Annie: Eddie Kaufholz, welcome back to That Sounds Fun for the 112th time or

something.

Eddie: Annie, it is truly an honor to be here. Let's get on with it.

Annie: Let's get on with it. We're supposed to recap 2017. I went

Eddie: Great year. It was fun.

Annie: It was a great year. Was there a pandemic that year? No.

Eddie: I don't think so.

Annie: Yeah, so we're great.

Eddie: We knew each other. Kids were healthy. I was 37.

Annie: I was also 37. This is the thing about us.

Eddie: So are we good?

Annie: Yeah, we're good. Eddie, you've started a new company.

Eddie: Oh, this can't be what we start with.

Annie: A hundred percent. Your emails for Pillar are so strong. I've told you Pillar was my

favorite hard rock band of my life. So having another Pillar in my life feels so

beautiful and good.

Eddie: Okay, what was the hard rock band? I'm not trying to defuse, but I did not know

this. I don't know that I knew Pillar.

Annie: They were a Christian hard rock band, and I loved them.

Eddie: That seems on brand. Do you know what was-

Annie: It's one of the wildest decisions of my life, but I thought they were wonderful.

Eddie: Do you know what my first band in high school was called?

Annie: What?

Eddie: Red Letter. Do you want to know why it was called Red Letter?

Annie: Does it have to do with Jesus talking?

Eddie: It has to do with the DC Talk song called Red Letter, which is about that.

Annie: Wow, Eddie. Oh, I love that so much.

Eddie: I remember as upset as I was in college one time, or no, in high school, they called

us the Red Letters. It was like on that thing you do and they called them the

O'Neeters.

Annie: O'Neeters. Yeah, O'Neeters.

Eddie: The Red Letters? No, we're just Red Letter. There is no definite article.

Annie: What did you play in the band? What was your role?

Eddie: I'm going to give you multiple choices.

Annie: Okay.

Eddie: And let's start with knowing that I am average White male growing up in the

evangelical 90s. What did I play in the band?

Annie: Guitar.

Eddie: Yeah. You want to go a step further on what kind of guitar?

Annie: We got three. We got a bass, we've got an electric, we've got an acoustic.

Eddie: And he loves Bebo and he loves Third Day.

Annie: Yeah, yeah, yeah. He's acoustic. Are you also the lead singer?

Eddie: One of. There were two of us. I sing a lot.

Annie: Oh, you sing the harmony. Great.

Eddie: Enough about that.

Annie: Give us the first name of the other guy.

Eddie: James.

Annie: James.

Eddie: And then there's Tyler as well.

Annie: Oh, great. How are they?

Eddie: They're doing great.

Annie: Great. Are they still in Florida?

Eddie: No. I don't think so. One's in North Carolina. I'm not sure where James is.

Annie: Well, whenever Red Letter gets back together. Man, had I known this before we

planned the Ryman on August 11th, we'd have had Red Letter opening for me.

Eddie: Let me just say I'm pretty sure they're available.

Annie: Okay. Well, it's worth a check.

Eddie: Our tour schedule is wide open. Wide open.

Annie: You're already booked on the 11th, sorry, bud.

Eddie: Oh, yeah, I got a whole thing to do. Okay, Pillar.

Annie: Okay, Pillar. Explain to us Pillar that you've started because it looks so cool. The

email you sent this week of like, what is Pillar? And you explained it beautifully.

Eddie: Oh, that's sweet of you, Annie. Basically, I have a lot of really talented friends that I

Annie: I don't even know how to start this. When I tell you all I've thought about for 15 to

17 days is this moment right here.

Eddie: You and I have been in an ice cold because I know, but we haven't talked and we

haven't... we've just been waiting for it. So how do we start this? [inaudible

Annie: Do we start with the text? No, no, you say. Do we start with the text I sent you

maybe?

Eddie: I do want to start with the text that you sent me.

Annie: Okay, so two weeks ago approximately, I sent you a text at 10:30 on a Saturday

night. Dear listener, that is abnormal for Eddie and I. That's abnormal.

Eddie: It is also not abnormal that I didn't reply till the next day because I was already

asleep.

Annie: Yeah, yeah.

Eddie: 10:30 we have a dog. I'm out of here.

Annie: Oh, we have a third announcement. You have a dog. Oh, what have you done?

Eddie: Baby Higgins. That's its baptized name. You can call him Higgins. But Baby

Higgins is his Christian name. And he's a sweet boy, but he's also a baby. So we're getting up one or two times a night. Anyhow, I'm asleep, apparently I get a text. So I wake up... Now it's important to know that this text came in on a Saturday night.

Annie: That's right. At 10:30 Eastern.

Eddie: We do not evening text. That is not normal. So I get up the next morning and I see

the text. And Annie, what is the text?

Annie: These are the exact pictures I'm going to put on Instagram today because I have not

shown them at all. I sent you a picture of me with a ticket to Saturday Night Live.

Eddie: That ticket is the most iconic.

Annie: And they keep it. You're gonna get to ask me so many questions. They keep the

ticket. I do not know why the Lord loves me enough to give me the idea to take a

picture of it to send to you, but I do not have the ticket. They keep it.

Eddie: That is the most iconic piece of paper.

Annie: That's the part. I know. I know. Because they don't let you have it.

Eddie: You can buy shirts with that piece of paper on it. Like, okay.

Annie: When you exit... oh God, there's so much to talk about. When you exit into... you

have to exit into the NBC store.

Eddie: 30 Rock Lobby. Can we do the whole thing in order? Because I need to go in order.

Annie: Yes, yes, yes, yes.

Eddie: This is my show.

Annie: Yeah, now take over, take over, yep.

Eddie: 2017, heck of a year. So proud of you. Annie F. Downs, I've been on for a while.

Literally, welcome.

Annie: Yeah, great, thank you. That's what this show was about. We're celebrating 10

years. This show, we interrupt our regularly scheduled broadcast because a life

dream came true for one of us. A life dream came true for both of us.

Eddie: Now, you get a SNL ticket, which notoriously is one of the hardest tickets in all of

the planet to get, outside of getting a ticket to the Masters, maybe?

Annie: There are 200 seats. That's it. Two hundred seats.

Eddie: Two hundred seats. And there's a rehearsal, which you did not get because you had

already been... you missed it. You were showing me the ticket after the dress

rehearsal, which would be great to get. And then there's the real show.

Annie: That's right.

Eddie: How do you get a real show ticket? Can we say this?

Annie: Yeah. Well, what I can say is that the show I got to go to was Ryan Gosling and

Chris Stapleton. So what happens is you and I have friends on the Chris Stapleton tour that are like work for Chris Stapleton. So when people from Nashville are in town, you tend to see them. So I had said, I mean, in a world where there's any

extras, of course there's not. There's never gonna be any extras.

Eddie: Of course.

Annie: And I was told, "Thank you for asking, there is no way."

Eddie: And our friend, who's the best, gets us into all kinds of stuff and is super generous.

I have been to so many Chris Stapleton concerts. Just crazy generous with this world he gets to live in. He has given me, because he's been to SNL before, has given me stuff from SNL. Like, right? So he's very generous. So you text him and

ask?

Annie: When I'm telling you, I sent a text to some people in the industry the day they

announced that Chris Stapleton would be on SNL, and I knew I was gonna be in

New York, I said-

Eddie: Oh, Chris Stapleton.

Annie: "Please." I directly texted Chris. No, I didn't.

Eddie: So when do you hear about that you get a ticket?

Annie: So all weekend long it's "you don't have a ticket." "Great."

Eddie: Yeah, no chance.

Annie: "Thank you for even keeping my phone number after I made this ask." I get home

from dinner that Saturday night, and I think, just don't wash your face. Put your

pajamas on, but keep your makeup on until 10 or 10:30, just in case.

Eddie: God, that is hopeful and thoughtful.

Annie: I was so hopeful. I thought, "This is my only shot. I can't imagine another time

where the overlap of a band that I know on SNL and AFD at NYC are going to

overlap. I just had no idea if this would ever happen again.

Eddie: No. Unless Gary Haugen gets to host SNL, like, this is the closest thing I have to it.

Annie: Certainly.

Eddie: Was Gary Haugen the right joke? I want to do better.

Annie: Yeah, yeah. No, people are into that.

Eddie: I want to work on it.

Annie: Okay. The only other one I'd suggest would be Mickey Mouse because you used to

live in Orlando, but I think Gary Haugen's closer.

Eddie: Yeah, but what would be a good one for us? Who would have been a funny... like,

for us? John Eldredge?

Annie: John Eldredge! I got me. I got me.

Eddie: No, I don't know.

Annie: The people listening are... I got it. So I am sitting on my couch, face done, pajamas

on and a text rolls in at 8:30 and says, "Can you be at 30 Rock by 10 PM?"

Eddie: Of course.

Annie: Oh, when I'm telling you I was staying... I mean, I texted you at... I was in the

building by 9:30.

Eddie: Of course you are.

Annie: And then it just says, "Here is your big long piece of paper with a lot of

instructions." So I printed one of those out at my apartment. I also had it on my phone. And I go and I show the people the paper. Now, last year, I went and saw

Seth Meyers, also in 30 Rock. Let me tell you something.

Now I've seen two NBC shows and I've seen two CBS shows filmed. NBC is light

years better of an experience.

Eddie: Their entire hospitality, like that room that you-

Annie: It's unbelievable.

Eddie: ...went in at the beginning, the wait is unreal.

Annie: What did you see that you went in there?

Eddie: Fallon. Fallon at 30 Rock.

Annie: Yes, yes, yes.

Eddie: What people may or may not realize is you go into 30 Rock into the Tina Fey 30

Rock entrance. You go in, big gold doors right next to the ice cream store, in you

go.

Annie: CBS shows, you wait outside, by the way. CBS shows, you wait outside. Outside of

Stephen Colbert, outside of Drew Barrymore, you wait outside. NBC, you are in 30

Rock.

Eddie: Okay. You go in, and everybody's in line I'm sure. What are some of the rules? This

I don't know. What rules do you...?

Annie: I was there pretty early.

Eddie: Yeah, heck yeah.

Annie: And I'm all by myself, which I was like, Hey, guess what? I would much prefer

have a friend as someone to talk to, but I'm not missing this because there's one

ticket. So here's what I learned at Seth Meyers, is that they are determining where you sit from the moment you walk in.

So there are pages watching everyone. So your girl Annie, I dressed up, I did my hair, I smiled from start to finish. So you go up to this lobby and it's like a waiting room where people are in line, and then you walk into that bigger room you mentioned that's like a lounge. Sofas, chairs, benches, there's all these LED screens that are showing you clips of SNL. There's tons of drinks.

Eddie: And all the while, getting you pumped up.

Annie: Tons of caffeine.

Eddie: Timing the pump.

Annie: Yes. But the pages are watching you.

Eddie: The guy on 30 Rock they all have the little blue coats and the pin.

Annie: That's right. A girl comes over who's a page, she's got her phone in her hand and she's like, "Okay, so are you in this line or this line?" And they're like, it's by people's names. Are you in Carrie's line or Sammy's line? And I'm like, "I'm in Carrie's line." And she's like, "Oh, that's so fun. Are you here from out of town?" And like trying to figure out my story. So I'm like, "Oh, yeah, I actually live here. This has been so fun. What a dream come true. Do you enjoy working? I am just

like buttering her up.

Eddie: Doing it, doing it.

Annie: And she said, "Oh, it's so nice to meet you. I'm so glad you're here. I hope you have a great time." Turns around [typing sound] in her phone, and I don't know what she

says.

Eddie: Nice.

Annie: But I watch her do it with everyone she meets. And she's sending a text. I can see

that. She's texting someone.

Eddie: Wow.

Annie: Five minutes later, someone comes over and says, "Hey, are you in the Carrie line?"

I'm like, "Yeah." She's like, "Okay, go ahead and come with me." And I was like,

"It freaking worked." I was nice to this girl. I can tell the girl who's coming to get me is assessing what I'm wearing to make sure I match what was on the girl's text.

Eddie: Well, yeah. Also, it makes sense, because they're casting. They're casting the

audience as much as anything, right?

Annie: That's right, they're casting the audience.

Eddie: We're cutting to Ryan Reynolds out there, we're doing audience questions. You're

seeing the audience, and like they need to both look good on camera, and also

they're helping the show.

Annie: That's exactly right.

Eddie: Okay.

Annie: Then there's three sections of that big waiting room and they send me all the way to

the left. What I come to find out is everyone on the left is the people who got to sit

on the floor and the people who were in the first two rows of the balcony.

Eddie: Great.

Annie: So I was in the first two rows of the balcony. I was glad not to be on the floor. That

feels like a ton of pressure.

Eddie: It doesn't matter. I was glad you got a seat where you could see, because there are

some seats in there that are pretty buried.

Annie: That you cannot see.

Eddie: You got balcony right up there.

Annie: So here's what happens when you get balcony. I mean, it takes an hour to get from

When you get up to your seat in that hour, they have taken... I mean, they just know exactly who you are, exactly what your name is, exactly what you're wearing, and

going into that lobby up to your seat. You probably experienced this with Fallon.

you hand your pink ticket over, I had a pink ticket, you hand your ticket over, they walk you to the seat, taped across my seat is painter's tape with my name Downs.

And every seat has a name on it.

Eddie: Wow.

Annie:

Yes. So they pull up the tape and they tell you to sit, and you sit right in your exact seat. And because I was a guest of the musician, they sat me dead center so I could watch Chris and Morgan and the band.

Eddie: Okay, so you walk into the studio-

Annie: So that's how I got in my seat.

Eddie: No, no. So you walk in the room though, is there music on yet? Like how live is the

room? How sparky is the room when you walk in?

Annie: When I walk in, of the 200, I'm probably the 40th person to sit.

Eddie: Okay.

Annie: And the band is all there. Also, the studio is tiny.

Eddie: I've heard people are shocked.

Annie: It is so much smaller than I would have ever dreamed.

Eddie: Very small. It is.

Annie: So you walk in, you're kind of like, Oh my gosh, this is everything I've seen on TV.

But I would have pictured it being three times this big.

Eddie: And it's all right.

Annie: Everything is stacked on top of each other.

Eddie: Right, and gets pushed into each other. Like, you know, you're watching the news,

and it's on home base.

Annie: That's right. This has been true of all the live shows I've gotten to see, is once

you're sitting... and all the tickets to the Jimmy Fallons, to the Colberts, to all those are free. We'll link to the website. It's the oneiota.com, and you can go and you sign up and you get free tickets. So, all of them have been... I just signed up because I

wanted to see the shows when I lived there.

Once you're sitting in the room, then it is just like a carnival for your eyes. You can just watch these guys who work here moving sets around. Watch the band warming up. Watch the SNL band warming up. Watch actors coming in and out. I mean, it is

wild. It is wild.

Eddie: So at that point, stage is clear-

Annie: Yeah, and it's 11 o'clock.

Eddie: It's 11 o'clock. So what's happening behind the scenes, right, is that everybody's in

Lauren's office, they're rewriting and doing final touches on the show, and picking

sketches.

Annie: Yeah. Because they've done the dress rehearsal and they're kicking out some of the

sketches and changing some of the other ones.

Eddie: And you're watching up front there, okay.

Annie: Yeah.

Eddie: Is it cold? I've always assumed it's cold.

Annie: It is cold, yeah. I wore a sweater on purpose because I was cold when I went to

Seth Meyers. So I knew it was probably going to be cold.

Eddie: Gosh.

Annie: So it's getting to be 11, 11:15... The show starts at 11:30 for people who don't know.

The show starts at 11.30. So then they start setting up the first skit, and it is right in front of the monologue stage. The monologue stage tucks under the band, and when they start setting it up, Eddie, immediately I'm like, it's the alien skit. It's right, it's,

it's...

Eddie: Oh, oh, oh, oh, oh, I see, yes.

Annie: And I knew, because they set the three chairs and then a desk, and I was like, Oh

my gosh, this is the alien skit. This is the skit that Ryan is... one of the ones he's

most known for.

Eddie: Okay, so, home base where the person comes out and does the monologue, there's a

stage set there because that's where they're doing the main sketch.

Annie: That's right.

Eddie: Which is the alien sketch, Kate McKinnon... three people have been abducted by

aliens. Kate McKinnon has had a very different experience than the other two people. Of this, this is the cold open, so the beginning of the show. Ryan Reynolds, who's the host, does a rare thing and actually is a part of the cold open. Not Ryan

Reynolds. Ryan Reynolds is the soccer boy.

Annie: The soccer boy!

Eddie: Ryan Gosling.

Annie: Ryan Gosling. Why can't I do that? Yeah, I can't.

Eddie: It's a three-show... Let's just pause. On your SNL, you got to see a classic Kate

McKinnon sketch.

Annie: I couldn't believe it. When I'm telling you, I leaned over... I didn't know anybody,

but of course I talked to the people next to me. I leaned over to the girl and I said, I think her name was Ella. I was like, "Ella, we're about to see the alien sketch right in front of our very eyes." And Kate McKinnon isn't even on this show anymore.

Eddie: And of course she's gonna be on it.

Annie: I could not believe it.

Eddie: So you know Katie Kennedy.

Annie: Yeah, because of Ken, and because of Barbie, right. That's what I figured, yeah. I

was thrilled. But I'm telling you, the thing that blew my mind is as that... so when you're sitting, as the show starts, there are TV screens everywhere, because they want everyone in the... so the challenge is, Annie, don't look at the TV screens, look at the actors. Even if you can see the TV screen better, this is your one shot, maybe in your whole life, to look at the actors while they're doing an SNL sketch.

So to the left of them... so imagine them... from where I'm sitting, if Chris Stapleton and the music is at 12 o'clock, this sketch and the main stage is at one o'clock. Well, standing in front of me toward the end of the sketch, there suddenly is this crowd of like 30 people wearing all black. And I was like, "I wonder what they are. They look like crew men and women. What are they doing?"

So as soon as the sketch ends and "the Saturday Night Live starring" starts on the TV, there is this woman who looks about my age, big curly hair0

Eddie: Yes, brown hair.

Annie: Yes. How do you know this?

Eddie: I know everything about this show. Keep going.

Annie: Oh, yeah, you do. She grabs Ryan Reynolds, and for the entire show, she pulls him

everywhere and runs with him. So she grabs Ryan and is gone, and then all these 30 people come over, and they remove the alien sketch setting, and it is gone. And

then they roll out the stage in front of the band, and then there's the monologue stage, exactly where the aliens just were.

Eddie: Okay, a couple of questions. There are some questions that I have about this

opening that I've always wanted to know.

Annie: Great.

Eddie: It's a very specific thing. So there's two things. One, the band is playing the song

live, right? The opening title live, right?

Annie: Yes, yes. They are playing.

Eddie: They're playing the whole thing live, which means they're sunk up to the video,

which means there's gotta be like a count in the video, because it's going, right?

And you don't see Daryl Hammond, who's the announcer, right?

Annie: No.

Eddie: He's not there. I don't actually think he is there. I think that's pre-recorded, but that's

there. Okay, there's a crazy-

Annie: But I did see the clock that they go by.

Eddie: Oh, my gosh. Hanging from the ceiling, it drops down.

Annie: Couldn't believe it. Couldn't believe it.

Eddie: Okay, here's a question I have. When you watch the show live, there is 30 seconds

till local news preview, local news preview, black, then you hear a laugh, and then it goes... it's in black. You hear the end of the laugh, like a, huh, and then, like, they're up in the cold open, and then people go wild. What is that laugh? What

happens right before they start? Does somebody warm you up?

Annie: Nothing. It's not real. We did not laugh.

Eddie: You're silent?

Annie: Yeah. I think they're having us clap. I feel like I remember us clapping or

something, but it is... I mean, it literally is like... we're on in 10 seconds, five, four, three, two, one, and then they go. I do not remember them having us laugh. So Michael Che came out. Michael Che came out and welcomed us, but it was very

like, "So glad you guys are here." But it was 10 minutes before the show started. The alien scene was not even set when Michael Che came out.

Eddie: Okay. So Che comes out, does a little bit of warm-up.

Annie: But not even funny. Like, at Seth Meyers, it was a comedian and at Stephen Colbert, it was a comedian. This was, "Hey, I'm Michael Che, we're so glad you're here. You made a great choice. I've seen all the skits. They're really funny. It's a funny night. Our writer's killed. We're toward the end of the season. It's the 49th

season." Like, he's just killing time.

Eddie: Just being personable.

Annie: And just being Michael Che, just giving us a chance to see Michael Che. And then,

actually, Kenan Thompson and three of the girls came out and sang a song?

Eddie: Yeah, I've heard they do that. It's just pure warm-up. It's just pure like, yeah, yeah,

yeah.

Annie: Yeah, they just sang a song and then they went away. But we didn't do a laugh

before that opening thing that I remember.

Eddie: So the laugh is not real.

Annie: I don't think so.

Eddie: Laugh up to black, then they do that-

Annie: Then the cold open.

Eddie: So then the monologue happens. For those that have not seen it, the monologue is

happening. He's doing a little bit of like... the whole idea of the monologue is like

he's getting rid of the Ken character, and he's leaning into his new fall out-

Annie: Fall guy.

Eddie: ...Fall guy who he's starring with Emily Blunt with.

Annie: Yes, yes. So when she comes out.

Eddie: So do you see her?

Annie: Yes. So you see her... she's to the side. She's right in front of Chris' stage. That's

exactly right.

Eddie: Oh, cool.

Annie: I didn't know it was her right at first, because she had on all black, just like all the

crew standing there. But then, once they put her on stage, and then she leaves stage and comes back. Because do you remember he started by singing a Taylor Swift

song? So watching them shove the piano to him-

Eddie: Oh, yeah.

Annie: I mean, these people are crawling on the ground, shoving a piano over, and then

pulling it back. I mean, it was really cool. It was really cool. So then she comes up and they sing a song together. And then the, you know, "we've got Chris Stapleton here with us tonight. Y'all stick around. There's a great show." And then curly blonde head lady grabs Ryan Gosling like he is her four-year-old that is in trouble

at the mall and runs off with him to go change clothes.

Eddie: This woman's job, that is her whole job.

Annie: It's her whole job.

Eddie: She just starts ripping clothes off of them, and they're like... they always say all the

hosts are like just... she'll tell you where to go, and there's cue cards everywhere.

Literally, if you just put your body there-

Annie: There's cue cards everywhere!

Eddie: Everywhere.

Annie: I thought there was one set for every play, or for every skit, and there's three

handwritten sets for every skit. So if you're in the sketch and you're looking straight

ahead, there's a 12 o'clock set, a 3 o'clock set, and a 9 o'clock set.

Eddie: And if there's camera movements, they change that. Also, they're handwritten

because... who knows why. They could be on a computer screen at this point. The other thing that blows my mind, they are often changing the end of a sketch as the beginning of it starting. So all three of those cue cards are all being organized at the

same time. I mean, it's just like...

Annie: It is wild.

Eddie: The workings of how they make this thing happen is crazy.

Annie: The one I could see the cards the best on was a skit about a hospital. There was one

kind of... after the second musical performance is kind of when they do some silly ones, and it was a hospital sketch. But that was the closest one to me. So I could see the cards really clearly and see the different colors they use and what they circle

and what they underline. I mean, it was really cool. That was a cool part.

Eddie: From where you were sitting, could you see Lauren down to the left?

Annie: Yes. He moved around. He moved around.

Eddie: Oh, he did?

Annie: Yeah.

Eddie: Oh.

Annie: Yeah. But yes, he was there a lot, but a lot of times he was kind of moving to

different areas. I hope I can describe this well, Eddie. So straight ahead of me is the stage for music, and that stays. One o'clock is the band, the SNL band, and then a

place to do a skit right in front of it.

Now, all those people that are sitting on the ground, they're in swivel chairs that are on a pole. So there were a couple times where the skit was so close to them that the front row people had to stand up and they pull those chairs out of the hole in the

ground and take the chairs away.

Eddie: You're not kidding. I didn't know that.

Annie: So then at two o'clock is two sets over there that they rotated a couple of times to

do different skits.

Eddie: Real small. Real small sets.

Annie: Yes, real small ones. So again, Chris Stapleton's at 12. To the left at like 10 o'clock,

nine o'clock, 10 o'clock is Cove. And that's where they did the Beavis and

Butt-Head skit. Then in front of it are two other sets that they kind of stacked. So they did a skit, they cleaned it up. They did a skit, they cleaned it up, and then the

back one was... So the cameras just move forward, if that makes sense.

Eddie: What I don't always appreciate is it's not like they can be on the left side, cleaning

up, moving everything, while the right side is happening, because they're on live

television. You're in a studio, you can hear everything. So they're doing all of this in like breaks, commercials.

Annie: Because it's only one set of cameras that are swinging back and forth.

Eddie: Digital shorts.

Annie: Yeah, the digital shorts helped them a lot. There was a lot of movement. There was only one in this show, but there was a lot of movement in that one while that thing's playing on the screen. I was like, I can't watch that. Everything is moving below me. Like every set is being rolled. And I'm like, they make these every week. They

make these walls that look like a hospital match every week.

Eddie: Sometimes day of. They start building that whole... everything you saw, they start building on Thursday, if they're lucky, if they're really on the ball. I mean, it all happens. So, and underneath you, they're getting dressed. So all the dressing rooms are underneath the stage. But people are just popping out. Obviously we have to talk about how freaking awesome was Chris Stapleton.

Annie: Yeah, he was so great.

Eddie: Isn't he perfect?

Annie: He's incredible live. I mean, he's unbelievably recorded, he's unbelievably live, he sounded amazing. He and Morgan together are so good. I'm very, very grateful that that camp was so generous to me.

Eddie: Annie, I have a million more questions, but I don't know what we're supposed to do in the show, but my gosh.

Annie: Just keep going. This is our one chance, maybe in our whole... I mean, I really hope you and I get to... I mean, I'm gonna try to win lottery tickets again.

Eddie: Oh, I'll try for it.

Annie: I would love for you and me and Bri to get to go.

Eddie: I'll go all my life. I'll go all my life.

Annie: Yeah. Yes, you will, you will, you will.

Eddie: Okay, so that's going back and forth. So when you're watching... I was curious, when you're watching a digital short, of which there was one on that, they're just

doing a bunch of set changes, things moving around. But the audience is watching, but it's kind of quiet.

Annie: Yeah, and the volume is up. You can hear the digital short.

Eddie: Because they're also grabbing people laughing. We hear audience laugh during the

digital short.

Annie: Oh, yeah,

Eddie: So there's some measure of like, you're still on. Okay, so the digital short happens,

then Chris happens, and then right away, like after Chris is done, have they already

set up the weekend update desk, which...

Annie: No, they set it up in that commercial between... Because do you remember Ryan

Gosling is standing in front of the SNL band when he introduces Chris Stapleton?

That's where Weekend Update happens.

Eddie: I never would have put that together.

Annie: They roll that stage back again, just like they did for the aliens. And they set

Weekend Update right in the center. So it is literally right in front of the saxophone

player.

Eddie: Got it. Yeah, Lenny. Yeah, okay. So, right away, so Chris Stapleton ends, people go

nuts, commercial, then come back, opening to Weekend Update.

Annie: That's right.

Eddie: Weekend Update happens, and they just... it's a pretty small desk, right? It's all

small, but does it feel small?

Annie: No, no. It feels the size you think it is on TV. That's one of the only things, besides

Stapleton Stage, that felt true to size, is you're like, Oh, this is what I picture, this is

how big I think it is. It is the whole span of that area.

Eddie: Right, because there's no way to do an optical illusion to a drum set or a guitar. You

have a scale of that. Okay.

Annie: That's right.

Eddie: I've always wondered about Weekend Update. I feel like it's pretty right. There's

one, two, three cameras, one on each and then one in the center. What I've always

wanted to know about Weekend Update is when somebody comes on to do like a guest spot, of which you got a great one, they roll on. Does somebody push them?

Annie: Yes. I saw.

Eddie: Terrific.

Annie: I did not see... So a guy rolled in on the Colin Jost side and then Caitlin Clark, the basketball star, rolled in on the Michael Che side. And I could see... because again,

that's at one o'clock for me. And I could see her get pushed on and pulled off.

Eddie: So they do push and pull. I always wondered, because they seem to have, like,

inertia moving in and out, and I always wonder if they just kind of grab the desk

and pull. But they don't.

Annie: No.

Eddie: Somebody gives them a yank.

Annie: Yes, she got pushed over, yes.

Eddie: And you got to see Caitlin Clark, which is like...

Annie: Yeah, which is really cool. And right next to me were her parents. Not right next to

me, not in the seat next to me, but right beside, arm's length, her parents, her

brother and sister, maybe, and then the coach. The coach was right there.

Eddie: Oh, no way. From...

Annie: Yeah.

Eddie: Because the whole team was there. They came out at good nights, which we'll get

to. So she comes out. I mean, at what point now, you're halfway into the show, we're at 12:15-ish, right? We're halfway into the show. At what point, like, for me, it feels emotional when I'm hearing it. Is there a point where you're like, I'm at SNL? Is it starting to like...? When does it start to realize, like, holy buckets, I'm at

SNL?

Annie: When Ryan Gosling did his opening monologue, I had the moment of like, don't

ever forget this. You are getting to be at SNL and you are in the same room as Ryan Gosling and you are watching him do what millions of people around the world are

watching him do on television.

Eddie: Weird. I mean, you're really watching him-

Annie: Yeah, so it started then. But Weekend Update was really cool because I like Colin

> Jost and Michael Che. I think they're funny. What we see on TV is the green screen behind them. The little box next to them that shows the picture of whatever I'm

talking about, obviously, they don't really see that.

I wasn't emotional as much as I was like, remember what the... Partly, I was like,

"You have to remember everything to tell Eddie."

Eddie: Right. Because he's gonna ask you about it in a very public forum very soon.

Annie: Yeah, yeah. But I was very cognizant of this is a unique opportunity gifted by a

dear friend who you might not get to ever do this again.

Eddie: It was kind of remarkable that your friend got to do it, to be completely honest. It's

like the hardest ticket.

Annie: I know.

So, Kaitlin Clark rolls on, rolls off, pretty exciting to see her. Like, she goes off. **Eddie:**

Annie: Yeah, yeah, I thought it was cool. I thought it was fun to see her.

Eddie: Amazing. And it's also neat that you're at a place where this is... people probably

> are so tired of hearing me talk about SNL, but it is still the epicenter of culture, no matter what, in a moment. Like, if you're famous, if it's big, like, you're gonna show

up there at some point at 11:30. So, she shows up.

Annie: I just did an interview an hour before I'm talking to you with a country artist that's

> been in the industry a long time, and I said, "Is there any dreams left? Like, have you done everything?" And the answer was, "We haven't done SNL." And I'm

talking national anthems, I'm talking Grammys. And it was "we haven't done SNL."

Eddie: Could dream of an SNL stage. It's not like some kid dreaming about it.

Annie: That's right. That's right.

Eddie: Yeah, watching Dana Carvey. It's like real.

Annie: That's right. **Eddie:** All right, so show continues. And at that point, we're rolling now. So it's sketch,

sketch, sketch. And the next notable thing really is good nights. So, oh, hey, hold

on, Beavis and Butt-Head sketch.

Annie: Beavis and Butt-Head sketch.

Eddie: So for people that did not see it, there was a sketch where...

Annie: Just Google it as well. Watch it.

Eddie: Yeah, it's easier to do that. But basically the whole idea of it was that there was

people dressed like *Beavis and Butt-Head* who were not *Beavis and Butt-Head*. And the real memorable piece of it is that it was a very rare... like, people broke hard. Heidi Gardner, who is very much stoic, she does not break often, lost it

beyond...

Annie: An unrecoverable level.

Eddie: Yeah, couldn't even try anymore. What was it like in the studio?

Annie: So Ryan Gosling is dressed as Beavis.

Eddie: The blonde one.

Annie: Yeah, the blonde one. The joke of the whole sketch is they don't realize they look

like a cartoon character. They're just, this is what they look like.

Eddie: Why are you laughing?

Annie: They're in a TV audience, and this is what they look like, and oh, we're distracting?

We're so sorry. So they make Ryan Gosling move. So when Ryan Gosling sits down, they're very close to me. This is the cove at my nine o'clock. Again, I'm balcony, so I'm above them, but I am 30 feet away, so I'm very close. I'm very close. So I'm like, Oh, Ryan Gosling is really funny. I wonder what this sketch is. And then when they say Beavis, I was like, "Oh my gosh, they're doing a *Beavis*

and Butt-Head skit," which is unbelievable. Hysterical.

So then when he moves and you see Mikey Day sit down dressed as Butthead, I was like, that is so funny. But I can't see his face as well as you can see his face on TV. But when Heidi Gardner looks over his shoulder, and they show that on the TV that's right above my head, that's what... I mean, the crowd just lost their minds.

Absolutely lost their minds.

Eddie: Okay, because that's what I also wanted to know. Because the real laugh comes

with the fact that you're seeing it for the first time.

Annie: Uh-huh. Uh-huh.

Eddie: I've always wondered how they get the audience to do that, too. Because in theory,

the audience has watched it happen. But it's because you're close enough to be able to see what's happening, they're not, like, shrouding their faces or anything. But you're far enough that when it cuts to one of those many screens, you're really getting it for the first time. So they kind of keep you almost at a distance where you're still tracking more with the audience than you are somewhere in the room.

That makes sense.

Annie: That's a perfect way to put it. That's a perfect way to put it. From where I'm sitting,

I can see her and I can see the seat where Beavis and Bud had sat. I can't see

Kenan. Kenan is blocked by a set that had been wheeled in front.

Eddie: Got it.

Annie: Because some of the sets were... however high the balcony is, some of the sets were

two feet taller than that.

Eddie: Oh, I see.

Annie: So there were times where they were blocking my view from something or another.

And the way they had slid some set down, it was blocked. I couldn't see Kenan at

all, so I could only see Kenan on the TV above me.

Eddie: Got it. Do they still have the big crane in the middle of the room with a camera

person on a chair that says Saturday Night Live handwritten in the back?

Annie: I couldn't see that, but there is still the crane camera.

Eddie: Is there a person sitting on it also moving?

Annie: Yes.

Eddie: Okay, cool.

Annie: No, he's not up that high. He's back wherever the writing would be. He's sitting

there and he's kind of directing it like you would a bulldozer or something.

Eddie: Totally. They've changed it over time. There used to be someone sitting at that

camera, and it was like part of the opening, and that person would fly up and

around the room.

Annie: No, not anymore.

Eddie: They don't need to. They don't need a camera that big.

Annie: Yeah.

Eddie: Okay, so Keenan's there, everybody's dying. So that's how they're cultivating that

we're laughing along at the same time. Do you feel in the room... does it feel

different?

Annie: It feels like you are watching a skit people will never forget. I realized in the

moment I am getting to see a sketch on SNL that will go down in infamy. No

question. I knew that in the moment.

Eddie: Because you'll never see a clip from the Drew Barrymore show you were on unless

it was just a... or you were at, right? I know who the guests were when I saw Conan or whatever a decade and a half ago, but you'll never. But this will... you'll see this. Beavis and Butt-Head, you'll see this. Chris Stapleton, you'll see this. Like, it's

crazy. SNL makes history. Okay.

Annie: Ryan Gosling broke a lot. He laughed. If you're not an SNL person, breaking is

when the person laughs. Jimmy Fallon's known for it. Yeah, he broke all the time.

You're kind of like, okay, Ryan, bro, you've done this a lot.

Eddie: He was really giggly, wasn't he?

Annie: Yeah, yeah, he was super giggly by the real one. Okay, so the closing.

Eddie: The good nights. All right, so, good nights are happening-

Annie: You're gonna love this.

Eddie: Oh, God, tell me. So, I know that the band is playing like piano music, and

everybody's like, clap, clap, right? Are you clapping? Does the audience clap?

Annie: Well, you know they do that... They do, like, two, and it's so annoying. And so,

yeah, you're doing it, because everybody's doing it. And then once Ryan starts

talking, everybody kind of stops.

Eddie: Because I've heard the clapping, and I can see the cast clapping, but then it stops,

and some people continue. So, you're clapping, piano's happening, tell me

everything.

Annie: It is everything you want it to be, where there are so many awkward people. One

person goes to hug the other person, they turn around and don't realize it. So if you've never watched it... hey, I'm surprised you're still listening to this podcast.

But if you've never watched SNL-

Eddie: Why have you gotten this far?

Annie: Yeah. If you've joined us for these 35 minutes. So, the whole cast is up there, and

then any special guests are up there as well with Ryan, and Ryan's thanking

everybody.

Eddie: Wow.

Annie: So, he thanks the cast and the crew and whatever. And then, as soon as he says

goodnight, they all start hugging each other and talking to each other.

Eddie: Band picks up, they're playing. Yeah.

Annie: Yeah. People kind of are drawn to who they probably normally talk to. Ryan's

hugging a lot of people. Chris and Morgan Stapleton are hugging a lot of people. And they all stay until there's some signal that I was watching for and still did not see that told them it was off TV. And when they tell them it is off TV, the band still keeps playing, but they go a little bit quieter. And then people just start walking

down the center of that aisle where they go...

Eddie: Kind of meandering, right? Like, it's not like they're running out. It's just...

Annie: Waving at people, just walking out, saying, thanks, thanks. And they're just talking

to each other and heading to some after party that I was not invited to.

Eddie: And then another after party. There's two.

Annie: Yes.

Eddie: Okay. So then they're out.

Annie: Oh, I didn't know that. There's two?

Eddie: Yeah, yeah. Jimmy Fallon used to host one of them. It's like the after-after party. It's

an unsanctioned thing, but they go well into Sunday.

Annie: Yeah, they'd have to. Because we're done at one o'clock. That was the only

downside is like 1:15? I was like, well, now I have to get home.

Eddie: Like, I gotta take my face off now.

Annie: And I don't get to be with my friends. I gotta just get in a cab and go home. But I

did share my location with the people that were there and said, you're the only person awake right now to know where I am. So I need you to know my location until I get home and then I will know you are no longer responsible for my life.

Eddie: Right.

Annie: And I got home perfectly fine.

Eddie: So they meander out, band kind of dims.

Annie: They meander out. And people kind of hang longer than I thought they would.

Like, maybe ten people are left on stage talking. Not Ryan or Emily, but, like, the Stapletons are still there talking to some of the people in the band, and a couple of the crew. I mean, a couple of the writers are still up there. Which is really funny, because you're like, nobody actually knows who y'all are, because we don't recognize your faces. All the actors have gone, what's left are writers. And then

when they all leave, the lights go all the way-

Eddie: But the writers aren't up there on TV, though. Did they come up after?

Annie: There were some this time. There were people up there that weren't actors. I

thought they were writers. Who were they? Maybe they were actors that just

weren't on that show?

Eddie: I mean, for yours, there was the Iowa basketball team.

Annie: It was dudes. It was dudes right to the left of 1 o'clock. I'll have to go back and

look. You'll have to tell me who they were.

Eddie: I mean, I wonder. But anyhow, so, but people are meandering and just... there's no

like, house lights up, everybody get out kind of moment.

Annie: Oh no, there is not a you get to leave yourself. Just like you did not get to sit

yourself, you do not get to leave yourself. First, they remove all the VIPs, which

was, spoiler, not I.

Eddie: Caitlin Clark and-

Annie: Caitlin Clark's family and coach get up and they get to leave. Someone to my left

that I do not know gets up and gets to leave. And then they come and get you row

by row.

Eddie: Wow, okay, real gentle exit. So they exit. Because there are three elevators that

have no buttons in them. And they go to the first floor and the eighth floor, I think, whatever we're on. It's 8G and 8H and whatever, so I'm guessing it's eight, so I don't know that. But you get in the elevator and it stops and you get out. And that's

how you get up there, too, is they call your...

I didn't even tell you this part. On the back of the ticket are letters. This is what I learned in Seth Meyers. Then when everybody's waiting in that big waiting room with all the caffeine and the chairs and the screens, like you waited in for Jimmy Fallon, they'll say, if you have an eight on the back of your ticket, will you go ahead and come now? And then they get all the eights. And then I had a TH, no idea what that stands for. If you have a TH, and that was the rest of us that were in that one

section.

Well, then they split you up in three elevators and send you up. Well, the only way to get back down... and that's when you have to turn your phones off, by the way.

They won't let you get on the elevator unless you show that your phone is off.

Eddie: Whoa.

Annie: They say, "If we see you taking a picture, we will delete the picture, we will delete

it out of your deleted pictures and you will be escorted out immediately and never

welcomed back."

Eddie: Wow.

Annie: So you turn your phone off and you do not even... you can't have it out.

Eddie: Yeah, you don't play.

Annie: ...once you are... from elevator to elevator, no phones. So they take you out row by

row because they can only fit so many people on an elevator. So you just wait in line, then you get in an elevator, they say, have a great time, and then you go down,

and this time you go down and go back kind of to where that lounge is, and then you walk down some stairs and walk into the 30 Rock merch store, and they have t-shirts from the show that night.

Eddie: Ryan was wearing one during his opening.

Annie: He was, you're right.

Eddie: His welcome of Chris, yeah.

Annie: I'm just realizing that, that that's the same shirt.

Eddie: Wearing one of his own shirts, which was kind of fun and funny, and he wore an

SNL 49, season 49. So they escort you into an open gift shop, which, by the way,

1:15 in the morning.

Annie: At 1 o'clock in the morning. That's exactly right. It's shocking. And they give you a

10% off little flier.

Eddie: Of course. And so, what do you buy?

Annie: Nothing. I'm sorry to tell you, the line was very long. Because of how great my seat

was, I was one of the last people to leave the room. Imagine when before Black Friday was six weeks long, and people waited in line to go to Target, and they all wanted to buy TVs. That's the mob that was around those t-shirts. And I was like, "I

live here, I can come back tomorrow and get something."

But you get two bracelets to wear, and I don't know what the bracelet... everyone has on different colors. Again, there are so many secrets, we have no idea. So I kept my two bracelets, I kept my letter that got me in, and I have pictures. So I thought I would much rather do a little frame than buy something at the gift shop that I could

come back and get another day. I wouldn't wear a t-shirt.

Eddie: Wow. You never saw any of the people that actually got you the ticket, right?

Annie: Only to the side. So during Chris's second performance, the whole team, the whole

Stapleton team got to come out and watch that. So they're kind of standing where *Beavis and Butt-Head* were. They're standing right there. so I could see our friends standing there. And I could see our friends looking for me but couldn't find me and we can't text each other. I was like, "I see you looking." In my mind, I was like calling them with my mind. I was like, I'm right here on the second row. Because I could never text them once I was in my seat because my phone has to be off. And I didn't know where my seat was gonna be before my phone got turned off, so there

was no telling them where I was. So it was a matter of looking in a sea of 200 to find your one friend that you had been so generous to.

Eddie: Oh, my gosh. Annie.

Annie: Dude.

Eddie: Dude, that was a great, great thing. Congratulations.

Annie: It was so great.

Eddie: Oh, for people listening who have hung on, who are moderate SNL fans, but like

our show, thank you.

Annie: Thank you.

Eddie: I needed all of that. There's just so many little things.

Annie: I know. Is there anything I didn't tell you? I'm trying to make sure there's nothing I

didn't tell you. I mean, that really is a 40-minute recap. That's almost as long as the

show.

Eddie: Well, the thing is, I watched the show after I had already known you were there. So

I was watching it, first of all, for you, and figured you had to be the top.

Annie: I know, and I don't think I made it on TV at all.

Eddie: It would be an outline, if anything. There was a shot behind Ryan when he was

doing the opening that I bet, now that I know where you're at, I bet you could find,

like, you up there. But-

Annie: Okay, I should go look. There was one... When they set up the hospital sketch, you

know they'll do a commercial, and then they'll come back and show the like this is about to be the sketch, and then they do another commercial. The camera panned up to the balcony during that and they got the girl next to me. It did not get quite to

me. I was so disappointed. Just for memory's sake.

Eddie: But we might be able to see your show there some day.

Annie: Yeah, yeah.

Eddie: Oh, Annie. As a PS-

Annie: 2017, what a great year.

Eddie: I mean, honestly-

Annie: Lillian, thanks for the research.

Eddie: Oh, that's right. Gosh, can you read anything from 2017 just as she is...?

Annie: Well, the rudest part is she put in here about how the Falcons lost to New England

Patriots in the worst Super Bowl of my life. Yeah, I was like, that hurts my feelings.

Eddie: Well, we'll be back with 2018. We'll do a proper 2018 recap.

Annie: Thank you for letting me talk about that, Eddie. I was dying to tell you.

Eddie: Oh, my gosh.

Annie: I know. And you can win tickets. Most everyone around me had gotten them in the

lottery. Everybody waiting in line around me had gotten them in the lottery. And you apply for that in August, I think, right, Eddie, before the season starts?

Eddie: Yeah, yeah. Bree and I both, everybody, we've applied for years. Someday we'll get

it. It'll happen.

Annie: Yeah, that's right. The interesting thing for y'all listening is when you apply for

SNL tickets, you don't get to pick a date. It's a lottery and it's just, do you want tickets to season 50? Okay. Then you got tickets for October 12th and you can't

give them to anyone else. You either say yes or no, and that's it.

Eddie: And you can't pick whether you want a dress rehearsal or main show. You just get

exactly-

Annie: Oh, I didn't know that.

Eddie: It's a single-

Annie: Do you know, I originally had asked our friends for dress rehearsal tickets, because

I was like, I don't need to see the real thing. I'd like to be in bed by 11:30. I don't need to be at the real thing. But I'm so grateful I got to... I mean, I'm so thankful I

got to see the real thing.

Eddie: There's huge pros and cons to both, but I think it's really cool that you saw like...

You'll be able to go back and see that show and watch it differently than everybody

else. You and 200 other people.

Annie: I mean, the *Beavis and Butt-Head*, I was there for a skit that will never be forgotten.

Eddie: Oh, Annie, that's nuts. Well, I mean, that's it. That's the show.

Annie: That's it. That's the show.

Eddie: What else do we have to talk about? Thank you for that. Congratulations.

Annie: Well, I knew you'd enjoy it. All right, friends, go wash your hands.

Eddie: Bye buddies. Yes.
