Annie: Really?

Annie: Uh-huh, Uhhuh. Yeah..

Annie: Have you tried that new loved one candle from ranger stations?

Santa: Oh, it's amazing.

Annie: I love ranger stations.

Santa: They're so good.

Annie: They're so good.

Santa: It's so good.

Annie: Supporting a non-profit. That is the one I've-

Santa: Very pungent.

Annie: But again it's not one of my top 10 years, but I had a great time. I think there's

gonna be something in my stocking.

Annie: Based on this list, I would like one of the gua sha stones and some of that Kylie

Jenner lip stuff. I do love her matte.

Santa: I know it's good for the podcast to ask this so I'll ask. What's the big ask for you
