But it was like I started listening to the first time we were on the show together. First of all, it was precious, because you're like, it's show 21, so you're still getting burned, right?		
Annie:	Yeah, so early.		
Eddie:	And you had just found out that day that you were one of Nashville's top shows. And you were tickled. It was you, Jamie Ivey, right? Like still one of Nashville's top shows, right? It was just all of these sweet and you were just so happy.		
	Then you had me on because I had started The New Activist. You had no business having me on. Sweet of you. But it was a little thing I had just started and you pitched the heck out of that show. It was just like, oh my gosh. It was just very tender.		
Annie:	Well, you know, the reason I had no business having you on about The New Activist is I was not an activist. You made me an activist. You have totally changed my life as far as that goes. So thank you for that.		
Eddie:	Oh, man.		
Annie:	Yeah, it's really funny that 2016 really is the year that our friendship became a real thing versus just fans of each other.		
Eddie:	That's right.		
Annie:	Because it's also the year that I auditioned for Relevant, that I got to be on the Relevant podcast, which is what really sealed us doing a show together that led us to know in the future we'd want to do a show together, that got us here. So thanks to Relevant, too.		
Eddie:	I remember being on Relevant with you and you know, there's a room full of peop and you're trying to figure out your placement. And I was like, "Well, here's one thing I know. I'm going to talk to her and then the other guys can just do their little dance and do whatever they need to do. But I like talking to her."		

Annie:	Oh, so fun. 2016. Here's the biggest 2016 news, second to our friendship. Calcifying. I do not use that word enough, and I think it's a great word.			
Eddie:	I can go either way with that word because it is a little medical to me.			
Annie:	Calcification makes me think of bones.			
Eddie:	I guess. But that doesn't make me think of a friendship.			
Annie:	So I'm with you.			
Eddie:	But it's not necessary for me to dig into this. It does also make me think of bones and nails and stuff, but it doesn't make me think of you. But fine. Anyhow, what else happened?			
Annie:	I just am realizing as soon as the word came to my mind, this is why we are big proponents of people reading is because when you read, words like that get in your brain that you would have never picked yourself.			
Eddie:	Right. You can cauterize your mind.			
Annie:	Cauterize.			
Eddie:	That's when-			
Annie:	That was really medical.			
Eddie:	Do you know what that is?			
Annie:	That word smells to me.			
Eddie:	That word smells.			
Annie:	I feel like I can smell that word.			
Eddie:	If someone's going to cauterize anything in me, I would need to be out because if I can smell cauterization happening-			
Annie:	No.			
Eddie:	I'm going to need to not be present. We've crossed into a medical territory that I'm not able to handle.			

Annie:	Yeah. I want to tell you a medical story about my LASIK, but I think I shouldn't. I think it's too risky.		
Eddie:	When did you have LASIK?		
Annie:	2016, actually.		
Eddie:	Oh boy.		
Annie:	Wow. Wowie zowie. The fall of 2016.		
Eddie:	Oh boy.		
Annie:	I had it the fall of 2016.		
Eddie:	What was the second thing you were going to bring up though?		
Annie:	It was great.		
Eddie:	What was the thing?		
Annie:	Oh, the Olympics. Because if there is a family who loves the Olympics, tis the Koufholz.		
Eddie:	Which brings me to an issue I have with you that I wasn't going to bring up, but then you've walked us into it.		
Annie:	Yeah, the Lord must have intended this to happen.		
Eddie:	Closing ceremonies of the Olympics won't be able to watch it this year. Do you know why?		
Annie:	I know, because we're doing the August 11th event at the Ryman. The closing ceremonies are also the evening of August 11th.		
Eddie:	It's worth it, but just I mean, that's about the only thing.		
Annie:	I know. Because your whole family's possibly going to be in the room and therefore		
Eddie:	Oh yeah. We'll all be there. I watched an Olympics holding Eve coming back from Ethiopia on an airport TV. I watched opening ceremonies. We're going to see.		

Annie:	Let's call it- If we were on top of the opening ceremonies, that'd be a bigger problem to me as well. Closing ceremonies. Everyone's gone home.		
Eddie:	It doesn't calcify my heart towards you. It does not.		
Annie:	Let's put like on a scale of 1 to 100, put opening ceremonies and closing ceremonies on that scale.		
Eddie:	Oh.		
Annie:	Importance, enjoyment. Give them both a score.		
Eddie:	Opening ceremonies have to be 100. I would never miss them. They're very special. It's a unifying experience for the whole planet.		
Annie:	Start to finish. Are you watching as soon as NBC, as soon as Bob Costas is landed in Paris? Are you watching from Bob Costas in Paris through Zambia? Are you watching till the end?		
Eddie:	Oh yes. Today's show coverage in the morning like opening ceremonies is until they go dark at night and then start repeating it. And then you're like, okay, I've already seen this, I can go to bed.		
Annie:	Oh, wow.		
Eddie:	Where are you?		
Annie:	Opening ceremonies, if there's something on TV that makes me wanna have people to my house and everybody watch it together and get decorations, that's a high 90s score. So for sure, opening ceremonies is high 90s for me. Where is closing ceremonies for you?		
Eddie:	So closing ceremonies is very difficult because you know it's ending and it's a difficult thing to kind of internalize. Do you hear that noise? I just got to call it out.		
Annie:	Is that the construction in your home?		
Eddie:	No, it is not the construction in our home. Craig, who is editing this, won't be able to get rid of this noise.		
Annie:	Oh, good.		

Eddie:	We have cleaners that come once a month to do a deep clean. They refuse to tell us what time they're coming, but they are so reasonably priced that we let them. I thought, "Surely they're not going to show up in the only hour today where I'm going to be recording my voice on a very popular podcast." Literally, I put on my headphones, and up the drive they walk. So, sorry, world. We got to get our toilets deep cleaned.	
Annie:	Sorry, world, we're getting a deep clean.	
Eddie:	There is no choice and I feel like everybody just needs to understand. And I'm really sorry, Annie. It's so unprofessional.	
Annie:	It's totally fine. It's totally fine.	
Eddie:	It's a 50% because part of me is so happy to see the athletes again, but then there's a progressive sadness because you realize the athletes from earlier in the games, two weeks earlier, have already gone home.	
Annie:	Way home. They're way gone.	
Eddie:	They're done. And they should be. I mean, I get it. And then it gets sadder and sadder because then finally the other country comes and raises their flag and you're like, "Oh, it's gonna be four years before I see this." And by the end of the opening ceremonies, I'm like, "This is a bummer, man."	
Annie:	By the end of the opening ceremonies, it feels like a bummer, is that what you said?	
Eddie:	No, no, no, I'm sorry. I probably said that, but I meant by the end of the closing ceremonies, I'm like, "How could this be over? Every night we've watched two hours."	
Annie:	If you knew how much my personality is, it's a bummer by the end of the opening ceremonies, because that means this is going to end. That is how I feel.	
Eddie:	You know how I know this about you? One time we were texting during a football game and Georgia was losing and you're like, "I can't see the end of it." And I'm like, "Can't see the end of it." Like I would never dream of not finishing. But it's not a pro on me or a con on you. It's just you physically-	
Annie:	I know.	
Eddie:	Can you just not do it? You just can't.	

Annie:	Because there are places I have to do it, where I don't have to do it. I don't. I do not force myself to suffer through pain and things that do not matter because it is so a learned skill for me to suffer through pain and things that do matter.		
Eddie:	But I also love that you just know it. You're like, "I just can't."		
Annie:	I'm like, sports, I have to be okay not seeing the end. I feel the same way about the World Cup that you feel about and there's a couple of soccer tournaments, but mostly World Cup, is how you feel about the Olympics, where like, I want to watch every game, I want to watch every minute. And as soon as the championship starts, I go, "Oh my gosh, it's going to be four years before we can see this again.		
Eddie:	It's really hard.		
Annie:	Where are the Olympics in 2028? I don't think I know.		
Eddie:	I don't remember. France this year. I'm only current Olympics.		
Annie:	Hey Siri, where will the Olympics be held in 2028?		
Siri:	Los Angeles for the 2028 Olympics.		
Annie:	America!		
Eddie:	We did know that because Brianne would have known that. She's already answering it as she's listening to it, I'm sure. Because we're like, if we're ever gonna get to an Olympics realistically, the girls will be 17 and 16.		
Annie:	Teenagers. It's brilliant.		
Eddie:	But let's focus on this year. Opening ceremonies, are you doing French food and stuff?		
Annie:	I haven't thought that far ahead. But yeah, I will now.		
Eddie:	Yeah, French food.		
Annie:	That's a great idea. Baguettes, cheese, butter, Claousou.		
Eddie:	Butter. Bread. Butter. I don't know.		
Annie:	Ham. What else? Croque monsieur. Croque madame. That's still all ham and cheese and bread and butter.		

Eddie:	When I think of French food, I think more of like riding a classic bicycle with it all in a paper bag and the baguette out. I don't know the food.		
Annie:	A basket with red and white checkered.		
Eddie:	That's exactly right. I just know I want food.		
Annie:	But I don't know what's inside. But I'll tell you what you know is inside: Bread, cheese, butter.		
Eddie:	Baguettes.		
Annie:	Yeah, and baguettes.		
Eddie:	Baguettes is a whole different thing. You know I like Lego. I like building. The most recent one was-		
Annie:	I support it fully.		
Eddie:	I know you do. And it's a great hobby for me. But I built yeah The Concorde.		
Annie:	The plane?		
Eddie:	The Concorde plane, which is the French plane. So that will be out on the, probably It'll probably be like a centerpiece.		
Annie:	I remember this, 2016, 2020, 2021, 2024.		
Eddie:	Yeah, all of them.		
Annie:	Tell me what your opening ceremonies will look like in the Kaufholz house. Will it just be the four of y'all or do you have people over?		
Eddie:	No, we'll have people if they're into watching it.		
Annie:	They got to be into it though.		
Eddie:	But you know, sometimes you have a Super Bowl party and it's just like, All right, it's okay. We're here to hang out and eat and watch halftime together. I personally like watching it and hearing commentators, but I'm like, I can see that point with, you know, like a Super Bowl. Olympics is like, you gotta be into this. You've got to care about the Olympics. So we will have some Olympics friends over. We will		

have a bunch of French food and of course a Lego Concord, which is something that we're all pretty excited about.

- Annie: Multiple baguettes and bread, butter and cheese, and ham. I also know sometimes on menus, they have green beans and French. So maybe there's French green beans.
- Eddie: That's what you get a KFC after you fast for a little bit. Just order it.
- Annie: I don't miss a green bean, man. If I'm a green beans on a menu, I am interested.

- Annie: Okay. So first of all, dear, anyone who's involved with the Los Angeles Olympics, please get the Kaufholz there.

Eddie:	I have a couple. Who do you think? Do you have ideas?			
Annie:	I think Seth Meyers could. I've heard scuttle about Tina Fey.			
Eddie:	That's the most defined scuttlebutt.			
Annie:	Tina Fey?			
Eddie:	Yeah. I think it's going to be Steve Higgins.			
Annie:	Oh, brilliant. Steve Higgins, for people, if you don't know him, he is the guy that stands off to the side during Jimmy Fallon's Tonight Show and also a writer for SNL.			
Eddie:	Well, and they're-			
Annie:	Also his son.			
Eddie:	Yeah. Well, he used to be a writer. He's now like a main producer. He is generally seen as the-			
Annie:	Of SNL?			
Eddie:	Oh, yeah, yeah, yeah. Steve Higgins runs SNL, really. And it just seems like age-wise, pedigree wise like he's a very safe bet. I would be thrilled-			

Annie:	Is he significantly younger than Lorne Michaels? I would bet he's 50.	
Eddie:	I would bet he's in his late 50s, but young enough to do a decade on there. Lorne Michaels, though, is sort of replacing the queen. Like you're never going to have a monarch.

Eddie:	Hold on.

	In our world, I think the other most interesting part is how many very practical ramifications there are to what the president says on our neighbors.
Annie:	Interesting.
Eddie:	So it's like if the president gets up there and says, "We're going to declare an emergency at the border, which he didn't say, but if he had said that, all of a sudden, all of our neighbors who work for FEMA, of which there are many, have a different job tomorrow than they did today. So that's the only weird part is it's like real people who are watching it to go like, Okay, my life just changed.
Annie:	Oh, right. It's almost like watching your boss do a live speech and your boss is telling everyone, "Here's how everyone who works for me is going to do their job for the next year."
Eddie:	That's right.
Annie:	You're like, Oh.
Eddie:	Right. I'm with my communications team and we have tweets written and ready that we're waiting to fire during the State of the Union. So we're watching it because we are responding politically, but we don't know what the president's going to say.
Annie:	So interesting.
Eddie:	So it's a very practical practical is not the right word. But it's a work night for people. It's a different sort of thing.
Annie:	That is really cool.
Eddie:	It is.

Annie:	I was wondering about that when I was watching, I was like, I wonder how this affects the Koufholz's life and Michael I mean, Michael and Melissa Ware are in politics so it affects their life in that way too. But for y'all who live there, like the all-day security.
Eddie:	It's a different deal.
Annie:	Fascinating.
Eddie:	Listen, I don't mean to move us along, but there's a couple of 2016 things we have to talk about. Can we do that?
Annie:	Certainly, yeah. We've done a great job so far with 2014 and 2015 really recapping the year.
Eddie:	I really feel like if people-
Annie:	So proud of us.
Eddie:	If people weren't paying attention those two years, they have a sense of it.

Annie:	Also let's complain to our boss, Lillian, who's my assistant, but she also makes this list for us. She put <i>Moana</i> as an honorable mention.
Eddie:	I mean, that was-
Annie:	Oh, because she made highest grossing films as a list. I was like, "Lillian, that's not honorable mention, ma'am.
Eddie:	The Moana soundtrack and the Troll soundtrack are very, very heavy rotation.
Annie:	Yes. The Adele Maybe 2016 is her breakout year. Is that what you would say?
Eddie:	I know.
Annie:	I mean, she had some good songs before that, but that album is unstoppable.
Eddie:	I would say most people did not know who Adele was before they heard Hello. I mean, Thanksgiving episode of SNL that year, they parodied it. Remember it was like the-
Annie:	Brilliant.
Eddie:	I make a rule not to recap SNL skits because I just don't do a good job of it. But it was like we are all listening to Hello and kind of don't know what to do with this. This is so good and different and special.
Annie:	Yes. Yes. We'll link to it in the show notes if people didn't get to watch it. What you and I could do is spend our lives recapping SNL.

Eddie:	It's more than that.
Annie:	I love it so much. It's my favorite one. And then that led to them being besties.
Eddie:	Yeah, it makes sense. They're both like cheeky English. Fantastic. Right. You know, I think they get the whole like his last show she came back on, didn't she?
Annie:	Yeah.

	Jimmy Fallon is everybody's fan. He is thrilled to be there. He is a huge fan of the work you do. He's happy to be friends with you. He's a huge fan.
	And Stephen Colbert is kind of your big brother. And then James Corden was like your little brother. I don't know, he was like your What is it? What's the word for the role he filled? It was so different than those other three guys.
Eddie:	It was because Kimmel is definitely the cool guy, also he's the only one of those shows that doesn't do a pre-interview. People walk out and he just goes cold, just goes for it.
Annie:	Only one filmed in L.A. now too because of James Corden not doing it anymore.
Eddie:	But there's a certain confidence that he has. And he's also just, you know but he is like your cool uncle, right? Jimmy Fallon is like your frat-boy buddy. I know he's not like Freddy, but he's just sort of like it's all going to be hangs. We're not going to get to
Annie:	He's in. He's in. If you had all their phone numbers and you're like, who's up for it? Jimmy Fallon's up for it. Whatever it is, he's up for it.
Eddie:	It was that. I don't know how to explain it. But you're right. It was like that brother or just like pal or it was like yeah, it felt-
Annie:	He made Harry Styles seem like a friend to me. Like I suddenly was like, Oh, Harry Styles is a normal person because James Corden is friends with him.
Eddie:	That's exactly right. That's really well put.
Annie:	I want to know James Corden. We'll just put that out to the Lord and our friends. I would love to know James Corden.
Eddie:	Put it out.
Annie:	I didn't want to say put it out to the universe because I don't really believe that the universe does anything for us. Putting it out to the Lord and our friends.

Eddie:	You can put it out to whoever you want because if they're big enough, they're probably hearing it. So just say whatever. I mean, go with Lord. If you happen to be wrong, which you're not, but if you happen to be, I'm pretty sure the universe is going to figure it out. If it's vice versa and everybody's talking to the universe and it happens to be God, I'm pretty sure God's like, I get it.
Annie:	I should be talking to Lord. That is-
Eddie:	I get the nuance of what you're trying to do here.
Annie:	Yes, yes, yes. I would like to be friends with James Corden. He seems like a very normal person to me.
Eddie:	Let's see if that-
Annie:	Is there a famous person that you see on the Oscars or you see on SNL or a Tonight Show or that you follow that you're like, We would totally be friends or we will totally be friends.
Eddie:	Will? I don't think. I don't have that kind of confidence in myself. But people that I'm like, I would like to hang with that person. I will say just cause we're fresh off the Oscars, I was like, "I think Kimmel and I I would love to go toe to toe with him in a fun way. I would love to learn what he knows about smoking meat and making pizza. I'll think of a better one. Do you have one? Do you have people?
Annie:	No, I don't think that. I don't think you need a better one. I think Jimmy Kimmel is a great one. You know, Jimmy Kimmel, I hear the Smartless guys talk about him a lot. Annie:	I think that group of friends would be an easy fit for you.
Eddie:	Sean Hayes, Will and Grace, just so people know.
Annie:	As for me and my house, who would I like to be friends with?
Eddie:	I will serve the universe.
Annie:	I mean, Jimmy Fallon I think Jimmy Fallon and Kelly Clarkson. I think what's going on at 30 Rock with these shows, Jimmy Fallon, Kelly Clarkson, Seth Meyers, I would like to run in their friend group.
Eddie:	You have always mentioned Fallon very endearingly. This has been a long time
Annie:	I've never been on his show. That makes one of us because-
Eddie:	You were more excited about that than anyone. Like you were tickled. But Fallon-
Annie:	I think about it. It's my Roman empire. I think about it so much that you got to be on Fallon.
Eddie:	Kelly Clarkson. You had to have had those comparisons drawn to you before Kelly Clarkson, right?
Annie:	Yeah.
Eddie:	Like Southern, really approachable, really nice.
Annie:	Thank you. That's very kind.
Eddie:	Not a hard connection.
Annie:	She's amazing. I'm so glad they've gotten her into hosting a TV show because she really is a Swiss army knife of talent.
Eddie:	She is.

Annie:	And Jimmy's that way a little bit too, Fallon, because he can sing. But she can sing. So her doing her show, like, when a musician comes on, she sings with them, or she opens the show singing. I really enjoy her show.
Eddie:	She's a true variety show host. Like, she can be exactly who she needs to be in any moment, and seems to be into it. Like, if she's doing a cooking segment
Annie:	To tie the whole thread, if I remember correctly, what I understood was happening last night on The Tonight Show, because I got I went and saw a musical, I can't wait to tell you. I got home, and on Jimmy Fallon was The guy who always hosts the Olympics, not Bob Costas, but I think his name is Mike.
Eddie:	Tirico?
Annie:	Yes.
Eddie:	Cool.
Annie:	And Peyton Manning and Kelly Clarkson. I think they're the NBC host for the Olympics.
Eddie:	That's fantastic.
Annie:	And they asked Jimmy on the show, which it was a cute skit, but I'm sure it was predetermined, to host the closing ceremonies.
Eddie:	Oh, that's fantastic. Oh, that's fun.
Annie:	Right? I know.
Eddie:	Good for them for bringing in It's interesting. It's an interesting move, isn't it? Because all of those I mean, Mike Tirico sports like they used to bring in it was more of a news based. I mean, I remember seeing, you know, it was like Tom Brokaw and the Today Show folks. It was like a news spin. This is definitely a sports and entertainment, which sure, why not? Just in case there is some world where we do know each other and I forgot, I put my first name." And then he says, "Oh shoot. So sorry. Wrong number. I don't know anybody with your name." I said, "Great." Then I thought, "Oh, that's too bad. And then I was like, leave it be Annie. Don't be this guy. Just leave it be."
- Eddie: Speaking of great catch and then just put on your website.
- Annie: Listen to this the next day at 11 p.m-
- **Eddie:** He's in. Here in. He's in.
- Annie: ...the number text again, and it says, "Wait..." No, eight o'clock was wait. And I'm sitting at dinner with two friends and I show them I'm like, "Oh, I've been meaning to tell you all this story." And my buddy that's with me, he says, "This is a scam. You know this is a scam, right?"

And I was like, "No, how would they know? How did they perfectly picture the right person to scam me?" And I was like, "No, this doesn't look like a scam. This looks like a wrong number." And he was like, "No, I'm going to send you this podcast to listen to," here we are, "I'm going to send you this podcast to listen to. But this is like a thing people are doing a scam." And I'm like, "Oh, that can't be true."

I don't respond. I just let it be. I'm like, "You're right. I'm going to let this go." And remember he had said, "Wait." And I had said, "Nice catch. But I don't think you meant to send this to a woman named Annie. And then he says, "Did you mean me or me or the fish?"

I let important people know. So my buddy sends me this podcast to listen to about scammers calling your phone and texting you.
Eddie:	Oh, no.
Annie:	It is a show called Search Engine. Have you heard of this yet?
Eddie:	Nope.
Annie:	Okay. You are about to. All your synapses are about to fire. Because it is by PJ Vogt who used to do <i>Reply All</i> .
Eddie:	Oh.
Annie:	For those of you who haven't listened, <i>Reply All</i> was a show that was about solving problems on the internet. Why do I keep hearing this song every time I go to this certain website? Why do I keep getting this email? It was a very interesting show about what happens on the internet. So you can read up about why that show doesn't exist anymore, whatever.
	So this is PJ Vogt's new show, and it's Search Engine, and it answers questions. Are chimpanzees unhappy at the zoo? So the question was, why do I keep getting texts that think that they know me? Or why do I keep getting scams that are texts? And he goes into the whole thing. And it is wild. It is a wild story.
Eddie:	Ew.
Annie:	It's very sad. It ends up with people in Asian countries that are being forced to make phone calls and send text messages. And it is really sad. But all that, because I got a bald villain in my text messaging.

- **Eddie:** Annie, on behalf of the listeners, of which I was just a listener with you on this, everybody that was listening to that, you walked us right off a ledge because bald villain, text, like, "Wait."
- Annie: creepy. Creepy.
- **Eddie:** I mean, we were all in. But the degree to which all of us, and I can speak for the entire listening audience right now, the degree to which we immediately fell off the ledge and just fell to our demise-
- Annie: Guess what? Me too. I blocked that number so fast.
- **Eddie:** I know this isn't lesson time. But like way to not go alone. I just feel like that was... it's both juicy and fun to be with people, but also it was like, your friends weren't going to let you. They were going to make sure you knew you were jumping off a ledge, which you did, you already knew this.
- Annie: That's right. And in the long run, I'd like to thank the guy who caught the fish because then I found a podcast I think I'm going to really enjoy.
- **Eddie:** I want to say one more thing because I know we're rounding third. There is one more thing that Lillian does on our sheet that is... I don't know that I know her well, but there is something fantastic that she does, which we're talking movies, cultural moments, everything. And then she includes snacks that were created in 2016.
- Annie: The best snacks that were created.
- Eddie: It is the randomest, wildest thing that I love. So real quick-
- Annie: Which of those stood out to you of the snacks?
- Eddie: Right. Well, it's just-
- **Annie:** The exact same.
- Eddie: Right.
- Annie: The idea that the VeggieHarvest was born in 2016. And I will pick that on an airplane anytime as one of the snack options. Because they're tiny. They're like the size of a cinnamon toast crunch. And they are amazing.

Eddie:	But snacks don't really have a public release to this. They just sort of enter into the ether and then they disappear. And one day you're like, Where did Cheetos Paws go? And you're like, Oh, it's been 25 years. I got it.
Annie:	Right.
Eddie:	But seeing her list out the snacks, we're like, It's weird. There was a time before white cheddar popcorn. Annie's organic white cheddar popcorn. We don't need to know that.
Annie:	Exactly right.
Eddie:	But it is funny to think that it existed.
Annie:	I'm glad we don't have to live in that world anymore or the world without Sheila G's brownie brittle, because I live for that stuff.
Eddie:	I don't know what that is.
Annie:	What? I'm going to ship some to you right now if you think I'm kidding.
Eddie:	I don't think you're kidding, but I don't know what it is.
Annie:	You're going to love it. All right, Edward. Well, we've done it again. We've really done it again.
Eddie:	We really did 2016.
Annie:	Happy 2016 to us. Maybe we need to No, we should talk about this later. Maybe we need to do something around the Olympics.
Eddie:	You think? I mean, we're going to, whether we decide to do it now or we just decide to do it the day of. You know, we can't not.
Annie:	You guys buckle up. Annie and Eddie keep talking about the Olympics.
Eddie:	Someday I want to figure out a live thing with you where you can sign up-
Annie:	About during the closing ceremonies on the stage.
Eddie:	That's right. Fulfilling a lifelong dream of appearing on the Ryman.
Annie:	And what does a live thing mean? What do you mean?

Eddie:	Like you could simulcast. Like	
Annie:	Oh, I see what you're saying. I see what you're saying. Where we go live.	
Eddie:	Yeah, I would like to go live to something and just watch it and react. Technically, I don't know if it's possible. I don't even know if you want to do it. And I really don't know if your brand needs it, but	
Annie:	Hey, Siri, when are the opening ceremonies for the 2024 Olympics? Oh, she just typed it to me. July 26. That's a short Wait, it opens July 26th and it closes August 11th?	
Eddie:	Yeah, they're only a couple of weeks on.	
Annie:	15 days?	
Eddie:	Yeah. They're not that long.	
Annie:	We got to get focused. We got to get focused.	
Eddie:	Dialed in.	
Annie:	I'm writing this down.	
Eddie:	Annie, happy 2016. Thank you for allowing me to podcast with you.	
Annie:	Same to you. What a pleasure. All right, friends go out and wash your hands.	
Eddie:	Bye buddies.
