**Annie:** Tim Ross, welcome to That Sounds Fun.

**Tim:** Thank you so much.

**Annie:** I mean, what an honor. Thank you for being here.

**Tim:** I'm grateful to be here.

**Annie:** We have been friends long distance on the internet for a while, maybe more. I've

been a fan. But it's fun because our podcast network across the hall... I mean, when we sit down for staff meetings, there are times where people are like, "Did y'all listen to Tim Ross? Did y'all hear this today? So thank you for the work you're

doing.

**Tim:** Thank you. I'm honored to be here. Really am.

**Annie:** Thank you. Okay, we're starting this year, 10th anniversary year, because the show

is called That Sounds Fun, tell me what sounds fun to you, Tim Ross.

**Tim:** What sounds fun to me is being on an island with Juliette with no cell phone, no

books.

**Annie:** No books, even?

**Tim:** Not even books.

Annie: Okay.

**Tim:** Just each other.

**Annie:** Each other.

**Tim:** Yeah, absolutely. I'm an introvert, so when the question was posed, I'm like, if I was

completely alone, then I would miss Juliette, so I need Juliette.

**Annie:** She's a star.

**Tim:** I don't even need my kids. Just Juliette.

**Annie:** I just listened to y'all's episode. We'll link to it. I listened to the episode of y'all

retelling your story of how y'all met. And I thought, Juliette is a star.

Tim: She is.

**Annie:** I mean, she's been hearing in the Holy Spirit since she was a teenager.

**Tim:** Well, she gave her life to Jesus when she was nine years old and she meant it. It

wasn't like, "I gave my life to Jesus young, and then I kind of went wayward and then came back." Nope. Nine, done. That's who she's been. The girl falls asleep listening to a British man whisper the King James Version of the Bible in her ear

when she goes to sleep. No cap. No hyperbole. That's what she does.

Annie: That's amazing. Okay, so you'd be on an island just the two of y'all. Because you're

a book guy too, like you're a reader.

Tim: I am.

**Annie:** Yeah, me too.

**Tim:** And when I say book, I mean Bible. I've read the Bible... Me and my friend

Preston—he's my twin brother, but we're fraternal. He's just taller—we made a covenant with each other in 2008 that we would read the Bible more than we read any other book. So since 2008, I think I may have read maybe 15 books outside of

the Bible. But we just go Genesis to Revelation and back.

**Annie:** Wow.

**Tim:** Like multiple times.

**Annie:** Do you switch versions or do you stick with one?

**Tim:** So I was 30 years King James and then I switched it.

**Annie:** Wow. Gosh.

**Tim:** Yeah, 30 years. So I have it all memorized in King James. But I switched to NLT

when I became a young adult pastor because KJV is like off-roading through the

Mojave Desert with a Honda Civic. So it just shouldn't happen.

**Annie:** You're right.

**Tim:** Yeah, it shouldn't happen.

**Annie:** So we have another podcast called Let's Read the Gospels, where I've been reading

Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John every month.

Tim: Oh, awesome.

**Annie:** So we did it all of 2023. Now we're on our 14th lap.

**Tim:** Wow, that's awesome.

**Annie:** It changes when you read it out loud.

**Tim:** It absolutely does.

**Annie:** Because suddenly I'm like, "Wait, what did Jesus say?

**Tim:** Yeah, absolutely.

**Annie:** Wait, what are you saying? I mean, it's been a wild experience being in the Gospels

that much. I haven't read the whole Bible that much at all, but I've been in the

Gospels much. It's crazy.

**Tim:** How did you feel about John 6 when you were reading it out loud and he's like,

basically, eat me?

**Annie:** It is so bizarre.

**Tim:** It's my favorite chapter in John 6.

**Annie:** Really?

**Tim:** Absolutely. It's my favorite leadership chapter.

**Annie:** Okay, tell me why.

**Tim:** Because Jesus is literally telling those people something that He knows they don't

understand and He refuses to clarify himself and lets them walk.

**Annie:** Yeah, that's right.

**Tim:** No American pastor would ever.

Annie: No.

**Tim:** Right? They would be in like guest central or the meet and greet, like, no, no, no, I

meant this.

**Annie:** What I meant was... yeah, yeah, yeah.

**Tim:** But he's literally adding by not even subtracting. He's slashing. Like he's turning

around to his own disciples and going, would you all like to go with them too? I always wanna remember that being unfollowed is actually more rabbinical than

being followed.

**Annie:** What is it you do? Wooo?

**Tim:** Yeah, exactly. You really listen.

**Annie:** I know. You gas yourself up.

**Tim:** I do. I do. I get high. I get high when people don't care.

**Annie:** I mean, you're right because it hurts my feelings so much when people unfollow

and tell me why.

Tim: Yeah.

**Annie:** But it should...

**Tim:** It shouldn't.

**Annie:** I mean, people are allowed to do whatever they want. I unfollow people all the

time. But you're right. My skin is thinner than Jesus' was.

**Tim:** Well, a lot of us are, yeah, in many ways. Yeah, for sure.

**Annie:** And I love when Peter says, "Where else will we go?"

Tim: Exactly.

**Annie:** It's almost like Peter's like, "Yeah, I want to go. But to where?"

**Tim:** Which seems like the most endearing statement. But I think Jesus' hypoglycemic levels were low that day. Because He's very grumpy throughout that whole chapter. And after such an endearing statement, Jesus' response to Peter is, one of you is a

demon. And I'm like, Jesus...

**Annie:** Be sweet to Peter.

**Tim:** Did you sleep last night? You must have had a long day. It's a fascinating chapter to

me. One of my favorites.

**Annie:** Talk to me about when you get pushback because you do specialize, some might

say, in getting pushback for things you say, and yet you keep going, but with

humility is my experience.

**Tim:** Thank you.

**Annie:** I feel like there is humility attached, but you do not waiver very often. What does

that feel like in your insides? Does it still hurt your feelings?

**Tim:** 2023, my feelings were hurt a lot, because I had been a preacher and teacher and

pastor for 27 years. And then the Lord's like, I want you to step down from being a lead pastor, I want you to now be a podcaster. The specific thing the Holy Spirit said to me was, The same way you have mentored and discipled in private is the way I need you to speak in public. My response was, well then I'm going to get

canceled.

**Annie:** Yeah, I can't do that. You write about this a little bit in Welcome to the Basement.

**Tim:** Yeah. I'm like, "I'm going to get canceled because you know how I talk in private."

I'm from Inner City LA, like the hood. My brother founded a gang. I reach people that are kind of hard, you know what I mean, and obstinate. So the Holy Spirit was like, "Go ahead and get canceled." And I was like, "Okay." And then it opened up a door to like a whole group of people that I've never had influence with, right? So

the way I describe it...

**Annie:** Because who cancels you is Christian.

**Tim:** Yeah, absolutely. And here's the thing...

**Annie:** That's true for all of us. Who gets mad is a Christian.

**Tim:** Absolutely correct. Absolutely correct. And these are people that loved me as a

preacher and a teacher. And that's all they've heard for two and a half decades. So then I become a podcaster and they've never heard that. I mean, what I say sitting

down on the couch is not what I would ever say in anybody's pulpit, right?

Annie: Yes.

**Tim:** So there's a decorum that I have there that I don't have to have when I'm on my

couch. I just didn't know He was gonna make my private life public in that way.

**Annie:** So public, right?

**Tim:** Here's the way I've synthesized 2023. I came out of 2023, Annie, with thicker skin

and a softer heart. I'm not cynical. I'm not walking around like, I got haters. I had to grieve... This is why therapy is so important. I had to grieve being misunderstood.

As a communicator-

**Annie:** It's the worst feeling, ain't it?

**Tim:** ...I hate being misunderstood. And now I have to live with it. Like I have to live

with it because... here's a delightful kind of way I've tried to explain it to my pastor friends. The 27 years that I was just solely teaching and preaching, if I was to land in one of Paul's epistles, it'd probably be Ephesians. I was preaching to Ephesians, right? The church that I led, Embassy City, for seven years, Ephesians, right? It squarely probably falls in there and a couple of chapters from probably Philippians.

As a podcaster, it's Corinthians.

**Annie:** Oh, okay. I thought you were going to say Romans. That would be my guess.

**Tim:** No, it's Corinth.

**Annie:** Okay.

**Tim:** I think that if any people from Ephesus or Philippi or Thessalonica would have

received one of Paul's letters from Corinth, they would be like, What is this dude talking about? Because he has to address things in Corinth that are completely different than Colossus. So I am answering people's questions. That's what Paul was doing in Corinth. He's answering people based on the questions that you asked about marriage and based on the questions that you asked about meat and based on the questions that you asked about this. That's my life now. I'm talking to

Corinthians, and Corinthians are off the chain.

Annie: It's easy for me to say sitting here, because no one's very loud mad at me today, that

I know of. I'm not on Twitter anymore, so maybe. But it's easy for me sitting here to go, okay, if Christians get upset with me and they're walking with the Lord, we'll be

friends in heaven. It'll be fine.

**Tim:** Oh, I will see them again.

**Annie:** It'll be fine. Yeah, and okay.

Tim: Yeah, it's okay.

**Annie:** If unbelievers come toward us because of that, then that's a win.

Tim: It is.

**Annie:** That hurts so much when it really happens. Because I go, Wait, we're on the same

team.

Tim: We are.

**Annie:** Like, I thought-

Tim: We are.

**Annie:** We love Jesus. Be with me as I'm trying to reach these other people.

**Tim:** For sure. For sure.

**Annie:** That's what hurts me the most is when I lose brothers and sisters as friends because

I think. And that doesn't mean I'm always right.

Tim: No.

**Annie:** That's the other thing.

**Tim:** Yeah, exactly. I could be completely wrong.

Annie: Yeah, but I'm trying. I'm just trying in front of all of y'all, and y'all are seeing it. So

that is the problem.

**Tim:** That is a huge, huge distinction. Yeah, exactly.

**Annie:** And it hurts my feelings.

**Tim:** It takes bravery to do stuff in front of everybody.

**Annie:** Yeah, it hurts my feelings. But it's been a masterclass watching you handle the

world.

Tim: Oh.

**Annie:** And just kind of go like, "I'm gonna keep saying this."

Tim: I am.

**Annie:** And be willing to change your mind as we go.

**Tim:** Yeah, absolutely. I can course-correct in front of everybody. I was sexually abused

at eight. So humor became my first coping mechanism.

Annie: Sure.

**Tim:** I started rapping when I was nine. I was a battle rapper by the time I was 13. So I'm

used to confrontation.

**Annie:** Fascinating. The Lord did that so early in such a different way.

**Tim:** Oh my goodness. So when I gave my life to Jesus, that has basically been dormant,

right? I'm not confronting Christians and going out trying to do it.

**Annie:** Not a lot of rap battles at youth groups. Sadly.

**Tim:** Well, I would have beat them.

**Annie:** Yeah, that's right.

**Tim:** But now in this season, it feels kind of like that. And it's kind of like, Except I don't

get to like diss you. I have to love you. So my skin is just thicker. 2023 was a year where I was just like, Oh, that hurt, that hurt, that hurt. Oh, I see what you're doing now. You're just getting that... I need some calluses so I can go out here and really do what I'm doing." So '23 was like, okay, I felt it all, and '24 I quadrupled down.

**Annie:** I had a little blip in '22 where I got in trouble with a portion of the internet, and

Beth Moore calls me. And when I saw her, "When it said "Living Proof" on my

phone, I said to my friends, "This is cool, and also this must be worse than I

thought." Because if she somehow got my phone number. And what she said is, "Your first one's your worst one." And she said, "But you should know it won't be your last one. And whether you make the mistake or not, it won't be your last one."

Tim: That's good.

**Annie:** And she said, "You have muscles now you didn't have before."

**Tim:** That's it.

Annie: And I thought, okay. And I can feel that a little bit. Something that would have

really thrown me two years ago, now I go, Okay, you can feel that about me. I can't explain away all this to you because I don't have your phone number and therefore-

**Tim:** That is exactly right.

**Annie:** I mean, it ain't not painful.

**Tim:** No, yeah, exactly.

**Annie:** It's just that there's muscles I didn't have.

**Tim:** That's exactly right. That's really good.

**Annie:** What's the payoff? What's the good side? What are you seeing God do when 2023

happens and you have a couple of blips that hurt your feelings and are public and

then you quadruple down in 2024? What's the beautiful side?

**Tim:** The beautiful side is watching people that swore that they would never step into a

church again, that they would never have a relationship with God again, that they would always stay in their homosexual lifestyle, that they would never forgive their father, that they would never utter the sexual abuse that they experienced or the rejection that they felt find a place that's safe enough and stable enough for them to do all of those things. Those are the stories that we have repeatedly. To have men

and women from the porn industry asking for prayer off of a clip.

**Annie:** How amazing.

**Tim:** To have PK kids who have seen more behind the scenes than they ever should have

seen be able to separate the actions of their parents from the actions of their God.

**Annie:** And reaching both of those in the same clip sometimes, that's a unique anointing.

You can't make that happen.

**Tim:** I can't take anything back. You know what I mean? I would love to be sorry for all

this stuff, and I'm not.

Annie: That's right. Some of my friends who don't walk with God yet, I think, Yeah, this is

worth it.

Tim: Yes it is!

**Annie:** That you love me and I love you and we're walking in friendship but your lifestyle

does not match... the fruit does not match the tree that I hope you become. I will

take some of the cuts-

**Tim:** Yeah, for sure.

**Annie:** ...if you feel like I love you.

**Tim:** Absolutely correct.

**Annie:** But it still hurts.

**Tim:** Yeah, for sure.

**Annie:** The beauty of that. Yesterday at lunch we were talking about you. So if your ears

were burning, you were part of our lunch conversation yesterday because I just finished Welcome to the Basement, your new book that is really enjoyable to read.

**Tim:** Thank you.

**Annie:** And I said, when you listen to people call in on this podcast, the last thing they

always say is, I love you. They say, "I love you, Tim." And you say back, "I love you too, Katie. Let me answer." And I thought, man, for someone who probably has people say, I hate you, or I'm disappointed in you, the fact that every person who

calls in says, I love you.

**Tim:** Absolutely.

**Annie:** That's just incredible that they feel that.

**Tim:** Well, it comes from a genuine place because they feel genuinely safe.

**Annie:** That's right. And seen.

**Tim:** And seen. So my mantra is that I want people to be seen, heard, known, still loved,

even if they're not agreeing with.

**Annie:** Even if they're upset, as you say.

**Tim:** Even if they're upset. If every human had that, there would be no wars, there would

be no bitterness, no anger because people need to be heard. They just need a safe space to be heard. We had a girl call in yesterday. She's the bravest girl of the

month.

**Annie:** Do you record every day?

**Tim:** No, we record on Mondays, but we do a live show for two hours and then we do a

pre-record with a guest.

**Annie:** Got it.

**Tim:** So the young lady that called in yesterday, she calls in and she says, "I was going to

make this anonymous, but I need you to..." I mean, Ooh, I'm a crier, so I get

emotional.

**Annie:** We got tissues right here whenever you need them. That's why.

**Tim:** But she goes, I was going to be anonymous, but I need you to know my name. And

she goes, I have genital herpes and I love Jesus, and I have sexual desires, and I don't know what to do with all this. I don't think anybody's going to love me with

this disease."

When I tell you it was like I had to contain my joy that this girl was brave enough to be seen and known. Not anonymous. If she was anonymous, she would still have been brave. But to say, "My name is Leslie. Here is what I'm struggling with. I love God. I am in my flesh. I am struggling with this, and I need someone to know it." And then to see hundreds of people in the live chat just start putting clap hand emojis, "We love you, Leslie. You're amazing. You're our hero. We are praying for

you. God's got you. He's got someone for you."

**Annie:** You're throwing a church service every Monday.

**Tim:** It's beautiful. It's what every small group should be.

**Annie:** Is it live on YouTube?

**Tim:** It's live on YouTube.

**Annie:** I know it's live on TikTok too. So it's live on YouTube. Y'all record it, and that's

how we hear it on the pod.

**Tim:** That's correct. Absolutely correct.

**Annie:** Got it.

**Tim:** I don't want to do anything else except continue to create spaces where people are

safe and the environment is stable to be able to handle the gift of people's vulnerability. And I call it a gift because you could never demand someone's

vulnerability, right?

**Annie:** That's right.

**Tim:** If they give it to you, it is indeed an extravagant gift. So when people choose to be

that free with the gift of their vulnerability I just always say thank you. It's very

appreciative.

**Annie:** Today's the day after Valentine's Day. You talking about this. You talk very openly

about what the Bible says about sex outside of marriage, inside of marriage.

Tim: Yes, absolutely.

**Annie:** The whole thing.

Tim: Yeah, for sure.

**Annie:** It's really interesting because... you and I agree. Before we get into this, you and I

agree. It is really interesting to hear you talk about sex and say a lot of the things we heard in purity culture and that people reject the whole thing. And I don't even like purity culture language. I think it's unfair to... Our parents were not trying, and

our youth pastors were not trying to wound us. They were trying-

**Tim:** They were trying to help.

**Annie:** ...to help us live lives that modeled after what God's asked us to do.

**Tim:** That's what they could.

**Annie:** I have issues with the whole language of that. But anyway, what we were taught

then is very similar to what you're teaching.

**Tim:** Absolutely correct.

Annie: But you don't back down on that at all. We did two episodes last summer about sex,

and we got chirped at so hard around the ones where they said, "Don't have sex."

Tim: Wow.

Annie:

And I'm okay with people having beliefs around that. Talk to me about the sexual ethic that you believe the Bible still represents even though purity culture is having such... people are so against what we were taught. We've thrown out the baby with the bathwater a little bit.

**Tim:** Yeah, for sure.

**Annie:** Is that what you think?

**Tim:** Yeah. So first of all, I don't like the fact that we as believers have been so tiptoed and eggshell-y around the whole conversation of sex and sexuality. It was made by

God. Sex was made for believers, and it was made for marriage between one man

and one woman. And in that context, it is absolutely glorious.

All sex outside of what I just mentioned is inglorious. It doesn't mean it's not good, because sex is good. He doesn't make it bad for those that are not married, and then only good for those that are married. Sex is good. Period. But you can't enjoy it, and it won't be honorable, and lets us in the confines of marriage between a man

and a woman.

Annie: And people who have sex outside of that feel like whenever we talk about it that

we're shaming them.

**Tim:** I'm not shaming them.

**Annie:** I know.

**Tim:** And if you're an unbeliever, I'm not even talking to you.

**Annie:** What map are you using? You aren't even on our map.

**Tim:** I'm not even talking to you. But if you call yourself a believer-

**Annie:** Yeah, that's interesting.

**Tim:** ...and you are engaging in sexual activity and you're not married, it's dishonorable

to both God and your body. That's just the book. There's no way around that. Yeah, exactly. So it doesn't matter... You can like it, I hope you like it. I was a young adult

pastor, so I dealt with this every four and a half weeks.

Annie: Sure.

Tim:

All I did every summer is try to keep people from having sex in their 20s. So they would come in, sit down, and they'd both have their head down, "Pastor, we fell." And I'm like, Okay. And I would say, "Did you like it? And it would be so disruptive.

Annie:

Like, I can't answer that.

Tim:

They're full of shame. Like, "Did you like it?" and so she drops her head, he looks away. And I'm like, "Okay, so tell us how you got here." "One thing led to another and the next thing you know..." That's not how sex works. It's not the next thing you know, you get hit by a car. The next thing you know, you can get shot. The next thing you know, you can't have sex. That's not the way sex works.

I said, so let's put boundaries around, and then let's remember why marriage is the best place for sex. And giving them that reminder was their way to either you're not marriage material, but it was fun. Or, yes, we wanna get married and we're not gonna do it again until our wedding day. And that's the covenant.

Anytime I did premarital counseling, the fourth question I always ask is if you've had sex. I always buried it. If they didn't, I could tell by their body language and their mouth. If they did, even if they lied, their body language told the truth. And if they did, the only thing I would tell them is, hey, I hope you enjoyed it. I hope you took a picture, mental snapshot. As long as I'm doing your premarital, you can't do it again until you get married. I will check in with you and hold you accountable every single week that we do this. And three strikes and you're out. It's not difficult when it's in the light. It's difficult if it's hidden. If it's a secret it's difficult. But if it's in the light, it's not.

Annie:

One of the things I've really enjoyed, put that in quotes, in the last year is like, let's have this conversation about sex, especially, you're a married guy, I'm an unmarried woman. And I'm like, we have got to talk about that we are all bodies. I still have a body.

Tim:

That's absolutely correct.

Annie:

So I've had to sort out for 43 years what to do with my body.

Tim:

Yeah, for sure.

Annie:

...and figure out what does it look like to honor God with what I've been taught, with what the Bible says, with what I'm feeling, with what He's saying and doing, and where I want to go.

**Tim:** That's good.

**Annie:** So I like talking about it because I'm like, we've got to help these other... there are

so many friends of ours, yours and mine, who are 38 and single-

**Tim:** It's very true. Very true.

**Annie:** ...and they're like, the Bible didn't talk to me about being past 14.

**Tim:** That's right.

**Annie:** Like, the Bible didn't talk to me-

**Tim:** That's really funny.

**Annie:** Right?

**Tim:** It's so true.

**Annie:** Zachariah and Elizabeth didn't have a baby till they were in their 80s, but they

didn't start sleeping together in their 80s.

**Tim:** That's right. That's exactly right.

**Annie:** A lot of my peers... So will you talk for a second to the singles? Talk to our friends

in their 30s, 40s, 50s who are not married, they're going, "Annie and Tim, give me

a break."

**Tim:** Yeah, absolutely.

**Annie:** "I am lonely. I'm pissed and I'm going to do what I want to do because I'm old."

**Tim:** So this is the conversation that I love to have. This is the conversation that I wish

that more churches had in their small groups, but they stay too surface, because if they go off the little sermon plan, like, we're talking about faith in the Pastor's Sermon series this month, and it's like, I'm horny. It's like, oh no, we're in Hebrews

11. We have to stay here.

What you just said is two-thirds of this whole thing for singles. And I've had a lot of single people always say, well, it's easy for you to say, Tim, because you're going home to your wife. But my memory ain't short. I've been married for 25 years. My memory is not short. I know exactly what it means to be single. I don't know what

it means to be single and old. I do know what it means to be single, though, and having to keep yourself. I also know what it means to have a wife who is going through some things and there's a prolonged period. So a lot of people think that abstinence is only for single people.

**Annie:** Oh, we got to talk about this. Like sexual purity is only if you're not having sex?

No, it ain't.

Tim: No.

**Annie:** So my biggest encouragement to singles is you are training your body single for the

way it will operate married.

**Annie:** That's it.

**Tim:** Point blank. Period. If you want to know why the sacrifice is important, if you have

a desire to be married, it's because whatever you're training your body to do single

is what it will still do married.

**Annie:** That's the word.

**Tim:** Our bodies are machines. They are programmable. And if you program your body

for your vibrator, when you get married, whether your husband is into it or not, you will continue. You will not put your wand away. If you have programmed your body to pornography, then whether your wife or your husband is ready to be

intimate or not, you can always go to porn.

So in your singleness, you are training your body and its sexual desires on how it's going to operate if you choose to get married. Now, if you want to play the, I'm old enough and I'm grown and can't nobody get in my business, okay, but how many

pieces of your heart do you want running around the city?

**Annie:** I'll tell you one of the weddings I did, the couple lived together and were sleeping

together and they decided to be in separate bedrooms. Much like you, I just said,

hey, You gotta quit that.

Tim: Yeah, for sure. Absolutely.

Annie: And they both have jobs that keep them on the road. And I said, what you are doing

right now is showing each other that if I'm not with you, I'm not having sex.

**Tim:** Yeah, that's good.

Annie:

So you're modeling it every night you're in your house because whatever you do in this house is what you'll do in the hotel. So you're modeling it. So you're right. The training of your body is so important. So our friends listening are like, Okay, but I'm going to be 104 and have never had sex.

Tim:

That's going to be somebody's reality. At some point, you have to grieve what you're not going to get.

Annie:

My counselor and I did that about being... I was never a mom or a wife in my 20s. I was never a mom or a wife in my 30s. You gotta grieve that.

Tim:

So I have this story that is just spectacular because I didn't get slapped in the face. So I was an associate campus pastor at Gateway Church. It was Mother's Day. And afterwards, I was in the meet and greet section, this young lady comes up to me tears streaming down her face. And she's like, "I hate Mother's Day. It is a painful reminder for me that I don't have children and I'm not married. And that's all I've ever asked God for. I hate that Gateway even celebrates it and has the mother stand and you give them roses. All you're doing is digging a dagger deeper into my heart and my soul.

Annie:

So many women feel that.

Tim:

So she's pouring her emotions out in front of me, and the Holy Spirit gives me a word for her. Two words, actually. And when He gives me the word, she's still talking and she's just, you know, pouring out this grievance. And the Holy Spirit gives me two words for her, and I'm literally having a conversation with the Holy Spirit while I'm containing this woman. And the conversation I'm having with the Holy Spirit is, I'm not telling her that. I promise you I'm not saying that. Like, I'm going to disobey you today. And my quiet time is going to be torment tomorrow but I don't care. I promise you I'm disobeying you on this one. And He wouldn't get off me. And He goes, "Tell her, tell her, tell her."

And I finally I said, "I feel like the Holy Spirit gave me a word for you," and her eyes kind of gave me a glimmer of hope, right? And I was like, "Make that glimmer go." That's the wrong glimmer, girl. So she goes, "Okay." And I said, "You're not going to like the word, though." She goes, "Okay." And I said, "No, you're really not going to like what the Lord told me to tell you." And she goes, "Just tell me." And I said, "Drop it." And she said, "What?"

And you know when you obey the Lord, the first thing that comes out of your mouth is obedience, and then the boldness comes, right? Yeah, that's right. And she goes, "I'm sorry, what?" And I went, "Drop it." And she goes, "Drop it? Drop it? Drop it? Okay."

**Annie:** Wow.

Tim: "All right, I'll drop it." And that woman dried her tears, gave me the biggest hug,

and walked off.

Annie: Wow.

**Tim:** We ain't gonna always get what we want.

**Annie:** Listen, that's for married, single, mom, dad, everybody. You aren't gonna get

everything you want.

**Tim:** There's a lot of married couples who can't have children.

**Annie:** That's it. That's what I think a lot. I think when I get this, there's gonna be another

thing I want because I ate breakfast and I want lunch. So, I'm a wanter.

**Tim:** The misconception with us being believers is that our prayers are incantations. And

they are not. This is called the wowie zowie button. [wowie zowie] And it's when

you blow my mind. Our prayers are not incantations.

**Tim:** They are not incantations.

**Annie:** That's so good, Tim.

**Tim:** You are not about to get everything you want. Have you read the Bible? Did you

read it all the way through? Everybody ain't getting what they want.

**Annie:** I mean, Anna lived with her husband seven years and that's it. Like she never

desired it again. Yeah, right.

**Tim:** I just feel like we can make our requests known and then we have to hold the

tension that some of those requests is not in His will for us. And you may have to go to 15 weddings and have 15 different bridesmaids' dresses with 14 shades of olive and green and peach and orchard and whatever else they're doing and you may go home and you may never get married. That is a reality. And you could.

**Annie:** Yeah, that's right.

**Tim:** But if your relationship with Jesus is contingent upon this happening and that not

happening, child, you picked the wrong relationship because He ain't doing it.

**Annie:** The "drop it" is so powerful because you aren't saying, don't ever pray about it

again.

Tim: No.

**Annie:** You're saying, this expectation you have on God, you got to let that go. Because

then you get to run in the life He's given you.

**Tim:** Exactly. Because here's the thing, He already heard you.

**Annie:** Hey, that's it.

**Tim:** That part.

**Annie:** That's it.

**Tim:** Right?

Annie: Yeah.

**Tim:** And if you want to know if Jesus, who said Himself, "I'm tempted at all points yet

without sin," if you want to know if He can actually relate to that, remember He was in a garden, He made a request three times that went unanswered, and He

dropped it.

**Annie:** Yeah, He dropped it.

**Tim:** And He went straight to the cross. I believe this is the reason why in 2 Corinthians

12 when Paul has a request that he made three times to the Lord about his thorn, Jesus Himself responds. Not an angel. Not the Holy Spirit. Jesus Himself. Those words are in red. I think it's the furthest thing we see in red until Revelations. It is Jesus saying, "My grace is sufficient for you. Like, bro, I know what it is to pray

three times and not get. Drop it. Just drop it.

So Paul literally takes that prayer request off of the list. Imagine like going back to your like prayer group and going, "Hey, take that prayer request off." "Oh my God, did god answer it?" "No. I'm just not bringing it up no more and you shouldn't

either. I'm over it. I dropped it. Dropped it."

**Annie:** "He heard me."

**Tim:** "He heard me." Absolutely.

**Annie:** That's tough.

**Tim:** It is tough.

**Annie:** It is scary.

**Tim:** I've done it. I know what it feels like.

**Annie:** What my life is at 43, I could never have dreamed. I couldn't have dreamed. What I

could dream is wife, mom, teaching elementary school forever. Like I dreamed the

life that I thought when I was 23.

**Tim:** Yeah, for sure.

**Annie:** So the last time I started going out with somebody, I remember after the first date, I

came back and... well, you don't know me. I was like, "You know me, Tim, because you know me enough. I came back and I was like, "Well, here he is. Here he is, Lord." And I just said to Lord, "I wouldn't have done it any different. Now that he's here..." he's not here, we're done. "But now that he's here, I wouldn't have done any different." And I thought, I can't believe I'm saying that. But I haven't dropped

praying it, but I have dropped the "of course you're going to do this."

**Tim:** See, that's good. You're holding it with an open hand.

**Annie:** I still hope you do this, but the doors you're opening, I'm running through those.

**Tim:** Yeah, for sure.

**Annie:** I can ask, seek, and knock all to live long day, but there's also three open ones.

**Tim:** That's right.

**Annie:** So why don't I go through those and see what happens?

**Tim:** Yes, absolutely.

**Annie:** I mean, that's got to be how you ended up leaving pastoring for podcasting.

**Tim:** I hold everything with an open hand. I don't white-knuckle anything.

**Annie:** It is a gift to get to live without everything you want.

Tim:

It is. Paul says, I have learned, whatever state I'm in, to be content. This prefaces, I can do all things. I can do all things through Christ. It's not like superhero incantation magic stuff. I was in a Bible study one time on a Wednesday night and I was like, Do you believe in... we're all Pentecostals, right, so we're all...

Annie: Yeah.

Tim: "Do you believe you can do all things?" "Yeah." "I mean, do you truly believe you

can do all...? And I'm like, do you believe this scripture?" And everybody's going

crazy. I worked them into a frenzy and I said, "Then fly home."

**Annie:** Just fly. No walking.

**Tim:** Like fly home. I said, "If you don't have the right context to the scripture, it will not

work for your life."

Annie: Oh, wow.

Tim: "And if you think all things means that you can become a millionaire overnight and

not put in the work, that you're gonna have a great marriage and you're not gonna have communication, that your kids are gonna honor God but you haven't reflected in your life." No, that's not what it means. He's learned that whatever state he is in, he's content. If I got money, content. If I don't have money, content. I got a good

car, content. Forgot to ride the bus, content. I walked here today.

**Annie:** Yeah, you did. I was like, what? You walked here?

**Tim:** Because I'm content. It's a 20-minute walk. I am content that whatever state I'm in I

will be okay.

**Annie:** So then he follows up with "I can do all things"?

**Tim:** That's absolutely correct.

**Annie:** So now, instead of switching to "I can fly out of this building because I can do all

things", I'm learning this real time with you, what he's saying is, "in the state that

I'm in and what God has handed me, anything he brings, I can do.

**Tim:** I can do. That's why Paul's writing his happiest letters from prison. Who has the

nerve to be like, "Oh my goodness, it's the best time right now, Philippi."

**Annie:** And it's not prisons like our prisons.

Tim: No, no, no, no.

**Annie:** They weren't light.

**Tim:** This wasn't federal prison. This was a Roman prison. So that level of contentment

is a beautiful, attractive thing for us to aspire to. The happiest believers I know are

the believers that are content. Juliette and I have two kids. We lost three.

**Annie:** Both boys.

**Tim:** Both boys. We lost three. Juliette's been pregnant five times. Our first was lost.

Then we had Nathan. Then we lost two more. Then we had Noah. We are content. We would have been a family of seven. We're a family of four. We are content. We

grieved it. We cried it. We did all the things.

**Annie:** That's the thing. We get to hold them both.

**Tim:** My younger brother, Miles, we're 17 months apart, we were almost Irish twins. We

were very, very close. He was killed in a car accident on September 17th of 2004. I told God I would never preach for Him again. I had never felt pain like that before.

It was the darkest four and a half months of my life.

And then I realized that he doesn't owe me an answer. I was demanding an answer. Yes, and then I realized, oh my god, He's a King and He doesn't owe me one. Not that I didn't grieve or that I didn't... And I also realized He wasn't petty. Because I called Him all out of His name. I told Him in no uncertain terms, "I'm done with

You" and He remains faithful.

**Annie:** Yeah, that's it. That's it. You said it the other day He's kind to the... Oh, what's the

verse? You said it on the podcast. He is kind to the wicked and the ungrateful.

**Tim:** That's exactly right. He loves us. He absolutely loves us. So I learned more about

Him as Father and not this legalistic kind of image that He's a stepfather that you have to like really be on eggshells around like, that's mommy's husband and I just want him to love me. Maybe he'll adopt me one day. It's already done. He already

did all of it.

I think all of our reader friends will love this, that you like, let's define terms. And you go, I'm not talking about being a person of peace, P-E-A-C-E, I'm saying find the piece of their life.

Tim:

Find the piece of their life that's out of alignment, that needs to come back with God. That to be upset literally means to turn over. That's all upset means. I'm not out here trying to make people mad. But my life was turned upside down on January 14th of 1996. The Bible is the most upsetting book that's ever been written. Jesus had the most upsetting life that's ever been lived. And I've spent the rest of my days as an upset man trying to upset others.

Annie:

Yeah, it's great. I loved the definition of that. In fact, hold on, I'll just read it. It's page 103. Hold on just a second. Where you say, "Upsetters must love Jesus, love people, be spirit-filled, do good, and love life." I just thought, Oh, I love it. And then you dig deeper into each of those. But I enjoy it so much.

I appreciate the ways you talk about things that I don't love talking about, and we don't always agree. But I think, well, here's what we're going the same place in the end. So it's worth listening. And our friendship can survive us not agreeing on everything.

Tim: I bet you it can.

Annie: Man, I'm so grateful that you do that. What's the thing you're not talking about that

you're going to start talking about?

**Tim:** Ooh, the thing that I'm not talking about that I'm gonna start talking about, ooh,

incongruence. Okay.

**Annie:** Just in our bodies, in our lives?

**Tim:** In our bodies, in our lives, and in the church.

**Annie:** Oh, okay.

Tim:

Because what I realized from last year is that I was getting a lot of commentary reaction videos and everything around my congruence. I realized what was really disrupting you is you think I'm wrong, or you think this isn't biblical, or you think I got the scripture out of context on these things, but I am congruent in where I am right now, right, wrong, or indifferent.

But some of y'all that are making the commentary about me don't have that same congruency because you do use strong language. You do watch certain things. You do have a cigar coat and a bourbon on the weekend and then you preach on Sundays. And you have-

**Annie:** And you would say that's incongruent.

**Tim:** You're growing duplicity-

**Annie:** Ah, okay.

Tim: ...to the point every person I've seen in ministry that winds up having this

incongruence, winds up turning into some form of Samson looking for Delilah to lay his head. And I'm like, I am in private who I am in public because I just showed you. So there's nothing more to learn about me. Whatever I'm doing now is what I'm really doing now. So that's what I'm starting to... I've been musing about it.

People think I talk flippantly. I don't. I think along. I used to tell the elders of Embassy City that you don't actually pay me to preach, you pay me to think. That's right.

**Annie:** You have to sit there a long time.

**Tim:** I think before I speak.

**Annie:** You speak fast. I do. But it's because you've been thinking before.

**Tim:** I thought this thing out. I could have thought it for seven months. So now that it's

coming out of my mouth-

**Annie:** But now someone's asked a question. Now that you have these questions about me,

I've been thinking about it.

**Tim:** Yeah, I've been thinking about it. So all the stuff they were coming at me with, I

had thought about it a long time before I did it.

**Annie:** Interesting.

Tim:

So it wasn't like I lost my temper and started using strong language. It was calculated. I meant exactly what I said, and I believe I have Bible to back me up on it. You know what I mean? So I believe the Bible's clear on some things. I've traveled around the world. When I go to England, I can't tell you how they talk in the pulpit. In Scotland and in Ireland.

So a lot of stuff is language. A lot of stuff is who won the last war. A lot of stuff is personal conviction. But it doesn't mean that it's a scriptural doctrine. So I'm like, I just wanna... why don't we just agree on where we can agree? Do you believe Jesus is Lord and that God raised Him from the dead? Do you believe that you need to repent, change your mind about the way you think, to be a follower of Jesus? If we agree on that, we are brothers and sisters.

All these other accents that we have... Southern Baptist has an accent, Church of God in Christ has an accent, Assemblies of God has an accent, Baptist has an accent, Church of God of Privacy has an accent, non-denominational people have an accent. In the same way, a New Yorker has a different accent from a Californian in Minnesota, has a different from New Orleans, baby.

So there's a lot of accents in the body of Christ. But we're all still believers and brothers and sisters. So I'm trying to find the places and spaces where we can agree.

**Annie:** And be congruent.

**Tim:** And be congruent.

Annie: Recently, as things have come out about some of our friends for years, I said to a mutual friend, I was like, "That was my slippery slope." And he says, Annie, that is a long way from A to Z. And I said, but-

**Tim:** But that's how you get there.

**Annie:** I know.

**Tim:** That's how you get there.

Annie: And he said, "Your life has been more boring than you wish, but I bet you sleep really good at night."

**Tim:** Annie, oh my goodness, I can't even believe you said that.

Annie: And that's right. My life has been... I have not had some of the spicy twists and

turns, but I don't have secrets either right now. I have, but I don't right now.

**Tim:** So we all have, right?

**Annie:** Certainly. We all go through having a secret life.

**Tim:** Some of us are brave enough to absolve ourselves from that. But you just said

something that the Holy Spirit said to me several years ago. I saw a lot of incongruence in the church circles that I was in. And I remember being at a conference and I could not stomach coming to the session because of what I knew

about this particular individual. And it was making me nauseous.

So I called Juliette in the hotel crying and I was like, "Babe, am I a hater? I don't want to feel like this." And she says, "Babe, you're not being a hater. You just can't

handle knowing that this person is in this room."

**Annie:** There's two different things.

**Tim:** There's two different things. So I was going to the Lord and I was like, Why don't

you do something? How is he still getting preaching engagements and I'm over here dying? And then the Lord let me have my little tantrum. And then the Holy Spirit said, "Hey, Tim, when you put your head on the pillow at night and they put their head on the pillow at night, who do you think falls to sleep faster? And it was about the only time I felt confident enough to say, "Oh, I know it's me." And the Holy

Spirit says, "Then shut up."

**Annie:** Then drop it.

**Tim:** Then drop it. I know I sleep better because I'm congruent.

Annie: Yeah, that's right. Because when I'm not, I don't sleep well. Well, also, because do I

think I'm the one who won't ever have an affair? No, I can do that. I could do that.

**Tim:** Annie, I try to tell people all the time, I don't trust my flesh, I do trust my

disciplines.

**Annie:** I've heard you say it. You just follow your disciplines. I think you wrote about it.

**Tim:** The Holy Spirit convicts me of sin and I just have some disciplines because I know

me.

**Annie:** Because I know me. Because you know what I haven't missed? A single sin. I have

perfect attendance. Perfect attendance. So I know exactly who I am. I'm the only one. The Lord and I are the only ones. I mean, I've got blind spots, but He and I are

the only ones that haven't missed any of them.

**Tim:** That's exactly right. Absolutely right. That's so funny.

**Annie:** I wish someone could convince me that there is a sin available that I won't pursue

given enough boring time and energy.

**Tim:** Absolutely correct. We are all capable.

**Annie:** I'm so capable, dude.

**Tim:** Of all the things.

**Annie:** I'm so capable.

**Tim:** When I tell you all the things, all the things people... Yeah. Girl, we could talk all

day.

**Annie:** All the things, yes.

**Tim:** That would be... I'm telling you, yeah.

**Annie:** So I'm like, one DM. Yeah. Dear everybody, one DM is the start.

**Tim:** Absolutely correct.

**Annie:** That is the little yes-

**Tim:** That's absolutely correct.

**Annie:** ...that's gonna get you to a big yes, and I did it.

**Tim:** Absolutely correct. I'll never forget when I was a young adult pastor... I was 30

when I became a young adult pastor, and the median age of our young adults was like maybe, 24, 23. And in the four years I was a young adult pastor, I was attracted

to three of the young ladies. Now, attraction is not something you plan. All

attraction is information. Attraction is not a sin, lust is.

**Annie:** That's right. What you do with it.

**Tim:** And our reactions to our attractions can be sinful. So you wind up doing counseling

sessions with everybody when you're in that type of deal. It's like Grand Central Station. One person comes in and out. So they come out, they come in, and I'm like,

"Wow, your parents are great collaborators."

**Annie:** Yeah, that's right. Your parents are great collaborators. Amen. What a great

compliment.

**Tim:** Obviously I have enough professionalism to get through the counseling session.

When they leave, I call my admin in and I said, "I cannot meet with her ever again. Assign her to a new pastor." And they're very defensive. "What did she do to you?"

"She did nothing."

**Annie:** "She did nothing."

**Tim:** I said, "I found myself attracted to her and I think it's very unprofessional if I'm

looking forward to counseling session."

**Annie:** That's it.

**Tim:** I shouldn't be looking forward to them. And I would be looking forward to seeing

her again. And I don't need to know anything else about her.

**Annie:** That's it.

**Tim:** And then I go home to tell Juliette. And then I'm free.

Annie: And then you're free. That is the part people don't realize. The minute I sent the

screenshot to Kelly, I went like, "I'm free." Anybody can do anything now.

**Tim:** Yeah, absolutely.

**Annie:** Because it's not a secret.

**Tim:** That's exactly right.

**Annie:** So if you find something about me on the internet and you post, I bet you're not the

first who knows.

**Tim:** Yeah, exactly. I don't have no secrets.

**Annie:** Yeah, it just isn't-

**Tim:** There's nobody doing any gotchas on me-

**Annie:** You're so free.

**Tim:** ...like, Ha ha, you were on this podcast and I heard you using strong language. I

did, and it was four of them. And then I said I stopped using it publicly.

**Annie:** Because you're like, which person expects me to be perfect? You've come to the

wrong place. So I'm not going to do this perfectly.

**Tim:** I've come to a conclusion for the Pharisees. My conclusion for the Pharisees is that

they will accept all of your life, Annie, 2,000 years from now if they get to read it in hindsight. Because I don't even know if Peter could be our apostle in real time, because he denied Jesus. I don't even know if they would have let Him back into

our churches. You know what I mean?

**Annie:** That's right.

**Tim:** Abraham lied. Moses murdered. I have no idea-

**Annie:** David. Gross.

**Tim:** David is out here slaughtering everybody. He gets plans for a temple. God's even

like, "Your hands are too bloody." You know what I mean? But you get Uriah killed, you marry Bathsheba, Solomon... everybody's reading Proverbs one chapter a day, and this dude had like 1,200 women. You saw every one of your wives and

concubines.

**Annie:** Proverbs 21 and also...

**Tim:** Which one of them women were you talking about? Who is the Proverbs 31

woman?

**Annie:** Which one?

**Tim:** So I just feel like we don't give grace for people's process in real-time. We can read

it in hindsight when it's all over.

**Annie:** We'd love a finished story.

**Tim:** Yeah, we would love a finished story. But we don't do well, in general, it seems, in

Christian communities, when people are going through the middle of their deal,

right?

**Annie:** That's right.

**Tim:** Like, we're hands off and then we're hands off. Oh, this pastor fell, so he's not my

friend anymore? Right. He's only not my friend if he can't see his sin.

**Annie:** Yeah, that's it.

**Tim:** That's the only person I'm distancing myself from. Like if you fell and you know it-

**Annie:** Yeah, and you still want to be in a relationship with me, yeah, okay, we can do

something.

**Tim:** If you sin and you really know what you're stealing, my friend.

**Annie:** Oh, that's beautiful.

**Tim:** I just made that up.

**Annie:** That's a great song. That was weird.

**Annie:** No, it was beautiful.

**Tim:** You know what I mean?

**Annie:** Okay, Tim, you got to come back sometime, please.

**Tim:** You are a delight.

**Annie:** Oh, mutual. That's very kind of you. And also, this is too fun. This is too good.

Tim: Yes.

**Annie:** Thank you. I can't wait for people to get Welcome to the Basement. It's pre-orders

now. It comes out February 27th.

**Tim:** That's right.

**Annie:** But thanks for writing this book. Thanks for what you do.

**Tim:** Thank you.

**Annie:** I really appreciate you.

**Tim:** I appreciate you too.

**Annie:** I'm grateful. I love you. Love you too.

Tim: Okay. Bye.
