don't know. Listen, I almost texted you when I got nominated, then I was worried it would feel like bullying, where I was like, "Tauren, you have the power." You're the host of the show with Matthew West.
Tauren:	If only we had power on the day of.
Annie:	I know. I know.
Tauren:	That's the problem.
Annie:	So before the show has even happened, what made you say yes to hosting? Why was that the right yes for you?
Tauren:	Well, anything I get to do with Matthew West is a yes.
Annie:	Same!

- Tauren:So I just love him. I've known him for forever at this point. He was on the first legit
tour that I went on with Casting Crowns team and Royal Tailor. We shared a bus.
- Annie: Oh my gosh! In what year? Like '10? '11?

Tauren: Yeah, '11, '12.

Annie: Oh, my gosh.

- **Tauren:** Yeah. So I got to be there. You know, he's obviously been very successful and has written songs that have touched so many people for a long time, but I also feel like I was able to see part of the beginning point of his trajectory and move upward and becoming a more influential voice. So I don't know, I love him. And it was an easy yes. I knew also that he would carry all the weight and I would just have to show up with the right suit on.
- Annie: You probably just get to be funny, yeah, and wear a cool suit.
- **Tauren:** Yes. So he'll make it easy.
- Annie: One of the things I love about award shows like The K-Loves and the Doves is All of our friends that all do the same job, if we're all at work, we don't see each other-
- Tauren: Right.
- Annie: ...because we're all in different cities. If we're at work and we're on tour, we're in different cities, but there's this like moment a couple of times a year where everybody is in the same room.
- **Tauren:** I love that. It's like a family reunion. I know everyone says that. But it really feels that way because I know you're the same way. Like, you're paying attention to what other people are doing. So I try to like stay connected and stuff on social media, but it doesn't replace being able to look in someone's eyes, give them a hug and say, "You're amazing. You're killing it. Thank you." And to receive that encouragement too, it goes a long way.
- Annie: Yeah. One of the things I really appreciate about our contemporary group of creators in the Christian space is competition is really low. I mean, it's not absent. We recognize that a radio station can only play one song at a time, a person can only listen to one podcast at a time, they can only read one book at a time. So it's not invis... We'd be ridiculous to be like, "There's no feelings of competition." But it is really low. Why is that? Why is it so low compared to some other genres?

Tauren: Well, I think that there is this mechanism called the Holy Spirit.

- Annie: He speaks in.
- Tauren:This body of believers that is constantly nudging at you saying, "It's not about you,
bro. It's not about you."
- Annie: That's it.

Tauren: And, you know, I am pretty professional at turning that part of the Holy Spirit's voice down because I am extremely competitive and I want to win, and I want to be the best. But it's completely irrelevant in this context because it's not about being the best, it's about being faithful to who God has called you to be and who God has called you to serve. And best looks different for every individual.

And because God is not choosing people on the ballot for the K-Love Fan Awards, we know that purpose is not evaluated by how many moments you get on a stage. It can actually be the opposite. So I just try to remind myself of that.

I have made a conscious effort, because I am so competitive, to be intentional about celebrating other people. Not just people who are behind me. That's easy to do. The people who don't have as many followers, the people who aren't quite, you know, at the place in their career that I am at, it's easy to celebrate them.

But to celebrate the people that you're running right alongside with, that's where the rub is for me. And I try to be intentional about. If they've got an album coming out, I'm celebrating that. You know, if something good happens for them, I just know that God is so big, that if something good can happen for them, something good can happen for me.

- Annie: I think our friends listening need to hear that it's not that we don't feel the pull to be competitive, it's that we don't act on it most of the time. Sometimes I do because I'm very human. But most of the time, I feel it and go, "What's the opposite?" The opposite is sharing their book that's coming out. The opposite is sharing their album. The opposite is telling people to vote for their favorite podcast, whatever it is, right?
- Tauren: Yes. Yes.
- Annie: So it's not that we don't feel like. Because I think a lot of times when we talk about this stuff people are like, "Well, they just don't even feel competitive." I'm like, "Except always."

Tauren:	I don't even let my kids win games. I mean, I am the epitome of competitive, which is why I think I've had to be on my particular journey, which has been learning and growing in humility. Now I'm just so humble, Annie, and it's really remarkable.
Annie:	I mean, parenthood will do that to you. Own it.
Tauren:	Oh my gosh, when your kids are like, "Bro, you're not cool."
Annie:	Okay, so your boys there's four of them. The oldest is 11?
Tauren:	Close. Nine.
Annie:	Nine. And the youngest is little. Banner is tiny.
Tauren:	Yeah, don't put me in middle school yet. I'm not ready for that. Yes, Banner is one. Navy is four, Lawson is six, and Kanaan is nine.
Annie:	This whole month we scheduled all of our shows with all of our friends, and then we looked at the calendar in June and the month of Father's Day we had all dads as guests.
Tauren:	That's cool.
Annie:	We're like, "Okay, Lord, we see you." So it's all dads this month. So my question for you is, what have you learned about God or what have you learned about yourself that God entrusted you with four men to raise?
Tauren:	Oh, Jesus!
Annie:	Right.
Tauren:	You don't have the time.
Annie:	We need Him.
Tauren:	This episode isn't long enough. Man, there is so much. I don't know where to begin. I guess I would start with saying one of the greatest revelations I've had about parenting is that God loves my kids more than I do.
Annie:	Wow.

Tauren: So a lot of your life as a parent is spent worrying and trying to plan how you're going to strategically prepare these human beings to be decent human beings, to be people who actually love Jesus, who appreciate the church.

And being in ministry in particular, I've wrestled with church being the thing that takes me away from my kids as opposed to being the thing that we all do together. So there's been a tension point in that. But in all of that, I have just realized that God really loves my kids. He really, really, really, really desperately loves them.

Now I have like a metric for that, because I love my kids and I can't even explain the depth of love and protection and what goes into, you know, how I think about them and how I feel about them. And that is imperfect and human.

So to know that this perfect, loving, omnipresent God is always with them, pursuing them is so important. And it takes a burden off of my shoulders to know I am not going to get it all right, but God's grace is going to be seen in that and found in them.

- Annie: It sounds like you just had to wrestle to the point of release..
- Tauren:Yes! Well, it came to a place where I was going out of town, and you know, I pray
with the boys every night before bed. This was when Kanaan was little, and I was
leaving, and I said, "Lord, while I'm gone..." And the Lord stopped me right there.
And it was like, "They're mine when you're here."
- Annie: Wow! Wow!
- Tauren: Just because you're not in the house doesn't mean now I'm on duty.
- Annie: It's not shared custody.
- **Tauren:** No. "These are mine. These are mine. Not only do you need me when you're gone, you need me when you're here." And to know that it's not an indictment in that it's a promise, it's that God is really with them. I know as we move into the middle school, high school years, we're going to really need to be reminded of that truth.
- Annie: And you get to go through the middle school, high school years for some time, for a bunch of years. You got those people spread out across a decade.
- **Tauren:** Those people, yes, they're spread out. It's wild.

Annie:	Okay, while we're talking about kids, you know our friends that get the AFD Weekend Review emails on Fridays get to ask you questions. We told them we were talking to you. And for starters, I told you about half the people said how much they love the theme song that you're singing on for That Sounds Fun.
Tauren:	[singing] That sounds fun. Does that sound familiar, guys? That's me.
Annie:	That's it. Thank you so much for doing that, again. That was such a kind thing for you to do.
Tauren:	Oh, happy to do it. Are you kidding?
Annie:	That was awesome. So one of our MiniBFFs, one of our six-year-old friends, Cadence, you were her first concert in October, and this is the question she submitted that you get to answer in an auditory way. How do you do the moonwalk? That's her question. How do you do the moonwalk, Tauren? That's what Cadence would like to know.

Tauren:	With parental supervision, get on YouTube.
Annie:	And that's it.
Tauren:	They will teach you how to moonwalk. It's all about the shifting of weight from your toes to your heels and keeping your heel flat on the ground when you're pulling back.
Annie:	Yeah, it's a pullback. It's not a pushback. You're pulling.
Tauren:	You pull. You pull. It's a glide.
Annie:	Yes. Okay, good. Thank you for handling that.
Tauren:	When you're learning to moonwalk, you kind of started like you knew what you were doing.
Annie:	I absolutely know the tech of moonwalking. I will make you this promise. If I win a K-Love Fan Award on Sunday, I'll do two steps of moonwalking.
Tauren:	I have actual video and audio evidence that this girl, Annie-
Annie:	I'll do it.
Tauren:	passed with the 20 pound K-Love trophy is gonna moonwalk in some hot pink high heels.
Annie:	That's it. That's it. I know. Let's talk for a second about church and traveling. I talk to a lot of parents, a lot of our friends who have jobs that take them out of town for one thing or another. And in our community obviously it's a lot of music and speakers, but there's tons of different jobs that take people out of town.
Tauren:	Oh, yeah.
Annie:	And you said an interesting thing about you don't want your kids to have feelings about church because of your job. And I bet every pastor listening and every pastor's wife or pastor's husband is hearing the same thing of like, yeah, how do we do that? So, Tauren, you and I love the local church. How do you instill that in your kids when it is ministry that has your family shaped a little differently schedule wise?
Tauren:	Well, there are layers to that answer, Annie.

Annie:	Okay.
Tauren:	First of all, we can't have our identity wrapped up in our position or status in the local church. I think we have to do some honest evaluation of why we feel the need to be so busy and so involved in every single thing.
Annie:	Wow.
Tauren:	Now busyness is the badge of honor in Christianity. It's like if you're busy, if your marriage is on the verge of divorce and you're burnt out and your habits are unhealthy, but man, you're going and doing everything, you're at every volunteer thing, you're in the hospital, you know, then that's like the badge of honor. I don't believe that that's what God has called us to.
Annie:	That's right.
Tauren:	He has called us to fruitfulness not busyness. And the two are not the thing.
Annie:	Fruitfulness not busyness. And fruitfulness takes time.
Tauren:	Fruitfulness takes time and it takes rest. You know, a lot of things that grow are seasonal and there's a season that they take off. So I think it's very important that we evaluate our level of interaction. How much energy are we putting into it that's just frantic and busy versus what is really intentional and God-called?
Annie:	Right.
Tauren:	I think that clarifies a lot of it. The other thing to know is that church is not going to rise and fall on your involvement.
Annie:	Wow.
Tauren:	Like, yes, you can help, but it's God's church. Yes, you steward, but it's God's church. So to think you have to go down in a blaze of glory being the heroic pastor or volunteer that shows up for everything while your kids or your family or even your inner life is completely chaotic and unattended to, that's not what God has for us. And then I would just say, include your family as much as you can. Oh, man-
Annie:	Do you bring up boys and Lorna on the road a lot?

- **Tauren:** As much as I can, yes. Now, I want them to have their own sense of identity and their own things happening. So if they're out on the road with me they can't play flag football.
- Annie: Oh, right.
- Tauren:You know, if they're on the road there are things they can't do. So I want them to be
able to do those things. But we pick our moments and we make it an adventure.
And that's the other part that I feel like we really have to get back to is, like, I read
to my kids from the Adventure Bible.
- Annie: I love that one. I think it's so fun.
- **Tauren:** It's so fun. But then you grow up and you turn 30 in your life is not an adventure.
- Annie: Yes, yes. That's exactly right.
- **Tauren:** It's bills in the house and the cul de sac and all of that. How do we find ways to bring the wonder of what God is doing into our everyday lives? A lot of times that's through serving, it's through getting involved in the community, it's through giving back, you know, gifts at Christmas, things like that, where the wonder is alive in the hearts of our kids.
- Annie: I mean, there's so many of our friends listening may feel this themselves about church, that they served like crazy in their 20s and now they're in their early 30s and they're exhausted with it. Or they grew up going to church every time the doors were open. And now they're like, "I live in a new city, and I haven't found a church, and I'm just not interested."

What's the why behind any of us go into church at this point when we can watch online? I can watch your pastor online. I can watch any pastor I love globally online. What's the why for getting into your church?

- **Tauren:** Well, I think it's different for different people. But I just have to go back to the Scripture.
- Annie: Oh, oh.
- Tauren: Because I mean-
- Annie: Let's go. You're right.

Tauren:	There are a lot of feelings about it and there are cultural movements and trends toward attendance in a way. I understand all of that. I understand that you can be a Christian in isolation. You can. But if I go back to the Scripture, it says those that are planted in the house of the Lord flourish.
Annie:	Tauren, that's it.
Tauren:	There's a difference between being planted and visiting, you know?
Annie:	Say it.
Tauren:	I think if you look at church attendance trends, and this is, again, not an indictment, this is just an observation, church attendance trends say people who feel that they are committed members of their church attend once per month.
Annie:	I think about that a lot with our teaching that you do, that I do, and it's like, "Y'all are here once a month?"
Tauren:	Yes. You're not getting the songs, you're not getting the sermons, you're not getting the community. And the thing is, if we do not put ourselves in a place where we are planted and rooted in the house among the community of believers, you may have growth in a certain season of your life, but you're not going to flourish.
Annie:	It's the fruitfulness thing, right?
Tauren:	You produce fruit season after season, stage after stage, phase after phase. And eventually if those roots do not run deep, a storm comes, it's over; a flood comes, it's over.
Annie:	Yeah, that's it.
Tauren:	Something you don't expect happens You need to have the roots you need to have the community. And I'll just leave this last scripture, which is "forsake not the assembling of yourselves together." This is the Bible. Either it has authority in our lives or it doesn't. So I understand the cultural trends, I understand we all got into a habit of being able to go out to a brunch on a Sunday. What?
Annie:	Yes, that's right.
Tauren:	Who gets to do that? There's a benefit to being planted in the house that far outweighs the convenience of watching online.

Annie: I said to a friend recently, I felt like the Lord... And this is just my story. So I'm not putting this on anybody else. But in a city, which a lot of us live in, in a city that has a lot of good churches. And when something goes sideways, one place it feels easy to switch to where your other friends are, or where your other friends are, or where your other friends are.

I just felt like the Lord did this reminder to me of like, "Hey, if it was 1850, there'd be one church. So I want you to pretend like there's one church in your city. And that's it." So that's how I'm living. I'm like, "There's one church in my city, and I go to it." Because I want that fruitfulness, Tauren. I want long obedience in the same direction even in just showing up on most Sundays. I'm not every Sunday, I'm most Sundays, you know?

- **Tauren:** That's what I want too. And I think it's a great point. You can go wherever and get whatever. I think that there are valid reasons. And I think it would actually be a great podcast, like, valid reasons for changing your local assembly. I think that they exist. They exist.
- Annie: That's right.
- **Tauren:** But there is something so important. I think sometimes if... My wife and I talk about this all the time, because people come to us for advice and then we give them advice, and then they go to someone else and get advice because we didn't give them the advice that they wanted. What they wanted was someone to affirm all of the bad choices they were making, so they went and found a friend that would affirm it. And I think sometimes we want to put ourselves in contexts where we're less known because we're less accountable.
- Annie: Yeah, yeah, that's exactly it. That's exactly it.
- Tauren: If we can stay in one space I think it serves us well.
- Annie: Yeah, 100%. I think it matters a ton.

we get a lot of shine and we get a lot of spotlight, the investment on the artist's side, and everyone around me. My management team, my publicity team, the agencies that surround me, the labels, so many people invest so much. And there's always the question in the back of my mind, will anyone care?

- Annie: Okay, but then you released the first single and it has millions of streams. Right?
- **Tauren:** I think they're looking good.

your influence with so much grace, amplifying other people's dreams, lives, and
bringing so much fun to all of us. We're grateful for you, Annie F.
- Annie: You're kind. You're kind.
